In 1933, Cline Click Lumber Co. was on Nancy Street down by the railroad and Frank Good operated the elevator by the railroad on Wayne Street. The Farmers Equity Elevators was located where Evalution Real Estate is and was run by Johnny Lightfoot. Across the road from the Ice Cream Stop, where Raymond Schultz lived, was a filling station operated by Enoch Stourt. Dr. Mack Bonifield was

down where the veterinarian office is now. Rueben and Enoch Marsh operated a blacksmith shop in a building between the vet and the river.

On the other side of the river were the Salamonie Mill and the Riverside Service Station. On the north end of town, where the Telephone Office is now, Glen Riggs operated a filling station. George Cook and his Son, Guy, operated the Cook and Son "East End" Grocery. Gus Beavans operated a filling station where Ackley Automotive is now. Neal's Super Service was located where the Ford Garage is and sold Crosley Automobiles. Walter and John Lynn ran the stockyard between the railroad and where the fairgrounds were and the slaughter house where Heritage Pointe's Villas are back off the road. Carl Pugh drove the livestock truck for them.

The Salamonie Valley Museum will be open July 3 and July 4, 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. during the festival.



Free Treatments

State health officials are urging eligible women to apply for the state's program offering access to free treatment for breast or cervical cancer. In 2007, there were 3,892 women diagnosed with breast cancer and 236 diagnosed with cervical cancer in Indiana.

To qualify for this program, women must:

- * Need treatment for breast or cervical cancer;
- * Reside in Indiana;
- * Be under the age of 65;
- * Have a family income less than 200 percent of the federal poverty level; and
- * Have no credible health insurance.

"Women who are diagnosed with breast or cervical cancer are already facing an incredible challenging time for them and their families," said Erin Triplett, director of the Breast and Cervical Cancer Program at the Indiana State Department of Health. "The last thing we want them to have to worry about during this difficult time is if

they can afford to be treated."

The Indiana General Assembly passed legislation in 2009 that extended Medicaid coverage to eligible women aged 18 to 64 who have been diagnosed with breast or cervical cancer. Since the law went into effect on July 1, 2009, the program has helped 73 women receive treatment for breast of cervical cancer.

Women who believe they may be eligible are encouraged to apply for the program by calling the Indiana Family Helpline at 1-800-433-0746.

The Breast and Cervical Cancer Program also receives both federal and state funds to help uninsured and underinsured women aged 40 to 64 gain access to screening services for the early detection of breast and cervical cancer. For more information on cancer screenings, visit www.in.gov/ isdh/19851.htm or call 1-800-433-0746.

"Regular screening examinations by a health care professional can result in the detection and removal of precancerous growths, as well as the diagnosis of cancers at an early stage, when they are most treatable," said Triplett. "Cancers that can be prevented or detected earlier by screening account for at least half of all new cancer cases."

Many of them inherited poverty and loss of property for their trouble. They were always on the run, looking over their shoulders. Sure that what they



ONLINE VOTER REGISTRATION

Beginning July 1, Indiana residents will gain the ability to register to vote online. Online Voter Registration will become the newest addition to www.indianavoters.com and will allow Indiana residents to submit a voter registration application electronically to the appropriate county voter registration office. Only Arizona, Colorado, Kansas, Louisiana, Oregon, Utah and Washington have previously offered online voter registration.

"This is yet another exciting example of how our voting process is becoming simpler and convenient more incorporating the tools and technologies Hoosiers use everyday," said Indiana Secretary of State Todd Rokita, who serves as Indiana's Chief Election Official and whose office has worked to develop the online voter registration application. "Giving our citizens access to an online registration tool also helps local election administrators better serve voters and should cut their costs, all while enhancing accessibility, accuracy and security."

Indiana residents with a valid Indiana driver's license or state-issued identification card will be able to use this new tool to submit a voter registration application or to update an existing voter registration record. Historically, voters have most commonly registered by mail using a paper-based application form or have registered in-person at a county voter registration office, the Indiana Election Division or a branch office of the Bureau of Motor Vehicles.

Online Voter Registration is the result of legislation passed by the Indiana General Assembly in 2009 with bipartisan support that called for enhancements

to the traditional paper-based registration system. States adopting an online voter registration option have seen a 60 to 70 percent shift away from paper-based registrations over time. A similar shift in Indiana would greatly reduce pressure on county election administrators to facilitate data entry, especially during peak times at the close of the vote registration period.

Applicants will be required to verify their voting eligibility and personal information, which will then be cross-referenced with databases from the Bureau of Motor Vehicles. Voters will instantly receive a confirmation of their application that they can print. Once confirmed online, the county's voter registration office will approve or reject registrations subject to the same criteria used for other applicants, such as residency or incarceration following conviction of a crime.

Indiana residents have until midnight on Monday, October 4, 2010 to register in order to participate in the November 2010 General Election.

Online voter registration becomes the latest innovative improvement made to www.indianavoters.com to assist Indiana voters. In addition to registering to vote online, www.indianavoters.com provides Hoosiers with the ability to validate their voter registration status, find their polling place location, look into their provisional ballot status

information, find county contact information and determine who is on their ballot for an upcoming election.






