INDIANA LAW **ENFORCEMENT TEAMING**

UP TO REDUCE IMPAIRED DRIVING

INDIANAPOLIS — Drive sober or get pulled over. That's the warning state and local police agencies are issuing to drivers as Indiana gears up for its end-of-summer annual impaired driving enforcement campaign. Starting August 16 through September 2, officers across the state will be patrols increasing and sobriety checkpoints to crack down on those driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

The extra high-visibility Highway Traffic National Safety Administration (NHTSA) through grants administered When: Saturday, September by the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI).

"Driving drunk or drugimpaired is a problem for Watch this quick video that everyone," said James Bryan, ICJI's Traffic Safety Director. "Making the choice to operate a vehicle while impaired is never the right option."

> the end of summer responsibly by having a safety plan in place. Even if you only have one drink, designate a sober driver or use public transportation or a ride service to get home safely. Never drive impaired or let friends get behind the wheel if they've been drinking.

> To help people with their plans over the Labor Day weekend, ICJI is offering \$10 off Uber and Lyft rides from August 30th through September 2nd. Up to 1,000 vouchers are available each day. Ride credits are available between 5 p.m. and 3 a.m. the following day and must originate in, or have a final destination of, Indianapolis or Fort Wayne.






