THE UPTOWN GARDENER

This week has really been very busy with the festival and my involvement with it.

I think the garden is still out there but have been too tired to even think about it. I am sure there are beans ready to pick, some sugar snap peas and that will be the last of them. I may try planting some for fall but need to check if I had seed left.

Have tried keeping the rose bushes dead headed and also the geraniums. Of course the weeds and what dad always called sour clover are doing a super job. Sour clover is the small leafed low growing with a small yellow bloom. Seems it really likes growing at our place.

Some of the flower beds I am thinking of tearing out and putting in new shrubs and mulch where it seems to be growing very prolific. Just too much to keep up with anymore.

We lost another tree in the wind storm. It was an early harvest apple of which I am not fond of that particular variety. Best thing it is good for is a pollinator and apple sauce. Last year it was our pecan tree. It is beginning to branch out but only on one side and I say we need to have a turkey head carved into the tree and the branches will make it look like the feathers.

There was, at the Peddlers Corner craft mall, a vendor that had fabric and quilting related items. She had this great cook book that I bought and with each recipe it has a quilt pattern. I will surely enjoy this as the recipes are chocolate desserts. Here is one that I will share with you although, I have not yet tried it but will make a nice summer dessert.

Banana-Split Ice Cream Pie

1 package (4 or 5 ounce) rolled sugarice cream cones (they are the brown ones) broken 1/4 cup sugar 1/2 cup butter melted 1 pint chocolate ice cream 1 medium banana finely chopped 1 pint strawberry ice cream 8 ounces crushed pineapple drained well.

For the crust, in food processor combine the cones and sugar process till fine add the melted butter and process until combined well. Press crumb mixture into a 10 inch pie pan or a 9 inch spring form pan pressing up the sides about 1 1/2 inches. Set aside.

For the filling, in a bowl soften the chocolate ice cream and when pliable stir in banana and spoon mixture over the crust evenly, freeze until solid. Soften the strawberry ice cream the same way and add the pineapple and spoon over the chocolate mixture. Freeze about 6 to 24 hours. To serve top with dessert topping garnish with maraschino cherries, drizzle with fudge topping and sprinkle with

Takes a while to make but can easily be made ahead for a nice summer dessert. Will make about 10 servings. Enjoy!

I have sinus problems and my upper teeth ache. Should I see my physician or dentist? We hear that a great deal and especially in Indiana. Sometimes dental and sinus problems can be hard to tell apart. For instance, infection of upper molars can spread to create a sinus infection: conversely, a sinus infection can cause pain in the area of the upper molars because roots (nerves) are close in the sinus.

A chronic sinus condition may be caused by an anatomical flaw in the sinus, by allergens in our environment, like mold or pollen, or by untreated tooth infection and other factors. Smoking and TMJ problems can also cause sinus conditions. A dental exam, often including x-rays, can help determine if the problem is tooth related or not. One tip is to keep track of your discomfort you are having. This will help the doctor determine the source of the problem. Whether you visit your physician or your dentist, the important thing is that you see someone to be evaluated.

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

There will be no Council meeting July 16. The next Council meeting will be Aug. 6.




