**TENTATIVE SCHEDULE** Following is a tentative schedule of the construction work to be done downtown by Doctor Construction of Huntington.

Demolition Phase - starting week of April 28th – start removal of asphalt/concrete and utility poles starting at south end of project. Both sides of SR 5 will be done simultaneously to accommodate boring and tapping of water lines.

Water Main Improvement Phase - Starting week of May 5th -start excavation of water main, tapping and necessary boring. Backfill and compaction as required. Week of May 12th -Hydrostatic pressure, leakage testing and sterilization.

Street Lighting (Electrical) Phase – Starting week of May 12<sup>th</sup> – installing light pole bases, conduit. Week of June 2<sup>nd</sup>-start wire pull and install new street lights type A & B and make all necessary connections.

Sidewalk Replacement Phase - Starting week of May 19th prepare base, form and pour new curb face sidewalks according to plan and spec.

Asphalt Pavement Replacement - Starting week of June 16th patch all road cuts.

Cleanup and Completion -Week of June 23rd – Includes removal of all debris, barricades, and equipment.

All work tentatively scheduled to be completed by June 28th.

# Hope that everyone has been enjoying this great weather

as much as I have. It could stay like this forever and would make me happy. This week the garden got tilled up thanks to our brother in

law Dave Coulter, he sure did a great job on it. Thanks Dave. It was a nice way for you to spend your birthday celebration.

Today I finally got the potatoes planted and some peas and lettuce. Wanted to get it done before the rains came. The first planting of peas I did on St. Patrick's day are coming up nice. Can't wait to be able to pick some. I plant the snow peas that is good to eat raw. I like to go out and pick a few and eat them right in the garden.

I also like to eat carrots that way. Years ago at home our neighbors who lived in a log cabin down the road from us had a huge garden that was creek bottom area and sandy soil. They always had such good carrots. I would play with their daughter and many times we would go into the garden and pull a carrot to snack on. If it had too much soil on it we would wash it off in the creek. Loon Creek divided the property and we spent many hours along the creek at our favorite fishing spots hoping to catch enough for supper.

I was back there some time ago and the whole area was all grown up in trees and brush and someone had rerouted the creek and the old fishing holes are gone and the log cabin where I spent many hours visiting is in shambles. Nothing looks familiar anymore. Even our small farm is all grown up in trees and shrub growth till you hardly recognize it. Our secret spot to hunt mushrooms is now a dense area of wild willow trees. Even our house has been torn down and a new modern home sits in its place. Nothing reminds me of home except the barn my dad built and was so proud of and it has not had the TLC that my dad gave it. Time can change all things.

While I was planting potatoes I was trying to think what I could give for the recipe this time and something potato came to mind. I found this recipe for German Potato salad in a recipe booklet that Treva had made for Kendra to give me for a Christmas gift many years ago. It is all hand written and one of those gifts that is very special to me. The potato salad is guite good.

6 cups hot diced potatoes, 9 slices of bacon diced, 1/2 cup vinegar, 1 tablespoon vinegar, 1 1/2 tablespoon mustard, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, 1/2 cup diced onion, 3 tablespoon bacon drippings, 1 tablespoon flour, 3/4 cup boiling water, 1 cup sour cream, salt and pepper to taste.








#### **EXPO** A SUCCESS
