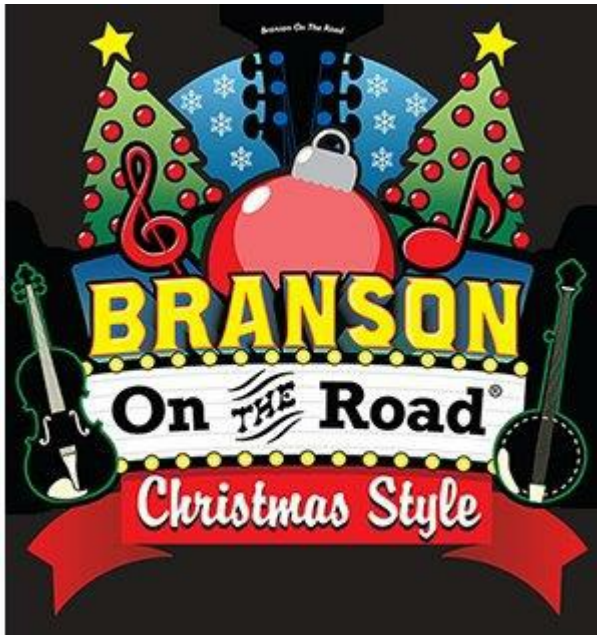

SAYING "NO" TO A CHILD'S HOLIDAY DEMANDS

 The holidays can make all of us feel like "kids" again. It's mostly a happy time, but also a season with heavy doses of marketing pressure. As adults we're able to control (usually) the impulses brought on by all those "buy stuff now!" ads, but our children face the same tidal wave of advertising without the experience to help temper the desires the ads create.

There are real reasons why the latest, heavily advertised toys can seem so appealing to our kids. It's a normal part of development for children to fantasize and jump from reality to a make-believe world with ease. Watch small children dressing up or acting out elaborate games and you can see how real those fantasy worlds can be for a child.

This ability to engage in fantasies is also why all the newest and "hottest" toys can seem so appealing. Children can easily dream about owning that exciting new game or toy, something they can imagine playing and sharing with friends, and maybe even being envied for owning.

These childhood dreams can be very strong during the gift-giving season, and when we have to let our kids down and say "no" to the latest requests it can leave us feeling like we're bad parents. This, however, may be an emotional reaction, but not a realistic evaluation.

As a parent there may be legitimate reasons why agreeing to a child's demands simply isn't practical, or desirable, or maybe even possible. While those reasons may make sense for you, for the child looking to fulfill his or her fantasy, your adult reality has little or no meaning.

Our normal parental response to a child's over-the-top request, or "demand," might be something like, "No, that toy is simply too expensive." Such a response often will lead to escalated tension that makes the child cling even harder to the fantasy of how wonderful it could be and how you just don't understand.

Instead, it often works better to allow the child to hold on to and enjoy the fantasy. Respond by showing you understand how wonderful and fun it might be to have that toy. Don't resist the fantasy, but give your child the time to return to reality at his or her own pace. Save the discussion of why the toy is not a good decision for a calmer time when the fantasy is not as strong.

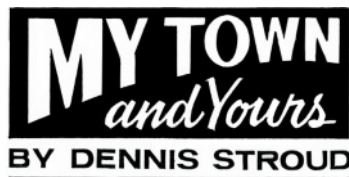

Indiana's Statehouse, listen to debates and help staff with age-appropriate tasks. Students also have the opportunity to meet with their state senator.

"The Senate Page Program enhances a student's education by providing an additional way to learn about Indiana's government," Zay said. "Classroom time is vital to young Hoosiers, but getting the chance to meet with legislators and witness the legislative process firsthand is a wonderful learning opportunity. I encourage the students in our community to apply to serve as a page, and look forward to welcoming them to the Statehouse during the upcoming session."

The Senate Page Program will begin in January and run through mid-April. Positions fill quickly, so it is important to apply early. Pages are scheduled for Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays during the legislative session. They begin their day at 8:30 a.m. and are dismissed at 3:30 p.m. Groups serve together on Wednesdays. Serving as a page is considered an excused absence from school.

That night the story of the stranger in the bank was told around town by a few people who had witnessed the incident and linked with it were two unusual events. This same man had gone to the home of the bank president, Joseph Good, and said that he had been sent to prepare the installation of air conditioning. He was no one there ordered air conditioning.

The man was refused admittance to the home, so he left. But he did not leave town. Instead he went next door, to the home of Mrs. Lillie Good, mother of Joseph Good. He gained entrance by telling her that her son had ordered air conditioning for her. He measured the house, room by room, then left.

There was no further word of the stranger on Sunday and Monday, but at 2:30 on Tuesday afternoon a 12-year-old boy came rushing into the marshal's office. He said, "I just saw him." Down the street and in the alley. Marshal Wilson hurried to his car and drove up the street to the alley. There was no one there.

