WON AT NATIONALS

Southern Wells Junior-Senior High School FCCLA members joined 8,000 delegates at the National Family, Career, and Community Leaders of America Conference in Washington, D.C. on July 5-9, 2015. Allison Blevins, Kayleigh Hopkins, and Kennedy Rhodes, along with Adviser Janel Franks and Parents Rene Hopkins and John Barr attended this event, representing the Southern Wells Chapter.

Blevins and Rhodes competed in Chapter Service Project Portfolio, showcasing the chapter's work with Bead for Life Organization. Chapter members sold jewelry and other products from the company and completed activities to raise awareness about global poverty and financial literacy. They received silver medals for this event. Hopkins competed in Interpersonal Communication and received a gold medal. For this project, Hopkins relayed her experiences educating students about maintaining boundaries in their lives. Information about boundaries was inspired by a presentation by Pam Durdahl of A Friend's House to Southern Wells Interpersonal Communications classes.

In addition to the conference activities, the attendees were also able to experience opportunities in Washington, D.C., including the Smithsonian, National Archives, the House of Representatives, Arlington National Cemetery, and monuments. National FCCLA sponsored a rally on the Capital, and Southern Wells members met with staff from Congressman Andre Carson of Indianapolis. UPCOMING BLOOD DRIVE

The American Red Cross urges blood donors to give in the final weeks of summer to help prevent a blood shortage.

Blood donations often decline in August as final summer vacations are planned and back-to-school activities ramp up. On average, during the summer months, about two fewer donors give blood at each Red Cross blood drive than what is needed.

Donations are needed now to help ensure blood is available for patients in need. Donors with types AB, O negative, B negative and A negative blood are especially encouraged to donate. Plasma from type AB donors can be transfused to patients of any blood

My school always started on my birthday or very close to it. The teachers always made a point of letting me know how fortunate it was to celebrate my birthday by starting school. In my first grade class there was 19 kids and of that 6 of us had birthdays within a week. (Must have been a snow bound December) that year. My sister who was a senior that year took me to school that first day to do the honors of getting me off to a good start simply because my mom was expecting an addition to the family any time. What a surprise that was when I found out I was no longer the baby of the family. Fortunately I did survive that first year without to many battle scars except for when some big kids were throwing stones at me on the way home and hit me in the side of the head which I still have that battle scar.

When my kids started school I considered that my red letter day, a few hours of freedom but at Christmas time we were blessed with a baby girl and when she started school that was a really red flag day, but those were all good days and so many wonderful memories.

I always enjoyed preparing treats for the girls to have when they would get home from school and for me cookie baking time was timed so they would have warm cookies with milk when they came in the door. One of their favorite treats was the peanut butter chocolate chip cookies which I will share with you.

1 cup peanut butter, 1 cup butter, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup brown sugar, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 3 cups flour, 2 teaspoon soda, 1 cup chocolate chips. Blend together the peanut butter and butter add in sugars, then eggs and vanilla. Sift together flour and soda and gradually add in along with the chocolate chips, form dough of about teaspoon size and form into a ball, place on very lightly oiled cookie sheet and lightly flatten with the bottom of a glass dipped in sugar, bake 350 for 10 minutes.

CHILDREN'S CHOIR

A trio of experienced, dedicated music educators will be leading the Children's Choir of Huntington County (CCHC) this fall. CCHC is a not-for-profit organization emphasizing vocal training and music artistry through the choral experi-

ence. The choir recently named Sharon Lehman as Artistic Director of the organization. Sharon has worked as a choral director for CCHC since 2005 and will continue conducting the Concert Choir, which is comprised of students in grades 6-10. She has also served as an interim director for the Fort Wayne Children's Choir. Sharon has a BA in Music Education from Bluffton University and has taught music in both public and private schools across the midwest. Under her direction the treble choir of CCHC was selected by audition to perform at the Indiana Music Education Association annual conference in 2011. Sharon is currently finishing a master's degree in Choral Conducting at Ball State University, where she has worked as a graduate assistant with all of the university's choral ensembles.

