Indiana policy employers can glean more information about the quality of care their employees receive and strengthen their decision making about benefit design and network optimization for Additionally, employees. researchers and policy makers can study healthcare utilization

and cost trends by service type and location across the state. Improving healthcare price transparency has been a

priority for Governor Holcomb. The Indiana APCD was part of Governor Holcomb's Next Level Agenda and authorized by the Indiana General Assembly.

STOP FOR BUSES

As students head back to the classroom, state and local law enforcement agencies are reminding motorists to be on the lookout for school bus stop arms. As school begins, officers will be increasing patrols to prevent stop-arm violations, speeding, and reckless driving around school buses and school zones.

The patrols are part of the Stop Arm Violation Enforcement campaign - better known as SAVE. These patrols are funded by the National Safety Highway Traffic Administration (NHTSA) through grants administered by the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI).

Despite thousands of motorists being cited under the SAVE program, unsafe driving around school buses continues to be a serious danger to children, according to the National Association of State Pupil Directors of Transportation Services (NASDPTS).

In April, thousands of bus drivers who participated in a one-day observational survey counted 1,574 stop-arm violations in Indiana. Projected across a 180-day school year, this survey data points to a potential 283,320 violations throughout the school year.

The data comes from the NASDPTS annual survey, which is managed by the Indiana Department of Education for the state of Indiana. This year, data collection took place on April 23, with 4,910 bus drivers participating.

"There is no excuse for drivers to put the lives of students in danger," said ICJI Traffic Safety Director James Bryan. "Drivers need to exercise caution

around school buses and follow slowing down, using extra all traffic statutes."

For each jurisdiction, officers will coordinate with local bus and drivers school transportation officials, with efforts concentrating in the morning and afternoon hours. Agencies will also be working to raise awareness about the importance of school bus safety and following the law.

Drivers should slow down and prepare to stop when the overhead lights on a school bus are flashing yellow. Once the lights turn red and the stop arm extends, drivers are required to stop on all roads with only one exception. On highways divided by a physical barrier, such as a concrete wall or grassy median, only vehicles traveling in the same direction as the school bus are required to stop in these circumstances.

Motorists should also be mindful of posted speed limits, avoid distractions, and watch for children in, or near, school and residential areas. Planning ahead and allowing for extra time during each commute will help keep all road users safe.

Ask Rusty – Does Congress Pay Into Social Security?

Dear Rusty: I've been told that members of Congress do not have Social Security deducted from their pay; Additionally, that their retirement dollars come from the Social Security Administration purse even if they only serve as a member of Congress for a short number of terms. Also, if this is true, are there other individuals that enjoy these advantages?

Thank you in advance for your service as a Social Security Advisor.

Dear Concerned Senior: I'm afraid this is one of those 'urban legend" kind of rumors that just seems to keep popping up, especially when the issues surrounding Social Security's financial problems come up. In addition to being untrue, it often is used to display the public's animosity toward elected officials and the feeling other that Congress—and elected officials-are above the fray, so to speak, and therefore not affected by the implications of Social Security's looming insolvency problem.

CSRS provided a pension for federal employees, so they were exempted from contributing to or collecting from the new Social Security program.

> In 1987, then, the federal government officially changed over to FERS - the Federal Employee Retirement System and all employees hired from that point forward are now covered under FERS. There are multiple parts to FERS, and one of them is mandatory FICA contributions. So, all federal employees-including

> members of Congress—are subject to the 6.2% FICA tax, are eligible for Social Security retirement benefits, and are governed by the multitude of rules and regulations associated with Social Security. But other than standard SS benefits which they may normally be entitled, no Social Security funds are used supplement to Congressional retirement.

In other words, the rumor that Congress didn't pay into Social Security was actually true prior to 1984, but today it is a misstatement of fact. And the federal employee retirement plans (both the prior CSRS plan and the current FERS plan) are totally independent of Social

EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT BORROWING MONEY FOR COLLEGE

(StatePoint) College-related costs are at an all-time high, and while many parents harbor concerns about the expense, they value the education their child is receiving.

That's according to the April 2024 College Ave survey. The survey found that while 89% of parents of four-year college students believe a college degree is important for their child's future, 78% agree that paying for college is stressful.

"Families today are relying on a mix of sources to fund college, including scholarships, federal aid and grants, income and savings, and in some cases, private student loans," says Colatriano, chief Angela marketing officer, College Ave.

According to Colatriano, it's critical to understand the ins and outs of borrowing for college before taking out a loan. If you believe your family will take this path, here's everything you need to know:

1. Exhaust other options. Many experts agree that private loans only make sense once other financial aid options are exhausted. If you decide that a private student loan or private parent loan is also right for your borrow only the save over the life of the loan. This is a good time to explore additional avenues for reducing your financing needs, such as groceries versus paying into the school meal plan.

3. Understand loan costs. Unlike federal loans, which have fixed interest rates for all borrowers, private student loans offer a choice of fixed or variable interest rates. Shop around for a lender that doesn't charge origination fees, and learn the difference between fixed and variable Use interest rates. 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After a mistake has been made, the first priority is dealing with the immediate consequences and limiting damage. For example, when a sailor's boat is damaged in a storm, leaks must be plugged immediately before any other repairs are made.

Recovering from mistakes requires an open mind and flexibility. You have to take a step back so that you can keep things in perspective while looking at the big picture. Make a list of all possible strategies. Then go through your list and prioritize. Be willing to change direction if needed.

If you don't know what you should do next, seek out those who have successfully recovered from similar mistakes. People who have not had this experience may provide you with faulty advice.

Keep a positive, can-do attitude. If you tell your mind there's no hope, there is virtually no chance for you to recover from your mistake. The right mindset is essential for you to move forward successfully.

Once you have determined the appropriate course of action, take action. Nothing happens until you do something. Wishing and hoping alone are ineffective. Your first priority is to limit further damages or negative consequences. Your second priority is to repair any damage that has already occurred.

Once things are under control, you'll have time to determine what went wrong and why. You certainly don't want to repeat the same mistake. The only way to avoid this is through a thorough understanding of the root cause along with a determination to make any necessary changes.

Don't get disheartened by your mistakes. They are an excellent learning opportunity. The sting of even your worst mistakes fades with time. Study other successful people and analyze what they do to recover from their mistakes.

Here's how you recover from mistakes in a nutshell. Recognize when you make a mistake. Take responsibility for the mistake. Immediately take action to limit additional damage. Repair any damage that has occurred. Make changes to prevent the same mistake from recurring. Mistakes are part of life but you can recover from them.
