DAYCARE EXPANSION

Christie Bell, owner of ABC-123 Daycare in Warren, announced that she will be opening a new daycare. "The expansion allows us to offer child care on all three shifts as well as a separate preschool program." Bell has provided licensed childcare in her home for 8 years and locks forward to moving into the newly remodeled facility.

The preschool program will focus on kindergarten readiness according to guidelines by the Indiana Department of Education. Any preschooler in the area can attend and is not required to be enrolled in childcare at ABC- 123

Daycare. Children age 2 and 3 will go on Mondays, Wednesdays, and every other Friday while the 4 and 5 year-olds will go on Tuesday, Thursday, and alternate Fridays. Class times are from 9:30 am - noon. Children will learn through a variety of activities and field trips. An enrollment fee will cover the cost of materials for the year as well as reserve your child a spot for fall registration.

In addition to the preschool program, parents may want to take advantage of the expanded care hours, including 2nd and 3rd shift. The new 24' x 30' facility will be structured in learning centers such as small and large motor

skills, a dramatic play area to encourage fantasy skills, a reading center, and a special infant area. Access to a computer and age appropriate software will allow children to become familiar with technology they may not have in their homes. Guest speakers will be invited in addition to field trips to further expand the children's interaction with the outside world. Children will be given supervised outdoor playtime and free time to develop their social skills with one

As a licensed facility the staff not only meets minimum state regulations including CPR, 1st Aid and Universal Precautions but also meet the criteria for accepting CCDF vouchers including criminal history checks as well as drug testing for illegal substances. Christie and her assistant Jennifer Ervin are attending child Development Associate (CDA) classes that will prepare them for a competency assessment in 13 functional areas as defined by the Council for Professional Recognition. This is a national standard that is the basis for quality child care skills. Another national recognition that Bell is working toward is the National Association for Family Child Care Accreditation. This is a voluntary certification program that recognizes 6 standards of quality in the child care environment. Professional development for these programs require at least 120 hours of training in addition to self-assessment in order to reach the highest quality of care possible. Corrinna Fishbaugh will work as a helper and substitute in the daycare to allow Bell and Ervin time away as needed to attend classes. Not only is Bell learning about child development and quality child care through classes, but she is sharing a lot of what she had learned so far by becoming a mentor for the Huntington Child Care Network. As a mentor she will work one on one with new providers to help them establish a child care business.

Most people are not fully prepared to cope with disasters that damage property, destroy records, and interrupt income. These are the first

· Check your homeowner's or renter's insurance policy to make sure you are adequately protected.

Make a household inventory so you are prepared to file a claim. Take photos or videos, and save receipts for high-priced items. Store a copy in a safe place away from your home.

Compile an inventory of credit cards and financial assets with company name, account or policy number, and value. Store it away from home.

Have cash available through an easily accessible account for

Always carry your health insurance and photo identification cards.

· Buy life and disability insurance.

After a disaster

· Contact relief organizations for immediate necessities.

· Contact your insurance agent to file necessary claims.

· Consult a professional to review your financial situation.

· Contact credit card companies to see if balances will be paid off.

After receiving a settlement, put the money into a savings or money market account. Restore your normal lifestyle first, and don't make big financial decisions for three to six months.

Homeowner's insurance: a whole new game

Natural and man-made disasters have taken a tremendous toll on insurance companies. In order to stay in the business, most have had to review their standards on who to insure.

The word to policy holders: That claim better be for a significant disaster. If you make more than two or three claims in a given period, chances are that you'll no longer be insured.

Generally, an insurer will forgive one claim in five years without dropping coverage on a homeowner, according to The Wall Street Journal.

COUNCIL NOTES

The Van Buren Town Council held their regular meeting on Wednesday evening, Aug. 7, in the Council Room at Town Hall. President Tony Manry called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. with the Pledge to the American Flag.

A Public Hearing was held concerning a Planning Grant for the Wastewater Treatment Plant. Eighty days after the Grant is signed, another hearing will be held. There is also a 35 day data drafting period. Council voted to pursue the Grant.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as submitted.

