## Blood/Platelet Drive

Did you know there's more than one way to give the gift of life? You can donate whole blood, platelet pheresis and double red cells.
Unlike traditional whole blood donations, which are sent to the laboratory for separation into components, the double red cell donation process separates your blood into its components as it is being drawn.
An immediate benefit is that you should find the donation experience more comfortable. Your plasma, which contains vitamins, minerals and nutrients in your blood, is returned to you during the donation process, along with a small amount of saline solution. You usually leave the American Red Cross blood drive or donor center more hydrated than you would normally be after a whole blood donation. Double red cell donation may also fit into your schedule better. Because you are donating two units of red cells, you must wait 16 weeks, or 112 days, between donations.

There are specific donor requirements for double red cell donation. You must be 18 years of age or older. Males must weight at least 150 pounds and stand at least 5'1" tall. Females must weigh at least 175 pounds and stand at least 5'5"tall. Please ask if double red cell donation is available at your local blood drive or donor center.

Regardless of whether or not you give through double red cell donation, your gift of blood is needed! You can help boost the summer blood supply by donating blood at one of the following blood drives:
Friday, June 20, from 9:30 a.m. until 1:30 p.m. at Parkview Huntington Hospital located at 2001 Stults Road in Huntington. Please call 356-3000 to schedule yourblooddonation appointment. Thursday, June 26, from 11 a.m. until 3 p.m. at Knight -Bergman Center located at 132 S. Nancy St. in Warren.
All presenting donors in the month of June will have the opportunity to enter into a regionwide drawing for a grill package worth $\$ 1,250$.
If you are at least 17 years of age, weigh a minimum of 110 pounds and are in good general health, you may be eligible to donate blood. All donors need to present positive identification. For more information or to schedule your blood donation appointment, call 1-800-GIVE-LIFE (1-800-4483543).

## Drainage 101

The Uptown Gardener
by Ruth Xerring Remember when we were complaining about the cold weather, wishing it was warmer? Well now are we complaining about being to warm? I grumble a bit but not too much
This hot steamy weather is really makingthegardengrow, including weeds. I have some nice Chinese cabbage or sometimes called Michilli. It has a flavor of half cabbage and lettuce. Good for salads or eating fresh. May take some to the farmers market.
I planted a new variety of pea pods this year and the blooms were so pretty I wanted to pick them for a bouquet, but chose not to. They were deep lavender and pink, very pretty.
The rest of the garden is coming along nice although I had to replant some of the green beans. I think our pet squirrels had a feast on the seeds. Idug down in the rowto see if the seeds germinated and found in their place peanut shells. I guess that is the price you pay for being kind to our critters. If they only knew that seed cost money more than the lousy peanuts.
I have been picking strawberries and they are really nice. I have made two pies already and getting ready to make strawberry jam.

I rememberlong ago when Iwould help my dad planting the field near Loon Creek on our property, along the edge ofthe field was a patch of wild strawberries and they were nice size for wild ones. I would take a container along and pick until I was needed to help dad. They were so good and sweet, it took a lot to make enough for our family dessert, but it was worth it. Actually it was a special treat because we usually did not buy fresh fruit if we could growit. Those days you did not find strawberries in the stores year around like we do today.
I have been busy getting things ready for the farmers market and also the quilt show that will be during the festival. This is going to be a busy summer.
I will share with you how I make my strawberry pie. I use either a prepared pie crust or make a graham cracker crust. I clean the berries and eitherleave themwhole or cut them in half. I make a syrup of $1 / 2$ cup sugar, 1 tablespoon cornstarch, 1 cup water, and 1 tablespoonwhite corn syrup. Cook this till it thickens and add 2 tablespoon strawberry Jello and stir in well. Let cool and pour over the berries and gently mix well. Pour into the pie shell and let cool. Serve with cool whip or better yet good fresh whipped cream or ice cream.
