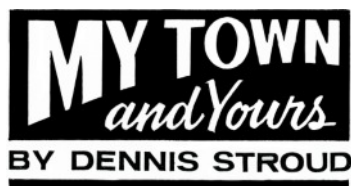
**WALNUT DRIVE**

For the past 13 years, Trinity United Methodist Church has organized an annual fall walnut collection drive and has generously donated the proceeds to an area nonprofit. Last year, Trinity donated the proceeds to Love In the Name of Christ and now has graciously handed off the project to Love INC. As Love INC gears up to take the reins on the annual Fall Walnut Drive, they are seeking the community's support.

Trailers will be placed in Huntington, Markle, Warren, and Roanoke. Love INC is asking anyone with unwanted walnuts to place them in the trailers, which will be emptied weekly. Anyone willing to lend a dump trailer should call Erin Didion or Kelley Miller at Love INC, 260-356-0933.

Walnuts will be collected beginning the first of October through November 2, in the Trinity United Methodist Church parking lot, 530 Guilford St., Huntington; behind Heritage Pointe of Warren, in Warren; behind Economy Machine, in

Roanoke; and in the Markle United Methodist Church parking lot, in Markle.



**THE SCHOOL 1967**

The Township School operated until 1966 when the county consolidated into one school. From 1967 to 1981, the school held the township elementary in the building. In 1981, the school board decided to close the Warren school building. This prompted a group, from the area, to call a meeting Jan. 6, 1982 to discuss the possibility of saving the school house building. Several meetings were held to decide what it can be used for and how to finance it.

In March of that year, the school board gave the group until Sept. to come up with a plan or the building would be torn down. In April, the group organized and formed a committee called W.A.R.R.E.N., which stands for Warren Area Residents for Recreational and Educational Needs. A contest was held to see if somebody in the community had any good ideas to use the building as a community center.

With the utilities, heat, water and sewage, totaling \$15,000 to \$20,000 a year and the roof needing repaired the next agenda was the finances. A fund drive was planned. It was decided to

ask for pledges to be paid over a three-year period. The money raised would be put in a trust fund and the interest would be used to operate the building. The fund drive was started on July 1, 1982 and the goal was \$275,000.

**LEARN TO TRAP**

Study animal sign and learn the art of trapping at Salamonie Lake, Oct. 13-14.

Indiana Conservation Officers will host a Trapper's Education Course at the Salamonie Interpretive Center. The program will focus on trappers of all ages, though youth trappers are encouraged to attend.

At 9 a.m. on Saturday, Oct. 13, participants will learn about conservation, trapping issues, ethics, and regulations. Trappers will get to set traps for furbearers under the instructors' supervision. Traps will be left overnight and checked the next day.

At 9 a.m. on Sunday, Oct. 14, trappers will accompany instructors to check traps. Furbearers caught will be used in skinning and fleshing demonstrations. The program will end by approximately 4:30 p.m. each day. Trappers will not need a trapping license to attend this program.

Trappers must attend both day-sessions of the course and complete a brief exam to receive the DNR Trapper Education Certification.

Free camping on Friday and Saturday is available for all course attendees at the Lost Bridge West Youth Campground, within walking distance of the Interpretive Center. Lunch will be provided both days. There are no costs to participate, and entrance fees will be waived for all participants.

Trappers are encouraged to dress for the weather. Waterproof knee boots or waders are recommended.

**DEADLINE APPROACHING**

Are you registered to vote? If you want to have your say in the upcoming November 6th General Election, you must register to vote by October 9th.

Citizens can register to vote online by texting 'Indiana' to 2VOTE (28683), or by visiting [IndianaVoters.com](http://IndianaVoters.com), and can submit an application to register in person at their local county clerk's office.

The Indiana Voters app also allows Hoosiers to confirm their voter registration, look up their polling place, get driving directions to their polling location, find out who's on their ballot, track their absentee ballot

application or provisional ballot information and contact local election officials.

In order to be eligible to register to vote, you must:

- be a citizen of the United States,
- be at least 18 years old by Election Day,
- have lived in your precinct for at least 30 days before the election; and
- not currently be imprisoned after being convicted of a crime.

"I encourage all Hoosiers to make it to the polls this November," said Secretary Lawson. "Voting is a precious right for Americans – it's how you can ensure your voice is heard in government. Registering only takes a few minutes and can be done online at any time."

**HELPING YOUR TEEN DEAL WITH PEER PRESSURE**

from the American Counseling Association As parents we like to think we're the most important influence in our children's lives. And that's probably true up to a certain age but then the outside world, in the form of school and friends, intrudes. By the time your child is a teenager it's almost a certainty that the opinions and actions of other teens are playing a large role in decisions about everything from clothing choices to hair styles to academic efforts.

Peer pressure is natural and, in many cases, can be a positive thing. But it can also

be a negative, especially for a teen lacking in self-confidence and self-esteem who is anxious to be accepted by others.

As a parent you can't control the pressures your teen is going to be experiencing, but you can play a big role in helping him or her overcome negative peer pressure.

Your starting point is to try and build confidence and self-esteem for your teen. A child who is self-confident and has high self-esteem is much more able to say no to harmful behaviors.

Help build that self-esteem by looking for positive accomplishments and praising work that is being well done. At the same time, try to limit criticism when a teen's efforts fall short.

You want to take a genuine interest in your teen's life. Ask questions about what he or she is doing and feeling. Learn to respect your teen's thinking even when it's counter to your own. Try to be respectful of your teen's decisions in friends, music and appearance. Getting your teen to really talk to you can often be difficult, but showing a real interest in your teen's life can produce results.

This doesn't mean that everything and everyone your teen values gets your approval. You are still the parent and need to sometimes set rules and boundaries. While "forbidding" certain friends seldom works, if you build a respectful relationship with your teen you should be able to express your concerns and work together to set

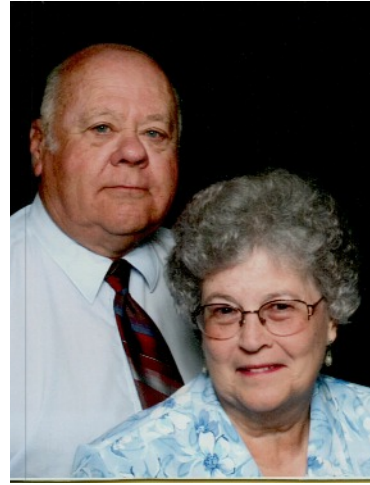

In a dutch oven, cook beef, celery, onions over med. heat until meat is no longer pink, drain. Add tomato juice, tomatoes, beans, soup, water, chili powder, brown sugar, bay leaves, salt and pepper. Bring to a boil, reduce heat.

Cover and simmer for 30 minutes. If desired, stir in macaroni and cook till macaroni is done. Discard bay leaves. Makes 16 servings.
