RECIRCULATE SPARE

CHANGE

The U.S. Mint is asking for help from the public to recirculate coins – pennies, nickels, dimes and quarters. While there is an adequate supply of coins currently in the economy, the COVID-19 pandemic has affected the

pace of circulation, resulting in a nationwide slowdown.

The public can help recirculate coins by: (1) paying with exact change in retail establishments; (2) depositing coins in financial institutions or exchanging for currency; and (3) taking spare change to coin redemption kiosks available at many banks, grocery stores and other retail establishments.

The slowdown of coin circulation was caused by COVID-19 restrictions that went into place starting in March. Establishments where coins typically enter society such as retail shops, bank lobbies, transit authorities and laundromats were temporarily closed to traffic. During closures, coins that normally would have been received in change were not being circulated back into the system.

Additionally during the early phases of COVID-19, the U.S. Mint reduced production to enhance social distancing and mitigate exposure. Since mid-June, however, the Mint has been operating at full capacity and is now on track to produce 1.65 billion coins per month for the remainder of the year. By comparison, the Mint produced an average of 1 billion coins per month in 2019.

Newly minted coins account for less than 20% of coin orders, with 82% of orders filled with recirculated coins.

At the start of 2020, more than 4 billion coins were recirculated each month; those numbers dropped to less than 2 billion beginning in April. In late June, the U.S. Treasury reported an estimate that the total value of coins in circulation is \$47.8 billion.

"There is adequate coin supply in the economy, but the slowed pace of circulation means that sufficient coins may not be readily available where needed," said Amber R. Van Til, president and CEO of the Indiana Bankers Association. "We encourage Hoosiers to help get coins back into circulation by using exact change to purchase items, bringing in rolled coins to their banks, or depositing coins in coin-cashing machines."

AN ALASKAN & YUKON

TRIP - DAY # 8

The tour bus left Dawson City at 8 am. heading south towards Whitehorse on the Yukon Highway. It was announced that the 340 mile trip will take 8 hours. Much of this highway was rough travelling due to undulations and breakage caused by permafrost "heave," the melting and refreezing, winter activity. Many roads are gravel as they are easier and less costly to maintain due to the "heave" effect.

Much territorial information was dispensed and some absorbed during this long day trip. Such as, the population of the Yukon Territory is 37,000. Dawson City is located midway between the north and south borders of the territory. The Yukon is slightly larger than the state of California. The suggested

difference between a Canadian province and a Canadian territory is "finances."

We saw a red fox along the side of the road just south of Dawson. The area was mostly wilderness. Also just outside of our departing town we intersected Dempster Road which headed straight north from Klondike Road. That is the only road in the territory that traverses the Arctic Circle.

There are plans to extend it another 100 miles to the Beaufort Sea at Tuktoyaktuk in the Northwest Territory.

We passed Mount Logan, the tallest mountain in Canada. It is 1,000 feet shorter than Mt. Danali, but is growing upwards yearly. It is projected to surpass the latter in another 1,000 years.

My limited knowledge of geology tries to understand that 2-plate, tectonic forces collide and push one layer upwards with melted rock floating to the surface while the lower layer cools to form granite. That's enough schooling for one day. Oh, one more geological feature is the "Tintina Trench" which is a 450 kilometer, lineal valley that stretches into Alaska and southeast across the Yukon. It harbors a fault line under it, but is a wildlife corridor for now. I won't be camping there!

An interesting story was told by our young, female guide who tours in the

summer and bartends in Dawson in the winter. Joe Francis LaDoux from New York was not thought worthy, by her family, of marrying his sweetheart so he moved to Alaska during the gold rush.

Instead of panning for gold, he opened a hardware store and sold mining equipment instead, accumulated wealth, returned home, and married his sweetheart! Another smart, happy ending!

The bus stopped at Moose Creek Lodge for us to exercise our legs and lungs.

The population there was four adults and two dogs.

We crossed Steward River at the small community of Steward Crossing. Somebody put a lot of thought into that name decision! Its claim to fame is holding the distinction of having the highest, recorded temperature in the Yukon at 97 degrees Fahrenheit and the lowest at a minus 80 degrees F.

The bus crossed the Pelly River at Pelly Crossing.

Robert Campbell, an early inhabitant, created a trading post in this area. Very soon afterward the natives, who preferred to be called, First Nation People, chased him to the other side of the river because he was interfering with their established trade. Too much completion! Much of this area was marshy land.

We stopped for a buffet lunch at Minto on the banks of the Yukon River. Tried Bannock bread, a cornbread-color, moist, thick product and a chocolate/coconut item called a Nancimo Bar.

NEED HEADACHE RELIEF?

(BPT) - It can be easy to dismiss head pain as a regular headache, but in fact there is no such thing.

More than 300 types of headache exist and the likelihood you'll experience one in your lifetime is high. Worldwide nearly 40 million people have some form of headache disease.