FOOD DONATED

More than 75 tons, or 150,000 pounds, of poultry products were donated to families in need ahead of the holiday season, announced today by the Indiana State Poultry Association (ISPA). Governor Eric J. Holcomb and Indiana State Department of Agriculture Director Bruce Kettler recognized the generosity of these producers at the association's 71st annual poultry donation.

"Indiana's poultry producers are remarkable," Holcomb said. "Year after year, they provide thousands of meals for Hoosiers in need. I commend their goodwill and encourage others to follow their example this holiday season."

For decades, Indiana's poultry producers have been working to address food insecurity in their communities by providing protein to food banks across the state. Some of the main products that were donated this year include eggs, chicken, duck and turkey.

In fact, more than 600,000 eggs were donated by members of the association, according to Paul Brennan,

ISPA Executive Vice President.

"It was an honor to recognize these producers, who are leaders in the industry and community-oriented," Kettler said. "They are important to our state's social and economic well-being, and I applaud their generosity, as well as Paul's leadership of the association."

The strength of Indiana's poultry sector was also recognized during the ceremony, as one of the top poultry producing states in the nation. According to the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service, Indiana ranks No. 1 in duck production, No. 2 in egg production and No. 3 in turkeys raised.

Annually, the poultry sector contributes more than \$9.5 billion to the state's economy and accounts for more than 11,000 Hoosier jobs.

"Indiana's poultry industry is large and diverse, and it is no accident," Brennan said. "Geographically we may be the smallest state west of the Appalachian mountains, but we are an agrarian powerhouse with cropland for soybeans and corn. Our family farmers excel at efficiently turning those crops into high quality protein eggs, turkey, duck and chicken."

PARK PERMITS

Annual entrance permits, horse tags, off-road cycling permits and lake permits for 2019 are on sale now at DNR Division of State Parks property offices.

These passes and permits make great holiday gifts for outdoor lovers and are a wise self-gift, too.

With a daily entrance fee of \$7 per car at DNR properties, in-state visitors who buy a pass can make their money back on their eighth visit.

Annual entrance and Golden Hoosier permits can also be purchased at any of the seven state park inns. All of the permits are also available online at stores.innsgifts.com/permits.

All permits are good from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31 of year issued. The types of permits that can be purchased are:

- \$50 Annual Entrance Permit: Admits noncommercial vehicles, driver and passengers to DNR properties that charge a gate fee. More at stateparks.IN.gov/5062.htm

- \$70 Non-resident Annual Entrance Permit: Admits non-Indiana resident noncommercial vehicles, driver and passengers to DNR properties that charge a gate fee. More at stateparks.IN.gov/5062.htm

- \$25 Golden Hoosier Passport: For Indiana residents who are at least age 65 years or are a resident eligible for Social Security disability payments under 42 U.S.C. 401 (proof of eligibility must be presented at time of purchase and disabled

individual must be present in the vehicle at time of use); admits noncommercial vehicle, driver and passengers.

- \$20 Annual Horse Tag: Entitles one horse access and the use of DNR properties where horse use is allowed. Vehicle admission is not included.

- \$20 Off-Road Cycling Permit: Required for cyclists wishing to access and use mountain bike trails on state park, reservoir and state forest properties with trail ratings above beginner. It is not required for property roadways and paved biking trails. More about off-road cycling permits at stateparks.IN.gov/8623.htm

- Lake Permits (\$25 annual motorized; \$5 annual non-motorized): Required for all private watercraft using a state park lake, state-managed lake, state forest lake or Division of Outdoor Recreation lake. This includes personal watercraft, motorboats, canoes, paddleboats, rowboats and

COYOTES ACTIVE DURING WINTER

Because winter can be a busy time for coyotes, DNR biologists say people can expect to see more of them in the coming months, but not to be alarmed.

"Most young coyotes leave their parents to start looking for new homes during winter. In addition, coyote breeding season starts in January, and coyotes may be more mobile during that time as well," said Megan Dillion, DNR south region urban biologist.

Coyotes are common to Indiana, including areas where people gather. It is normal for them to show up not only in rural environments, but also in urban areas.

"Coyotes thrive near people because they like to eat the rodents and rabbits that thrive near people, so seeing them in urban areas happens pretty regularly and is not unusual," said Geriann Albers, DNR furbearer biologist.

As a result, coyotes are an important part of Indiana's environment, helping to control rodent populations and cleaning up dead animals.

Coyotes' main diet consists of rodents and rabbits, but they will eat almost anything, including fruit, insects, pet food and garbage. That's why it's important to keep garbage secure, make sure pet food is not left outside and make sure fruit from trees is picked up.

"Coyotes may be attracted to bird feeders because mice and squirrels will hang around bird feeders. If you start seeing a coyote and you have bird feeders up, taking them down for a few weeks may encourage a coyote to move on," said Jessica Merkling, DNR north region urban biologist.

