## PROPERTY TAX NOTES

Property Taxes will be due for the 2nd installment on Tuesday, November 12th. The actual deadline is November 10th, however, due to the Veteran's Holiday the Courthouse will be closed November 11th. Therefore, the payment deadline is extended to the next day of business - November 12th.

Taxes can be paid at any bank in Huntington County or at the Treasurer's Office, Room 104, Court House. The hours for the Treasurer's Office are 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday thru Friday. For the public's convenience, the Treasurer's Office will be open Saturday, November 2nd, to pay taxes from 8 a.m. to noon.

If you wish to pay by credit card, you may call 1-800-272-9829 up to midnight on November 12th. You will need to use Huntington County's jurisdiction Code 2421. Please have your tax bills ready, as you will be prompted to enter in each tax parcel number and the amount you are paying. Make sure you write down the confirmation number that your payment has been receipted into the system. Credit cards are not accepted at the Treasurer's Office.

Payments can also be mailed to the County Treasurer's Office. If paying by mail, include a stamped self-addressed envelope for the return of your paid receipts. Payments must be postmarked by 11/ 12/2002. Penalty of 10% applies after the deadline.

## BE SAFE BE SEEN

Crime Prevention Coalition Offers Tips To Trick-or-Treaters

'Be safe, be seen this Halloween" should be the attitude of Indiana youngsters and parents, says the Indiana Crime Prevention Coalition.

As young families gear-up for their annual ghoulish trek to neighbors' homes for treats, it's important parents and guardians insist specific safety rules are followed, says Col. Scott Minier, ICPC's executive director:

- 1. Go with a grown-up or in a group.
- 2. Try to trick-or-treat early while still light outside.
- 3. Wear a costume that makes it easier to walk, see, hear and be seen
- 4. If youngsters and chaperones are out after dark, make sure costumes are light in color.
- 5. Use reflective tape to enhance costumes and be seen more easily
- 6. Carry a flashlight, reflective bag or glowstick.
- 7. Consider makeup instead of a mask.
- 8. Cross only at corner never between parked vehicles midblock.
- 9. Trick-or-treat in your own neighborhood. Agree what streets and homes will be visited and set boundaries.
- 10. If streets have no sidewalks,avoid them or walk facing traffic.11. Adults should check all treats
- 11. Adults should check all treats closely and report anything suspicious to police immediately.

"Early dusk, fallen leaves and seasonal drizzles can make Indiana streets unsafe on any given fall evening," Minier said. "Add to that nearly one-half million, excited Hoosier youngsters clad in costumes that often block their vision while hurrying to strangers' doors in areas they sometimes are unfamiliar - and you have tragedies waiting to happen. By following these hard-learned lessons, Halloween can be memorable for all the right reasons.



## GEMMER PARK OPEN HOUSE

Huntington County Baseball, Inc. presents "Take Me Out To The Ballpark", an OPEN HOUSE for the New Gemmer Park located on Evergreen Road off of Waterworks Road. The public is invited to see the progress of the new ballpark this Sunday, October 27 from 2 pm to 4 pm. Bricks will be for sale during the event to help fund the project. Free hotdogs and refreshments will be served.

The Gemmer Park-Vision 2000 project was designed to relocate the current 10-acre facility to a much larger 33-acre complex. By doing so, Huntington County Baseball, Inc. will soon be able to expand their current youth baseball programs.

The current ballpark was constructed in 1963 and could not be economically upgraded to meet the current standards or requirements. The concession stand is poorly located and a lack of adequate restroom facilities forced the corporation to lease portable restrooms during activities, which were less than desirable during summer months. Current diamond lighting and parking facilities are also substandard.

The New Gemmer Field-Vision 2000 project entails four new diamonds that will surround a central building. Two diamonds will be used for the Pee Wee Reese league (ages 11-12), Sandy Koufax league (ages 13-14), and the Mickey Mantle league (ages 15-16). The remaining two diamonds will be used by the T-ball league (ages 5-6), Roberto Clemente league (ages 7-8), and the Willie Mays league (ages 9-10). Two additional diamonds for further expansion may also be added as future funding permits.

Funding for the project has primarily been received through community grants, in-kind support, and corporate/individual contributions. The original plan was to open the ballpark this year, but completion of the project has been slowed down because of Indiana's financial crises. \$93,000 that was promised and approved in Build Indiana money is currently frozen and the committee is seeking funds to finish the Vision 2000 project for it's new grand Opening date in 2004.

#### HALLOWEEN COLLECTIBLES RISE IN VALUE

It's scary. Tacky Halloween decorations you've been throwing out for decades are worth money. Many collectors are spending hundreds or thousands of dollars for antique jack-o'-lanterns, party favors, postcards, toys, and decorations.

Prices are going nowhere but up, according to Skinner, Inc., a Boston auction house that includes Halloween items in its toys and dolls

New Halloween collectibles also are a booming business. Halloween has become a marketing monster. In the 1980s concerns about the safety of trick-or-treaters prompted more parents to go along. They liked it so much that the holiday is now a \$2.5 billion industry.

Why the fascination with Halloween? Some say it's because of parents' fond childhood memories. Others say it's because of children's books boosting Halloween's popularity. Whatever the case, Halloween mania is growing

## How worried should you be about TRICK-OR-TREATING?

With multiple child abductions reported during the summer, parents might think child abduction by strangers is more common than it is.

