On Wednesday evening, May 21, the Van Buren Town Council met in the Council Room at Town Hall. President Tony Manry opened the meeting at 7 p.m. with all in attendance repeating the Pledge to the American Flag. Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as submitted.

At the former meeting the local Fire Department had requested permission to hold a Tractor Pull during the Popcorn Festival. A decision was delayed in order for Council to check on insurance liabilities. At Wednesday's meeting it was decided that due to high cost of insurance they would not allow the Tractor Pull to be held on town owned property. Also it was believed the area was not a good place for the event.

President Manry presented Council members a copy of a Golf Cart Ordinance to study. A decision will be made at a later date.

Officer Pat Collins gave the Police report. He was asked to update the list of abandoned vehicles.

Superintendent Jim Webb reported on progress in cleaning and maintaining the North water tower

He reported the Town Clean-up went well.



He also announced and demonstrated the new myBMV online portal, which allows customers to create a personalized myBMV online account and reduce the need to visit, mail or call the BMV for help. MyBMV also allows customers, for the first time, to receive a reminder from the BMV that their driver's licenses are about to expire, one of 10 new services added to the popular online license plate renewal option that has been available for many years. To date, more than 36,200 customers have opened a myBMV account, according to

"To date, more than 695,000 satisfied Hoosiers have completed their registrations online this year, and in the process, saved over \$3.4 million dollars through a \$5 discount," said Stiver. "We are pleased to now expand our online offering to include 10 new BMV services that, together with registration renewals, account for over seven million BMV transactions annually. These new online services should further improve customer convenience and reduce branch visit times."

In the coming months, customers will also be able to select a different license plate research design and requirements for driver's license reinstatement online. Although driver's license renewal is the most requested online service, and available in 25 other states, Indiana law currently prohibits this service. The BMV sought that authority in the last session of the General Assembly and plans to seek approval again in the 2009 legislative session.

In addition, more than 18,000 customers (on average) contact the BMV each week to inquire about a variety of issues ranging from checking the status of a title request or online license plate renewal to requesting a copy of a driving record or a duplicate title. With a myBMV account, many of these customers can receive the information or service they need in a fraction of the time it currently takes to process such a request.

Setting up a myBMV account to access online services takes only a few minutes and requires an Indiana driver's license or an identification card number and a Social Security number. For those transactions that require fees, the fees are the same as in a license branch (with the exception of online registration renewals) and can be paid online using VISA or MasterCard.