Ashlyn Brady joined CCHC in 2013 as director of the Treble Choir, which includes students in grades 3-5. She holds a BM degree in Music Education from Huntington University and has taught elementary general music for Fort Wayne Community Schools for four years. She also serves as a private voice teacher and is an active performer herself. Ashlyn has been a top 100 finalist on both American Idol and The Voice and has taken first place at several local competitions such as the Bluffton Idol in 2012 and the Fort Wayne Idol in 2013. Ashlyn continues to be an active leader on the worship team at Crossview

Church in Grabill and has been a guest soloist for several churches in northwest Indiana.

Denise Gilliland is a former director of the Bach Chorale Children and Youth Choruses in Lafayette, IN and she recently retired from thirty three years of teaching music in various locations. Denise served as interim director of the Concert Choir in 2014-2015 and will be directing the Joyful Songsters in the fall. The Joyful Songsters is a new choir offered by CCHC for teens and adults with and without disabilities. Denise holds a master's degree in Choral Conducting from Butler University and is a certified Kodaly music educator. In 2011 she was recognized by the Indiana Music Education Association as "Most Outstanding Elementary Music Educator".

BOATING RESTRICTIONS

Record or near-record rainfall this summer has led the Department of Natural Resources to restrict or close some public freshwater lakes in northern Indiana to motorboat traffic.

The DNR has created a web page (dnr.IN.gov/boatingadvisories) to keep the boating public and lake-front property owners informed of current restrictions or closures.

The DNR Law Enforcement Division uses an established policy to guide recommended restrictions based on conditions at a given lake.

After a condition or hazard is reported to the DNR, an Indiana Conservation Officer with DNR Law Enforcement investigates and recommends a course of action. The recommendation is reviewed by supervisors and forwarded to the DNR director for final approval. Indiana Administrative Code (312 IAC 5-12) authorizes the DNR director to modify or close public waters to watercraft use through a temporary order.

Depending on the reported conditions, the DNR director can do one of the following:

- * Restrict watercraft to daytime operation

Conditions: Large amounts of floating debris and or submerged objects that pose a significant impact to boating safety and/or navigation during night-time operation.

- * Limit watercraft operations to idle speed

Conditions: Surface water will likely be inside dwelling structures as a result of wake.

- * Prohibit motorboat operations

Conditions: Surface water is inside dwelling structures and motorboat operation, regardless

of speed, would cause continued property damage.

- * Close lakes to watercraft operations

Conditions: Potential dam failure or other catastrophic incident.

- * Any other restrictions

Conditions: Unusual conditions or hazards not covered in steps 1, 2, 3 and 4.

Once a temporary order is in place, conservation officers continue to monitor the water levels. In some instances, the presence of U.S. Geological Service water gages allows them to remotely check water levels on the Internet. In other instances, they monitor levels with in-person visits, often on a daily basis.

They also check weather forecasts to avoid lifting restrictions too soon.

Although the DNR has a regulatory role in the safety of many lake outlet structures, many are not owned by the DNR. Such structures often don't have operable features, so water levels in most natural lakes are controlled by the natural cycle of rainfall, evaporation, wetland storage, and runoff.

In addition, because lake outlet structures may pose potential safety risks even in normal conditions, they should be avoided, especially during floods and times of high water.

BACK TO SCHOOL BLUES

Parents have a lot on their plate: housing costs, healthcare, caring for elderly parents, raising kids,

just to name a few. As the new school year approaches, they face additional stressors — paying for back-to-school supplies, clothes and possibly tuition. Many par-ents may also be worried about their children starting a new school, changing school districts, facing a more rigorous academic year or dealing with difficult social situations.

Often the fear of the unknown — classmates, teachers, the school building — is the most stressful for family members, whether it's the children hopping on the school bus or their parents who have to wave goodbye.

Fortunately, children are ex-tremely capable of coping with change and parents can help them in the process by providing a setting that fosters resilience and encourages them to share and express their feelings about returning to school.