"Each headache comes with its own set of symptoms and a different approach to treatment," said Dr. Vincent Martin, president of the National Headache Foundation and professor of Clinical Medicine, University of Cincinnati College of Medicine. "A physician trained in headache medicine is the best person to diagnose the type of headache you're experiencing but since symptoms usually come on gradually, you should record your symptoms and triggers over a few weeks."

The National Headache Foundation is sharing information on the four most common types of headache and the best treatments for relief.

1. Tension

What is it: Typically these originate in the neck or back of the head with muscle tension and creep forward. Tension headache can be triggered by poor posture, lack of movement, eye strain, stress and hunger. They can be chronic or infrequent.

Treatment: The occasional tension headache can be treated with nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs), such as aspirin or ibuprofen, as well as stretching and regular exercise. Chronic forms can be treated with amitriptyline or regular non-medication treatments including relaxation, developing coping strategies,

acupuncture, massage therapy and physical therapy.

2. Sinus

What is it: Common when you are sick or suffer from allergies, this type of headache is caused by inflammation in the sinus passage with pain usually presenting in the forehead, browbone, cheeks, eyes and nose. They are often accompanied by nasal congestion, sinus drainage or fever.

Treatment: Monitoring your allergies can play a major part in avoiding a sinus headache. When allergens are high, you can take an antihistamine. NSAIDs can also help relieve pressure by reducing the inflammation in your sinuses. If you're sick and suffering from a sinus headache, NSAIDs plus a decongestant can often be your best option. You may need your health care practitioner to prescribe an antibiotic if the sinus infection is caused by bacteria.

3. Cluster

What is it: People with cluster headache often describe the pain as relentless stabbing sensations and experience attacks several times throughout a day for weeks at a time. During a cluster headache series, the pain is always on the same side, usually around the eye, and can include nasal congestion, sinus drainage or a drooping eyelid. Research indicates they can be more active in the spring and fall due to the changes in daylight and disruption in the sleep cycle with the time change. Unfortunately, some people will experience chronic cluster headache.

Treatment: Preventive treatments are available for cluster headache once a person is in an attack series. During an acute attack, inhaling pure oxygen by mask is helpful.

4. Migraine

What is it: Migraine disease is believed to be due to a hypersensitive nervous system that results in debilitating and recurring attacks of pain that can be accompanied by nausea, vomiting, dizziness or sensitivity to light and sound. Some migraine attacks are preceded by disturbance in vision or smell, known as an aura. For some, other symptoms begin 24 to 48 hours before the attack and can range from dizziness and fatigue to mood swings or extreme hunger. Known triggers of migraine include stress, hormonal changes, certain foods (cheeses, chocolate, preservatives), and beverages (caffeine, alcohol).

Treatment: Maintaining a regular sleep schedule, not skipping meals and hydration can help prevent migraine attacks. Keeping a record of triggers can help you and your health care practitioner correctly diagnose and treat your migraine disease with lifestyle changes, prescription and over-the-counter medications, and non-drug therapies such as acupuncture, biofeedback training and relaxation therapy.

"The next time your head pain strikes, make note of the pain location, any potential triggers and have an honest conversation with your health care practitioner so they can help you get back to living your life," said Martin.

HOW TO HAVE A HAPPY AND HYDRATED KID

(BPT) - We're in the thick of the dog days of summer, and as the temperature continues to swelter, don't forget to start thinking about how to help keep your kids hydrated. Sounds easy, right? You might be surprised. According to the American

Journal of Public Health,* 1 in 2 kids is underhydrated.

The American Journal of Public Health notes that adequate hydration is essential for health and even mild dehydration can lead to headaches, irritability, poor physical performance and reduced cognitive function among both children and adults.

"Keeping your kids hydrated throughout a busy day is not always easy," noted Dr. Douglas J. Casa, hydration researcher for more than 25 years and CEO of the Korey Stringer Institute (KSI) at the University of Connecticut.

Not sure where to start? Here are a few ways you can help keep kids hydrated and happy:

Do a "pee check": Not sure if your kid is properly hydrated? A quick look at the color of their urine can help determine if they may need to hydrate. If their pee is dark yellow, Dr. Casa recommends reaching for a hydrating beverage that will help replenish the body. A pale yellow urine color indicates proper hydration (good job!).

Keep hydrating beverages at the ready: With at-home and on-the-go schedules looking a little different now, you may forget to keep drinks on hand throughout the day. Always stock hydrating, kid-approved beverages in your car, picnic cooler and fridge to ensure that a tasty hydration option is available.

Serve a better-for-you option: Instead of reaching for fruit juice or other sugar-laden beverages, try serving a plant-powered drink with all-natural ingredients. For example, Dr. Casa suggests one great option for

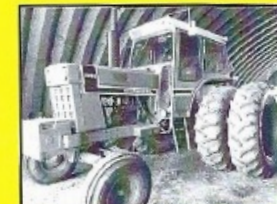
