Oft times in the winter, the seat was covered with snow 'twas then with much reluctance to the little house you'd go.

With a swish you would clear the seat, bend low with a dreadful frown, you'd grit your teeth as you finally set down. I recall the day my Granddad who stayed with us one summer, made a trip to the little house which proved to be a bummer. 'Twas the same my Dad finished painting the kitchen green he just cleaned up the mess he'd made with rags and gasoline.

He tossed the rags in the shanty hole and went his usual way, not knowing that by doing so he would eventually ruin the day. Now Granddad had an urgent call, I never will forget, this trip he made to the little house lingers on my memory yet.

He sat down on the largest seat with both feet on the floor, then filled his pipe with tobacco, struck the match on the outhouse door.

After the tobacco glowed a cherry red, he slowly leaned aside, and tossed the flaming match in the open hole and settled back with pride.

The blast that followed I am sure was heard for miles around and there was poor ole Granddad just lying on the ground.

The smoldering pipe was still in his mouth his suspenders he held tight, the celebrated three holer was blown out of sight. When we ask him what happened, his answer I will not forget, he thought it must been something that he recently et!

Next day we had a new one which my Dad built with ease, with a sign on the entrance door which read NO SMOKING PLEASE! Now that is the end of the story with memories of long ago of the little house behind the house where we went cause we had to go.

March 16 in Greenwood, Ind., and brings with it a purpose – one they want to share with the nation.

Each night, the bands will present service opportunities through Compassion International, an international child sponsorship program, and Love Can't Be Baht, an organization that brings awareness to human trafficking. They will also invite local service agencies to present at each venue.

"The whole goal is for students to be aware of different opportunities where they can serve," said Attaboy guitarist and HU graduate Jeff Edgel. "If nothing else, we want to get exposure to these different opportunities."

"The concept behind 'The Everything Matters Tour' stemmed from our song, 'Everything Matters.' We live in an era where meaning is hard to come by and lots of things are taken for granted. Our hope is to encourage people through song and opportunity that everything we do and every choice we make really does have a lasting impact," said HU graduate and vocalist Matt Siewert. "At the very least, if we get to the end of this tour and have people re-evaluating how they relate to others or allocate their resources or spend their time, then I think we will have accomplished something valuable."

Attaboy got its start in the

halls of Huntington University, playing chapels and Spring Break concerts, but soon after, the band exploded with three CD releases, five tours and a song on the Billboard's Christian CHR Top 30 chart.

"Without question, I can say my time at Huntington has shaped who I am both personally and spiritually," Edgel said. "It has shaped who I am today."

Robert Van Camp learned how to shave and cut hair under the instructions of James Wilmore, who had a barber shop in one of the three rooms that made up the Contesse block. It was in 1890 that he started a shop in the south room of the same building, but he was not there long until he sold the shop to Charles and Bert Buffington and went to Markle.

In 1894, Robert came back to Warren and bought the Rogers and McMichaels fixtures. The next year he formed a partnership with William Stewart and moved their shop to the building that was torn down in front of where P.J. Flower shop is now. The partnership lasted almost twenty years and terminated with the death of Mr. Stewart.

Mr. Van Camp went it alone, for nine years, until 1924, when he suffered a hemorrhage and had to quit. After several months, he was able to go back to work and took a chair in Ed Bilbee's shop. The shop had three different owners, but Bob stayed through all the changes. In the late 30's, the law was passed that barbers had to get a license to operate. On the day before the law took effect, Mr. Van Camp worked his eight hours and at the end of his shift he picked up his razor and scissors and walked out ended almost fifty years of barbering.

KNOW THE RISKS OF TYPE 2

DIABETES

(ARA) – Sometimes even a good diet and a healthy exercise program just can't combat the power of genetics.

As Ray Santiago of Long Island, N.Y., found out, type 2 diabetes can strike anyone.

This year, Diabetes Alert Day marks the beginning of the "Join the Million Challenge," which runs through April 22, and the association will be rallying 1 million people to join in and take the Diabetes Risk Test. This test shows users whether they are at low, moderate or high risk for type 2 diabetes. If an individual is at high risk, he or she is encouraged to talk with their health care provider.
