Recently, I was the first to arrive on the scene of a very bad car accident at the corner of 900 & SR 5 here in Warren. It appeared to be a head-on with one car in the middle of the intersection and the other out in the field. The car in the intersection had its driver trapped behind the wheel losing consciousness and the car in the field with the driver also still behind wheel in obvious pain. There was extensive damage to both vehicles.

Within a VERY few minutes, the first responders were on sight! The Warren Volunteer Fire Department along with Police Officer Dennis Spittler were in action. Observing this team of heroes work was nothing short of breathtaking. The WVFD worked like a fine oiled machine in assessing the situation. With precision teamwork, I watched Shane Wright, Scott Canady, Noel Elzroth, Ty Surfus and others, under the leadership of Chief Lee Poulson, free this man from the mangled car he had been driving and place him on the gurney to transport to the hospital by the EMT's. The EMT's provided much needed care for the drivers of both vehicles, while the drivers awaited extraction.

This experience moved me to write this letter to say thank you to all those listed above and all of the Police, VOLUNTEER Firemen, and EMT's who do so much and are not given the Due they deserve. You ALL are True Unsung Heroes! The Warren Community is very blessed by the work you all do! When you see one of these heroes on the street, tell them "Thanks"! They deserve every bit of encouragement and support we can give. I continue to hold you all in prayer.

**THIS IS THE DAY
MARCH 11, 2016**

Few historical events are remembered for never having occurred.

However, seven hundred and fourteen years ago on March 11, 1302, the date set for their nuptials, Romeo and Juliet did not get married. Paralleling

the analogy in the Biblical book Song of Solomon, some literary experts now detect, in Shakespeare's all-time most famous play, counterparts equal to a Christian parable. To understand this exceptional analysis one must realize that, according to these same scholars, Shakespeare was a closet Catholic during an era when the English oppressed Catholicism. Thus, they maintain, he was expounding on his faith through the use of the ancient analogy.

For the sake of argument, simply note that much of Romeo and Juliet concerns itself with a battle between

the responsibilities demanded by social institutions (arranged marriages) and the private beliefs of individuals (romantic love), and it was for the sake of love both Romeo and Juliet resisted their families, friends and social expectations.

Did Shakespeare have in mind the scene of Jesus' reply to His family when they tried to convince Him to return home with them, "... those who do the will of my Father are my mother and brothers," when Juliet said to Romeo, "Defy thy father and refuse

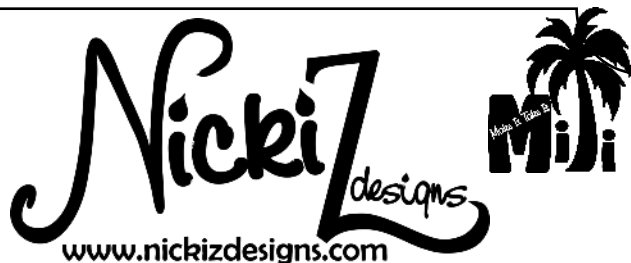

thy name... and I'll no longer be a Capulet."?

Particularly note that the romantic love in Romeo and Juliet is not the sappy, dainty love of modern movies. Rather, it is an overwhelming experience that propels one against their world sometimes even, like Saul on the Damascus road, converts them from their own values and prejudices.

Moreover, this love, as promoted in the play, displays a relationship with death. The inner struggle for the devotee in which the love one has in his or her heart coerces them closer to violence not away

from it, just as the overpowering love Jesus had for humanity drove Him to the cross when it would have been so easy for Him to have simply walked away.

Taking the thought to the next spiritual comparison, Juliet understood her death as the only way in which their love could be realized, so Shakespeare had her say while brandishing a knife in front of Friar Lawrence, "If all else fails, myself have the power to die." Some scholars see a strong reflection in this scene with Jesus' words, "I am the Good Shepherd, I lay down my life for my sheep; no one takes it from me, but I lay it down."

Perhaps one of the most easily distinguishable element of the analogy is derived from the most often quoted lines. We all remember love-sick Romeo in the balcony scene, "What light through yonder window breaks? It is the east, and Juliet is the sun. Arise, fair sun, and kill the envious moon..."

A repeated theme throughout the play is the contrast of light and darkness which is also a motif through the New Testament, especially the Gospel of John. You may recall how when speaking of Christ John writes, "The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it." He also describes Jesus as the Light of the World, and of His mission the Gospel writer makes the point, "We must work the works of Him Who sent me while it is day; night comes when no one can work." There are other similar dark/light allusions, but one can easily appreciate the possibility that Shakespeare

was using his considerable talents to promote the gospel. I am not a literary scholar nor am I personally convinced of Shakespeare's attempt to surreptitiously convey the gospel. But I do find it encouraging that individuals of all genre of life find spiritual truths in the most unexpected places.
