In 2020 Citizens started a rural fiber optic project with the intent to get all of our current customers switched from copper DSL to a fiber optic service. The covid situation slowed us down some - affecting engineering and supply issues. those problems solved we intend to start back up with

construction as soon as the VALENTINE'S DAY weather allows . Our goal is to get our entire rural customer base switched over to the fiber service within 2 years. We currently have 98 miles of construction ahead of us. Alternately if you live within ¾ of a mile from one of our huts we have another product that can double the speed of our current service which can be deployed right now. 



John E. Hanlin, lifelong resident of Pennville, died on Jan. 31, 2021, in Sheridan,



Ind., where he was receiving care during an extended illness. He was 77.

John was born in Portland, IN. on July 23, 1943, the youngest of George and Edwina Hanlin's six children. He grew up at Balbec, north of Pennville, on the farm his family owned since the 1830s. 


