He started in 2002 as Security Officer for MarkleBank and in 2007 became the Independent Alliance Banks Security and Facilities Officer for MarkleBank and Grabill Bank. He oversees security equipment and conducts security training for the banks, and oversees maintaining the bank buildings and bank equipment.

THE UPTOWN GARDENER by Ruth Herring

With each passing day we are getting closer to the days of conversations where we mention the dreadful wintery "S" word.

Every year Wayne and I are glad we no longer need to worry about getting out and going to work. That is a real fringe benefit of retirement.

Last week in the paper was a very nice article about cooking pumpkin. In the past few years I have cooked mine in the microwave and is much faster. I cut the pumpkin in half use an ice scoop to clean out the seeds place the pumpkin in a microwave safe bowl cut side down add a bit of water about 1/ 4 cup cover well with plastic wrap and cook on high till it test done, depending on the size. You can stick a knife or any sharp device through the wrap to test doneness usually takes 20-30 minutes. Let cool and scoop out the pulp and put in blender to purify. It is then ready to use. With the price of canned pumpkin in the stores It is worth the effort. We purchased pumpkins at the market across from the Dollar store for \$1.

I like to make some pumpkin butter every year. I take 1 or 2 cups of the pumpkin puree and for each cup add 1 teaspoon butter, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, bit of nutmeg, ginger and allspice and brown sugar to your taste or you could instead of spices add pumpkin pie spice. Heat thru till the butter and sugar is melted and blended in. This is good on toast and for myself I can't eat just one slice. This is something my Mom hooked us kids on. Often we would go to the corn field and look for the pumpkins Dad had planted and was hidden among the corn rows.

Pathfinder Community Connections, the Community Development division of Pathfinder Services, will again be providing free tax preparation assistance to people with low-to-moderate income this year. Anyone can volunteer for the free tax preparation program as the IRS provides free tax law training and all the materials needed to prepare basic individual income tax returns. Volunteers do not need to have prior tax experience; Pathfinder Community Connections will train all volunteers!

Volunteers are required to take one of each of the following training classes and pass a required test to become certified:

Tax Law: Thursday, December 15th from 5:00 until 8:00 P.M., or Wednesday, January 4th from 5:00 until 8:00 P.M.

Tax Software Training: Friday, January 6th from 9:00 A.M. until 1:00 P.M. or 4:00 P.M. until 8:00 P.M., or Saturday, January 7th from 9:00 A.M. until 1:00 P.M.

All trainings will take place at Pathfinder Community Connections, located at 2824 Theater Avenue in Huntington.

The free tax preparation program begins on Monday, January 23rd and runs through April Tuesday, 17th. Volunteers can work as many hours as they like and tentative hours for the program are Monday through Thursday from 9:00 A.M. until 8:00 P.M. and Friday and Saturday from 9:00 A.M. until noon.

To become a volunteer for the Pathfinder Community Connections Free Tax Preparation program please contact Kyle Miller or Beth Stevens at 260-355-2510 or email taxprep@pathfinder services.org.

2011 was the second year for the program and over 550 tax returns were completed by 20 volunteers with 162 families qualifying and receiving \$211,339 in Earned Income Tax Credit and a total of \$756,103 in tax refunds. The Farned Income Tax Credit (EITC), provides tax credits to working adults and families with low or moderate incomes. Funding for the program comes from NeighborWorks America, United Way of Huntington County and Rural LISC.

Pathfinder Community Connections is the community development division of Pathfinder Services and was created in 1997. Pathfinder Community Connections guides potential home buyers through the entire process of pre-purchase education, loan packaging, closing on the home. post purchase counseling, and when in need foreclosure prevention. Pathfinder Community Connections can be found online at www.cchomes.org.

GIVEIN

The Indiana Department of Natural Resources announced on Thursday the launch of the GivelN Game Program, an

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initiative designed to put deer hunters in touch with citizens who would like to obtain venison for their table.

The DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife has created an online (www.dnr.IN.gov/ givelNgame) where donors and recipients can register their contact information. There is no cost to complete the simple registration.

Here's how it works:

-A hunter registers information on the condition and amount of deer meat he or she is willing to donate. The hunter can choose to donate meat that is field dressed, skinned and boned, or wrapped and frozen. The hunter also provides contact information, either phone number or email.

-A recipient registers information on the amount of deer meat he or she is willing to accept, and designates a preference for meat that is field dressed, skinned and boned, or wrapped and frozen. The recipient also provides contact information, either phone number or email.

-Registrants can search the database for someone matching their designated preferences and use the contact information to work out the transfer details.

A participating hunter still is responsible for field dressing the deer, ensuring the deer is taken to a DNR-designated check station, and obtaining a permanent identification tag, after which it can be transferred or gifted to another party.

Indiana law prohibits the sale, trade or barter of wild game; GiveINGame however. provides hunters who have filled their freezers an



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opportunity to share extra deer meat with anyone willing to accept it.

Venison is a healthy alternative to beef. It has less fat and calories, and more protein than the same size serving of beef, according to several nutrition websites.

The DNR assumes no responsibility for the quality of venison shared through GiveINGame or the failure of a donor or recipient to follow through with an agreed transfer.