If you see a coyote and want it to go away, try to make it uncomfortable. Yell, wave your arms, spray it with a hose, or throw tennis balls or small stones—but don't throw anything that it may construe as food. Noisemakers such as a jar of coins or a small air horn can also scare away coyotes and are therefore good to carry when venturing out.

Never corner or chase a coyote. Make sure they always have a clear path to get away from you.

NAMED TO SILVER TEAM

Jamie Uptgraft, a Southern Wells graduate is among eighteen men that have been named to the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame's 2019 Silver Anniversary Team, based on outstanding accomplishments as a senior basketball player 25 years ago.

Uptgraft was an AP high honorable mention and 1st team small school all-state. Averaged 24.4 points as senior, 22.4 points as junior for 15-6 conference champs, 15.1 points as sophomore and 10.6 points as freshman. He was the first-ever four-year 1st team all-ACAC selection, totaling school records of 1,508 career points (18.2 ppg), 376 assists (4.5 apg) and 262 steals (3.2 spg), to go along with 342 rebounds (4.1 rpg). He played 106 career games for the US Military Academy (Army), totaling 592 points (5.6 ppg), 258 rebounds and 246 assists. As a junior, averaging 10.1 ppg and 3.5 rebounds, he led the Patriot League in 3FG% (.410). Since 1999, he has been a US Army officer, currently a lieutenant colonel stationed in Fort Benning, Georgia. He was the head boys basketball coach at Jim Elliot Christian School in Denver, Colorado from 2014-16, with a 32-15 record and taking them to their first state tournament and the state Final Four. He resides in Fort Benning, Georgia.

The team also includes 10 members named to the 1994 Indiana All-Star squad. Eight other all-state players are included to recognize the top of Indiana's high school class of 1994.

1994 Indiana All-Stars include Mr. Basketball Bryce Drew along with Tim Bishop, Scott Combs, Tige Darnier, Sean Daugherty, Brian Hanley, Shane Miller, Lee Nailon, Bonzi Wells and LaDrell Whitehead.

The remaining eight, named to various all-state teams are: Aaron Brown, Damon Cobb, Danny Moore, Dan Muller, Cory Norman, Joe Sibbitt, Jamie Uptgraft and Russ Yoder.

All Men's Silver Anniversary Team members will be honored at the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame's 58th Annual Men's Awards Banquet on Wednesday, March 20, 2019.

A WEST VA. TRAIN TRIP

Day #2

After breakfast at the resort, the bus headed back westward on Highway #33 towards Elkins, W. Va. The road followed a narrow, rapidly flowing mountain stream. There were mountains on one side of the road and narrow valleys on the opposite side. Most of these valleys extended part way up the adjacent hillsides and were well manicured.

Obviously, livestock produced this effect from their grazing parameters.

Routinely we would see small hay fields squeezed in by the narrow landscape but crop production was minimal.

We quickly discovered on the trip that unless one traveled on US Highway # 50 or an interstate highway, all the other roads in this state were a continuous mixture of curves and elevation changes.

Even with seat belts firmly

secured, this bus ride produced personal, muscle fatigue.

In Elkins, we boarded the train named the "New Tygert Flyer" for a 48 mile, round trip ride. This diesel-powered locomotive was built by General Motors in 1952. The route included crossing a high mountain bridge and traversing a 1700 foot-long, S-shaped tunnel.

The trip included pristine scenic views, as advertised, except in the tunnel. It seemed like the world shut-down for a few moments.

The train stopped halfway at the High Falls of the Cheat River to observe the 18 foot drop and 150 foot wide natural water falls. The railroad was built to move logs to saw mills years earlier.

Logging camps moved regularly to new cutting grounds. The return trip to Elkins was uneventful except for a sandwich buffet.

However, once we deboarded, a four block hike to Walgreen's was a necessity to retrieve a med which was missed in packing.

Free time was scheduled in this town where carnival trailers were setting up for a two week festival. We avoided this activity and observed it while sitting on a bench with other trippers at an ice cream parlor. Many streets and parking lots were blocked off for this festivity.

We quickly realized that our bus was blocked in by barricades. Finally one blockade was moved and the bus narrowly missed a pickup truck that couldn't wait to enter at the same time that our large bus was squeezing through that exit. That excitement was not advertised.

Then we were off to the Gandy Dance Dinner Theatre in Elkins for a meal and entertainment. It was announced that this was a Branson-like tribute to the musical legends. The costuming and musical mimicking was ok, but not quite ready for prime time. However, the meal was good and I received an extra dessert from my neighbor.

The most exciting and horrifying time of the day was nature-induced. After getting wet while boarding the bus at the theatre, the ride back to Canaan Valley Resort via the curving highway in a rainstorm was nerve-wracking for the driver and passengers alike.


Naturally I started to verbally help the driver with my driving knowledge. Most of which came out as, "Watch Out." My wife quickly told me to keep my back-seat

driving opinions to myself even though I was sitting on the front seat. We made it back safely! My pants were a little damp from rain off course.
