### TOMATO DISEASES ARE LIKELY THIS SUMMER

Tomato plants should be watched closely this summer to learn what diseases and/or disorders might be affecting them. The extremely wet weather has been a factor in disease development earlier than in a normal growing season for many local growers.

Some types of tomato plants including the popular "heirloom" varieties do not carry resistance genes to fungal diseases. Other disorders in the tomato fruit such as blossom end rot are sometimes confused with fungal diseases.

Early blight, Septoria leaf spot, Verticillium wilt or Fusarium wilt are all common fungal diseases which may cause part of the plant to wilt while leaving the rest healthy-at least initially. Many modern tomato varieties may be resistant to these diseases. A good source (from Iowa State University Extension) for pictures and descriptions of tomato diseases/disorders can be found https://store.extension.iastate.ed u/Product/Tomato-Diseases-and

Disorders. If you believe that your tomatoes have a fungal disease, treating the plants with a fungicide can oftentimes slow its progress. Per Dan Egel, Purdue Extension plant pathologist, probably the best path is to go to a garden center and find something with the active ingredient chlorothalonil. Applications of this product every 7 to 14 days should slow the dis-He also recommends trimming off lower leaves and getting them well away from the

There are tomato diseases which have very devastating impacts. For example, in 2009 late blight affected several home gardeners in the area. This devastating fungal disease was found in Huntington County as well as other nearby counties. At the time of this writing, late blight has not been documented in Indiana for

Plant samples can also be dropped off at the Huntington County Extension Office if you need assistance in identifying the problem with your tomato plants. It is also possible (for a small fee) to send the plants to the Plant and Pest Diagnostic Lab on the Purdue West Lafayette campus to confirm what disease is present.

This hot sticky weather means it is stay inside time so I figure no better time to do some closet and kitchen cupboards cleaning. It is better than

just sitting in front of the tv and really becoming bored. Also have been working on a quilting project that is a volunteer project that is needing to be dome before late fall. I do have a good start on it and has been a fun project.

I have been enjoying the green beans that are growing nicely in the flower bed also picked a nice yellow tomato, sure tasted good, still have enough of it left for a bacon tomato sandwich. I seen a neat thing on the food channel to make a bacon sandwich to cut pieces of bacon length desired and have 3 or 4 pieces laid straight and then same amount and weave them basket weave style and place them on a cookie sheet and bake them. It turned out a nice flat portion for a sandwich. Be great for a bacon tomato sandwich. Think I will try it.

I had a Stargazer lily in bloom and was really beautiful, they are one of my favorite flowers and a shame they don't last longer. This one had 4 blooms come out all at once and the blossoms were huge, the size of a dinner plate, couldn't believe how large they were and smelled so good. I took a picture and sent it to my sister in law in Texas and let her know it was definitely Texas size. The other plant, the blooms were not as large but definitely big. Must have been that good manure tea I put on them last fall. It sure didn't help some of the other plants that were water soaked and turned yellow. When I think of what the farmers have endured this growing season I am sure not going to grieve over a few flowers being lost to water standing in my yard.

Here is a recipe for chicken that I liked and was good warmed up later in microwave.

### Called Orange Chinese Chicken

2 pounds chicken breast cut in cubes or strips, in a pan 1 cup water, 1/4 cup orange juice, 1/4 cup lemon juice, 1 cup brown sugar, 2 1/2 teaspoon Soy sauce, 1/2 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon powdered garlic, 1/4 teaspoon red pepper flakes, cook on high heat till boiling reduce heat to simmer about 5 minutes. Let cool. Place chicken in a sealable bowl and pour over it about 3/4 cup of the sauce let set in refrigerator for 1-2 hours. Remove chicken and in a plastic bag add 1 cup flour and salt and pepper, place chicken in bag and coat with flour and brown lightly in skillet. Discard the sauce the chicken was in. With the remaining sauce add cornstarch enough to thicken it. Pour over the chicken and cook on low heat till tender and sauce thicken. May serve this over rice or noodles.

A change to the program for this year makes some historic religious properties eligible for preservation-grant assistance. Previously, historic buildings owned by religious organizations or used for religious purposes were not eligible to participate in the HPF program. To be eligible for the program, a historic religious property must already be listed in the National Register of Historic Plac-

es. Buildings can be listed in the National Register individually or as contributing resources within listed historic districts.

Religious institutions interested in applying are encouraged to contact the DHPA Grant Staff to confirm their eligibility.

The federal funds come from the National Park Service, which distributes the funds through state agencies. In Indiana, the funds are allotted through the DHPA.

The DHPA uses about half of its annual funds for a competitive matching-grant program to assist certain types of local historic preservation projects, including rehabilitation of historic buildings.

The DHPA's annual competitive grant program requires a dollarfor-dollar local match to grant funds. Applicants must have their matching funds available when they apply for a grant. Planning projects are eligible for grants up to \$35,000. The maximum grant award for rehabilitation projects is \$50,000.

Rehabilitation activities must meet federal preservation standards. Typical grant projects include roof and gutter repair or replacement, masonry rehabilitation, window repair, and other exterior measures to keep a buildweather tight. General remodeling, construction of additions, landscaping, signage, and purchase of furniture or equipunder this program.

There are three categories of projects: Architectural & Historical. Archaeological, Acquisition & Development (rehabilitation). Applicants should "Financial Aid" link under the download the appropriate application packet and read all instructions carefully.