"GiveIN Game will serve as a supplemental program to existing venison donation efforts," said Mark Reiter, director of DNR Fish & Wildlife. "While those other efforts focus on distribution to needy families through food banks and charitable organizations, GiveINGame creates a broader opportunity to share the harvest with anyone."

The GiveINGame website also provides links to venison recipes and other information. GiveINGame is modeled after the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission's Deer Exchange, which began in 2008 and resulted in 300 deer being gifted in the first year.

ASSISTANCE AVAILABLE

Pathfinder Community Connections and other organizations around the State have partnered with the Indiana Foreclosure Prevention Network (IFPN), a statewide multi-agency collaboration, to offer another tool for troubled homeowners throughout Indiana.

The U.S. Department of the Treasury established the Housing Finance Agency Innovation Fund for the Hardest-Hit Markets (Hardest Hit Fund) to provide financial assistance to families in the states most impacted by the downturn of the housing

Indiana was awarded over \$221 Million to help unemployed homeowners pay a portion of their mortgage. Under the Hardest Hit Fund Unemployment Bridge Loan Program, Building the Bridge to Recovery, IFPN is targeting low-to moderate-income homeowners whose primary residence is in any county in Indiana.

"Since its formation in 2007, IFPN has been on the forefront of assisting homeowners reach an agreeable resolution with their mortgage lenders. We are excited to have the opportunity to utilize the Hardest Hit Funds to assist homeowners who have fallen behind on their mortgages due to an unforeseen loss of income," said Stephanie Reeve, Director of Asset Preservation for the Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority (IHCDA) who oversees the

"It is through programs like these that we are able to assist more families to continue to keep their dream of home ownership, and allow for families to stay rooted in their communities."

The Hardest Hit Fund offers individuals who unemployed through no fault of their own, assistance in paying their mortgage while they seek employment. Depending upon the county of residence, approved homeowners may receive assistance up to \$12,000 or \$18,000.

At a minimum, applicants must meet these three requirements:

owning only one home and currently residing in that home.

2) If currently unemployed be current must а unemployment insurance recipient. If re-employed after prior period unemployment, must have been an unemployment insurance recipient within the past twelve months, and

3) Must agree to participate approved training, education or volunteer service work.

The overall goals are to secure re-employment in an individual's chosen occupation or access training made available through the Indiana Department of Workforce Development that will help secure employment in a new occupation. Another alternative is to participate in 40 hours per month of volunteer service through HoosierCorps.

An estimated 13,000 Indiana households will receive assistance at an average assistance level of \$702 per month for an average of approximately 16 months, inclusive of payments to clear delinguencies and aid after reemployment.

Just wrap the other half and freeze it to use for Christmas.

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
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

your family might not mind having turkey again. Then you would have one less thing to buy for Christmas dinner.

If you still don't want to have turkey at Christmas, save it for some cold day in January. If you have a large enough crockpot, cook the turkey in the crockpot. If not, cook it on very low in the oven so that it slow cooks all day. It is amazingly delightful it is to come home to the yummy smell of slow cooked turkey!

Save money by making your own pies instead of buying the expensive pre-made ones. If the thought of making pie crust is too daunting, just buy a ready made crust. They are usually on sale for very little around Thanksgiving.

It really isn't that difficult to make the filling for most pies. Pies are often easier to make than cakes or cookies. If you like the traditional pumpkin pie, most cans of pumpkin have the recipe on the back.

If your family and friends aren't fussy about having the traditional pumpkinpie, you can

make banana cream, chocolate, or butterscotch pie. Just mix a box of banana pudding and pour it into a baked pie crust. Cover it with sliced bananas and whipped topping. For the chocolate pie, use chocolate pudding with chocolate chips in it and cover it with whipped topping. For the butterscotch, use butterscotch pudding and whipped topping and sprinkle with butterscotch chips.

You don't have to make so many pies that you could open a bakery. I have found that most kids are just as happy with a platter of cookies. Don't overdo it. You'll just wear yourself out! If you have time, make the cookies in the shapes of pumpkins and turkeys.

Save on your relish dish. Buying ingredients for a relish dish can get expensive, especially where we live. One year I paid more for my relish dish items than my turkey. If you have this problem, only use 3 or 4 vegetables on the relish dish instead of 10 and cut out on the more expensive vegetables. Broccoli and cauliflower are very high priced

for us so, if I needed to save, I would probably use carrots and celery. Fill the celery with cheese or peanut butter or cut them into fancy shapes. On this occasion, the turkey is the star and most people won't even notice that you cut back on the relish dish.

Don't make so many side dishes. Like I said, the turkey, gravy and mashed potatoes are moreimportant than everything else. By the time everyone stuffs themselves on those, they only eat a token amount of the side dishes. Why? Because, of course, everyone wants to save room for dessert!!!!!

On Thanksgiving Day you could be sure we started at breakfast with warm pumpkin butter on home made bread and butter. Our Thanksgiving dinner pumpkin pie and all the trimmings was the day we looked forward to. It was roast chicken with her wonderful dressing sometimes with oysters, mashed potatoes with gravy, candied sweet potatoes,

green beans, home canned corn, pickled beets, cranberry salad and a special treat of raspberry pie with fresh whipped cream for both pies. All of the food on the table with exception of oysters