"Try teaching your child basic coping strategies to help reduce first-day-of-school jitters," says Dr. Jenny Tarbox, psychologist at Bloom Psychology Services. "For example, taking slow, deep breaths, visualizing their favorite place, or using positive self-talk like 'I can do this!' or 'It's going to be a great day!'"

GENEALOGY REPORT

COOMLER

Verlin L. Coomler, 88 of Heritage Pointe, passed away on August 4, 2015.



He was born on January 22, 1927 in the small town of Landessville, Indiana, now known as Landess. He came into this world weighing 13 pounds. His parents were Francis and Blanche Coomler. Verlin's only other sibling, Vaughn Dale, passed away at birth in 1926. At the age of 4, Verlin's mother passed away from lockjaw, today called tetanus. As was common in the day after the death of one's mother, his grandmother, Eva Korporal, raised him.

In 1945, Verlin graduated from Van Buren High School where he played on the Van Buren Aces basketball team. Verlin joined the Army in 1946 and became an infantryman. He finished basic training at Camp Polk in Louisiana. He completed his military service in 1948 as a Corporal stationed at Fort Lewis, Washington.

During a snow blizzard, Verlin married Betty Jean Westfall, his high school sweetheart, on March 25, 1947 at the home of Betty's parents, Walter and Blanche Westfall. Verlin and Betty were married for 48 years. Betty passed away on October 31, 1995. To this union were born three children James (Renee') Coomler, Tom (Mary) Coomler and Cathy (Dave) Stidham. There are six grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren. All Survive.

After completion of the military, Verlin and Betty moved to Fort Wayne where Verlin worked as Parts Manager for his father at Coomler Sales. In 1951, the call of the farm grew and they moved back to the Van Buren area living in the same farmhouse until retirement in 1985.

He is a member of the Central Christian Church, Van Buren, which he has attended since he was a little boy. He joined the church in 1954 and has served as Deacon, Elder and Trustee.

While farming several hundred acres Verlin also worked at Marion General Tire for eighteen years from 1961 to 1979. He drove a school bus from 1985 to 2000 and was known as Mr. "C". Many of his former students to this day still call him Mr. C.

He has been a member of the Van Buren Lions Club since 1978 and was awarded the Melvin Jones award, their highest honor, in 2005.

This group, predominately farmers, saw the need to form a fire department and in 1960 the Washington Township Fire Department was activated. To buy equipment, they sold interest free bonds and held Fish Fry's at the school. They bought used fire coats, hats, and boots from another fire department. They paid \$500 for a 1945 Ford Truck and were given an old rusted oil truck from the Pure Oil Company to use as a water

tanker. There wasn't any official training for the group; they gained experience as they went. Verlin was recognized in 2010 by the State of Indiana for his 50 years of service to the Grant County community.

Before school starts, Indiana psychologists offer suggestions to help parents and kids prepare:

Practice the first day of school routine: Getting into a sleep routine before the first week of school will aide in easing the shock of waking up early. Organizing things at home — backpack, binder, lunchbox or cafeteria money — will help make the first morning go smoothly. Having healthy, yet kid-friendly lunches will help keep them energized throughout the day. Also, walking through the building and visiting your child's locker and classroom will help ease anxiety of the unknown.

Talk to your child: Asking children about their fears or worries about going back to school will help them share their burden. Inquire as to what they liked about their previous school or grade and see how those positives can be incorporated into their new experience.

Empathize with your children: Change can be difficult, but also exciting. Let your children know that you are aware of what

they're going through and that you will be there to help them in the process. Nerves are normal, but highlight that not everything that is different is necessarily bad. It is important to encourage children to face their fears instead of falling in to the trap of encouraging avoidance.

Get involved and ask for help: Knowledge of the school and the community will better equip parents to understand their child's surroundings and the transition he or she is undergoing. Meeting members of the community and school will foster support for both parent and child. If parents feel the stress of the school year is too much to handle, seeking expert advice from a licensed psychologist, can help them better manage and cope.

Some Indiana children have already started the school year. Dr. Sarah Honaker, psychologist at Indiana University Health, offers suggestions for a successful school year. "A new school year represents an opportunity to children to get a fresh start and
