## Kudos, Kicks & Karats



I know it's not even Halloween yet, but I have been busy thinking about my holiday trays that I had out every year.

I usually just send to our workplaces and Kendras' workplace. Then have plenty to eat and take to different functions. So this week I'll start the recipe box off with one that I did take to State Fair with. It didn't place but is still a good cookie to enjoy with a good cup of hot chocolate.

#### **AMISH SUGAR COOKIES**

1 c. Butter1 tsp vanilla1 c. Veg. Oil4 1/2 c flour1 c sugar1 tsp baking soda1 c. Powdered sugar1 tsp. Cream of tartar

2 lg eggs room temperature

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. In a large bowl, beat the butter, oil, and both sugars. Beat in eggs until well mixed. Beat in vanilla. Combine the flour, soda and cream of tartar and add gradually to creamed mixture. Drop by small teaspoonful onto ungreased baking sheets. Add sprinkles or sugar to dough and bake until lightly browned approx. 8 to 10 minutes. Remove to cooling rack to cool.

I had a question about how do you keep your cookies perfectly round and all the same size. Well the answer is easy. I use a cookie scoop. You can find them in just about any store. It is a spring loaded gadget that you can scoop the dough, level it against the bowl and squeeze the lever and out pops the dough right on to the cookie sheet. Walmart has them but I got mine at Gordon food service in Fort Wayne and if you go there it's the purple handled one, but expect to pay a pretty penny there, so stick with Walmart it's just as good. Have a great week.

Parkview oncologists support recommendation to start regular screening at age 40

> In an effort to catch more cancer cases emerging in younger women, the U.S. Society. 