According to national crime statistics, 3,200 and 4,600 successful non-family abductions occur during a year. In a country of 285 million people, this is a very small number.

Still Halloween remains a holiday when children may be especially at risk since they are supposed to do exactly what parents tell them not to take candy from strangers.

Supervision is crucial, police say. In small, isolated neighborhoods, parents can establish a trick-or-treat time and all adults can watch the street during that time. In urban neighborhoods, parents can take their children to public Halloween parties.

All children, even as old as 16- or 17-years-old, should be cautioned to stay in their own neighborhood to trick-or-treat. Here are some other tips from law enforcement:

- Adults do not need directions from children or teenagers. They do not need help of any kind. If anyone asks for their help, young children should run home.
- Young children and teenagers should never approach a car.
- · Never speak to an adult whose name they do not know.
- · Never enter the house of a teenager or adult.
- · Never accept candy, or a gift, from an adult or a teenager. Check these Halloween safety tips

It used to be that parents costumed their kids and just sent them out to beg for Halloween treats. For better or worse, those days are gone. Today, no child under age 13 should make the rounds unless accompanied by an adult.

Cautions for kids

- · Stay outside houses. Never go in.
- Walk on sidewalks, not in the street.
- · Cross at corners, not in the middle of the blocks.
- · Visit only those homes that have a porch light on.
- Follow the route you and your parents have agreed on.
- Be cautious when you encounter strange animals or strange people.
  - · Don't eat anything until parents examine it.

Cautions for parents

- · Let kids draw faces on pumpkins, but don't let them carve with a
- · Place pumpkins with a lighted candle inside on a table away from flammable objects like curtains.
  - Use makeup rather than a mask, so vision is not obstructed.
- Put reflective tape and patches on costumes to make kids more visible.
- Provide a flashlight for dark areas.

## WINDOWS COMPUTER TIPS

Move or Copy Files to Subfolders You can use Windows Explorer in Windows XP to move or copy a file by dragging the file icon to a folder. When you have Folders displayed on the left side of the window, it's easy to drag a file to a different folder.

If the folder you want isn't visible

because the folder it's in is not expanded, here's a trick that will save you time and frustration. Drag the file icon to the collapsed (unexpanded) folder, and hold it there for a few seconds. The folder automatically expands and then you can drop the file into the folder you want.

The consumer is asked to call a number 1-800-233-9985 with a secret code to claim their prize. The consumer is asked to come to the office at 2825 Dupont Road. The consumer has to sit through a ninety-minute presentation on purchasing time-shares.

The consumer must then pay \$230 to claim their vacation. The company that redeems these vacations (National Redemption Center) has an unsatisfactory record with the BBB of San Diego due to failure to deliver the promised product or service.

The BBB of Northeastern Indiana recently gave GLOBAL SER-VICES an unsatisfactory rating due to unanswered complaints.

The BBB urges consumers to be cautious when dealing with Global Services.

## Mosquitoes Beware

With all the fears about West Nile Virus – here are a few handy tidbits that were emailed to me – some I've tried and know they work and others I don't know about.

· Use Bounce Fabric Softener Sheets...Best thing ever used in Louisiana..just wipe on & go...Great for Babies

· Bob, a fisherman, takes one vitamin B-1 tablet a day April through October. He said it works. He was right. The odor the tablet gives out through your skin (YOU cannot smell it) repels mosquitoes, black flies, no seeum's, and knat's. It does not work on stinging insects. Hasn't had a mosquito bite in 33 years. Try it. Every one he has talked into trying it works on them. Vitamin B-1( Thiamine Hydrochloride 100 mg.)

Kenn said NPR reports that if you eat bananas, the mosquitoes like you, something about the banana oil as your body processes it. (Maybe they need the potassium too) Stop eating bananas for the summer and the mosquitoes will be much less interested.

This is going to floor you, but one of the best insect repellents someone found (who is in the woods every day), is Vick's Vaporub.

· Plant marigolds around the yard, the flowers give off a smell that bugs do not like, so plant some in that garden also to help ward off bugs without using insecticides.

"Tough guy" Marines who spend a great deal of time "camping out" say that the very best mosquito repellant you can use is Avon Skin-So-Soft bath oil mixed about half and half with alcohol.

Mix your own: 20 drops Eucalyptus oil, 20 drops Cedarwood oil, 10 drops Tea Tree oil, 10 drops Geranium oil, 2 oz. carrier oil (such as Jojoba) Mix together in a 4 oz. container. Apply to skin as needed avoiding the eye area. Keep out of reach of children. Test on a small area of skin for sensitivities Experiment with different percentages of essential oil.

One of the best natural insect repellants that I've discovered is made from the clear real vanilla (not the grocery store vanilla extract which is mostly alcohol). This is the pure vanilla that is sold in Mexico. It's cheap there if you know of someone that lives there

or in the US close to the border. If not, health food stores usually carry it or can order it for you. I use it half vanilla and half water and find that it works great for mosquitoes and ticks, don't know about other insects.

· When all else fails—get a frog. (Editors Note: Let me know if you have any other home remedies – we'll keep them in mind for next summer.)






