### HUNTINGTON COUNTY COUNCIL MEMBER RECEIVES STATEWIDE AWARD

The Association of Indiana Counties (AIC) announced that Huntington County Council Member Terry Miller received the 2024 Outstanding County Council Member Award. The award recognized his contributions to county government throughout his years of public service.

As a realtor, Terry brings his expertise to his county council and the statewide council organization. Terry serves as a secretary for the Indiana County Council Association (ICCA) and is also the Council Association's Northeast District Leader. Terry helps create and plan the Council Association's Annual Conference and Newly Elected Officials' agenda. He is a contributing member to the Council Association's Legislative Committee.

He helped Huntington County secure funding for the O'Donnell Center at Victory Noll, housing a restorative work release program for residents, under a Huntington County Community Corrections alternative sentencing initiative in collaboration with the Huntington County Drug Court. Residents at the O'Donnell Center have access to on-site addictions recovery counseling and comprehensive mental health services.

He is a faithful attendee of AIC Events. He is a member of several local boards including the Plan Commission, the Development and Redevelopment Plan Commission, the Lime City Economic Development, and the Community Corrections Advisory Board.

The award was presented during the AIC's 66th Annual Conference in Switzerland County. The AIC's Annual Conference is the largest gathering of county officials in the state. Representatives from public agencies, private entities, and local elected officials addressed issues such as: Retirement, Transportation, Public Records, Human Resources, Elections, Public Health Funding, Cybersecurity, and the Future of Local Funding.

**VICKSBURG & NATCHEZ TRIP DAY 6**

The bus driver and traveling helpers had stowed the luggage in the bus by 9 am. Natchez (NTZ abbreviated) was losing forty visitors. It was 79 degrees and the sky had a scattering of gray clouds. US highways #84 & #61 were located easier than finding a previous restaurant.

While leaving this historic city, we passed businesses named, Some of This, Some of That and Skates Auto Glass. After escaping #84, Vicksburg was 65 miles ahead on Route #61. The steep roadsides had been mowed somehow and beyond that was an auto junkyard that allowed cattle to graze between the wrecked vehicles. Possibly, some rusted metal leached into the grass

which improved the bovine's iron consumption!? Symbiotic plan? I liked a previous sighting of sheep and goats pasturing under solar panels better.

By 10 o'clock, we were bypassing Vicksburg and took a rest stop at a Welcome Center. Some of the passengers wondered why we were being greeted again! The group had just spent four days in Mississippi. It was realized that since the center was near the big river, east-bound travelers from Louisiana were the real recipients of the welcome. Sometimes things get complicated when traveling without a map!

More large, flat-land cotton fields surrounded us. By 11:30, the rough pavement created a No Sleep Zone! Houses were miles apart. The bus sped past Yazoo Wildlife Reserve. No wild, live creatures were observed; not even humans. While motoring through the small town of Shaw, MS, one building contained both a Dollar Tree and Family Dollar. Barely 25 yards north of this location was a Dollar General business. Wal+Mart had no chance here.

Prior to lunch, the bus navigated the Cleveland, MS city limits. Price of gasoline was \$3.07. A BLT was lunch and was not purchased at Mosquito Burrito. Afterwards, we moved past Zaxby's,

Rachel had hardly seen a week go by without a few Native Americans coming by. Usually, it was only Native American men traveling in hunting parties. But sometimes, there would be whole families, including mothers and children. When they came, Rachel's father encouraged Rachel and her siblings to make friends with the children, but Rachel would have none of it.

Rachel also despised having to share their food. There were some winters when they ran low and had to ration it

Rachel's mother was always cooking. Rachel's father mostly only grew wheat and potatoes because they gave the most food for the cultivated land. The Native Americans loved bread and potatoes. Rachel felt if they didn't have to share so much, her father might have food to sell, and then they could have other things that she liked better.

But above all, there was one Native American man that Rachel liked the least. It was not because he was mean or caused problems. It was because he always wore a skunk skin. The smell churned Rachel's stomach, and she would always go out and stay in the barn until he left. She called him Skunk Man, at least when her father wasn't listening. And try as she might, Rachel could not find any positive feelings toward Skunk Man.

Then, one day, after Skunk Man and the group he was with left, the family realized their youngest girl was gone. Rachel's little sister was only three, and Rachel was sure

inflammation of the ligament that holds up the arch. At the first sign of heel pain, Dr. Paschold advises runners to stretch the calf, wear sturdier shoes and use arch supports. In some cases, icing and anti-inflammatory medications, such as ibuprofen, are helpful. Should pain continue, visit a foot and ankle surgeon, who might recommend custom orthotics, injections and physical therapy.

- **Neuromas:** A neuroma is a pinched nerve between the toes that can cause pain, numbness and a burning sensation in the ball of the foot. Overly flexible shoes are often the cause, and padding, orthotics or injections are usually effective treatments.

- **Tendonitis:** Runners can be sidelined with tendonitis if they ignore the warning signs of this overuse condition. There are several forms of tendonitis that affect the Achilles and other areas, and all are treated with rest, icing, strengthening, stretching and anti-inflammatory medications, and sometimes with orthotics and physical therapy. Because overzealous training is usually the cause, especially among beginners, it's important to ramp up mileage and speed gradually. A running coach can tailor your training plan to your current fitness level.

- **Broken bones:** Don't assume that because you're able to run, your foot is not fractured. Signs of a stress fracture can include pain, swelling, redness and possibly bruising. If a fracture is suspected, remember to practice RICE (Rest, Ice, Compression and Elevation). You should also see a foot and ankle surgeon for an X-ray and proper diagnosis. Remember that like with other overuse injuries, stress fractures are often brought on by trying to do too much too soon. A general rule of thumb is to increase mileage by no more than 10 percent week to week.

- **Lisfranc injuries:** One misstep can lead to a sprain, fracture or dislocation of the Lisfranc joint. Consider wearing a headlamp in low

lighting for surer footing. It is also a good idea to incorporate exercises into your regimen that will keep ankles and feet mobile and strong.

"While completing a marathon or even longer distance race may seem like the ultimate goal, it's wise for new runners to start with shorter races first. This conservative approach will keep your feet in good shape so you're able to run pain-free for years to come," says Dr. Paschold. "And of course, it's vital to listen to your body and seek care from a foot and ankle surgeon whenever a foot problem is suspected."