Council voted to pay \$27,259 to Linigers Contractors for their work on the water plant. It was also voted to pay \$69,000 to Fanning-Howey Engineers.

A private party was interested in purchasing ground near the Wastewater Plant. Council was opposed to the sale.

An estimate of \$2322 had been received for electrical service to the new Town Hall, expected to be built about the first of the year. Rex Collins was to be contacted about the project.

Council also discussed repair of a leak at the South Water Tower. Quotes are to be obtained for the iob. with one quote to be for painting of the tank, and one for repairs.

After some discussion, Council decided to renew a matured CD for a period of three months, due to a few added expenses expected to arise due to the Water Tower problem.

Superintendent Webb presented his report. Water meters had been read in July, one meter changed, and no leaks reported.


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Salt and chlorine had been ordered for the Water Plant.

Some streets had been patched.

Webb and the Council expressed their thanks to local citizens who had assisted with street sweeping in preparation for the Popcorn Festival.

A home on Park Street is expected to be torn down by Aug. 15. The next Council meeting will be Aug. 21.

TUITION ASSISTANCE

FARM SEMINARS

A series of informational seminars on the new farm bill will be held across northern Indiana on Aug. 22 and 26.

Sponsored by Indiana Farm Bureau and the Purdue Cooperative Extension Service, the meetings are open to anyone who is interested whether he is a Farm Bureau member or not. They will be held in Allen, Whitley, Elkhart, Marshall, St. Joseph and Porter/LaPorte counties, but farmers can attend any session in any county.

According to IFB District 1 Director Bob Herrold and IFB District 2 Director Mike Yoder, whose districts are hosting the seminars, the meetings will teach farmers how to how to evaluate the financial impacts of the different options offered under the farm bill.

Included in the meetings will be hands-on sessions by Purdue ag economist Allan Gray, who will demonstrate a spreadsheet program that helps farm program participants calculate their government payments. Since the Farm Service Agency was scheduled to send farmers their base acre numbers in early August, producers will be able to get a personal analysis based on those numbers.

Gain faster access to your drives, printers, programs, etc., by customizing your "Send To" menu

You can easily send files to floppy drives, printers, briefcases, and certain Windows programs by right clicking on it and selecting a destination from "Send To" menu. But, did you know that it's possible to add almost any kind of device and/or program to the "Send To" menu to make it easier to transfer files to most frequently used destinations?

1. Run Windows Explorer.

2. Select your Windows directory (C:\Windows for example).

If you're running Windows 95, select "SendTo" folder.

If you're running Windows NT, select "Profiles\Default

User\SendTo" folder.

3. Now, simply create shortcuts inside the SendTo folder as usual to the devices and programs you want to have access to from the "SendTo" menu. For example, to add your WORK folder on your zip drive (D:\Work for example) to the SendTo menu:

* Right click inside the SendTo folder and select "New | Shortcut"

* Type "D:\Work" without the quotes and click on "Next"

* Type a name for the newly created SendTo item ("My Work Folder" for example) and click on "Finish"

Now when you right click on files, you'll see "My Work Folder" appear as an option in the SendTo menu.

You can use this tip to speed up the way menus display in Windows XP.

- 1. Click Start, click Control Panel, click Performance and Maintenance, and the click System.

DEADLINE NEARS

The next deadline to register on the state's Telephone Privacy list is 11:59 PM August 20. This last update of the year will take effect October 1.

"There are 1.1 million phone numbers that are off limits to certain telemarketers, which is about 43% of the state's residential phone lines," Attorney General Steve Carter said. "After this next sign-up period, I anticipate that registrations will increase to reflect at least half of the state's residential phones."

Registration is available 24-hours a day, 7-days a week online at http://www.in.gov/attorneygeneral or by calling 1-888-834-9969. You can also stop by The Attorney General's booth in the Exposition Hall at the Indiana State Fair until August 18.

"I encourage Hoosiers attending the State Fair this week to stop by the Attorney General's booth in the Exposition Hall to register," Carter added. "It takes just a minute and already several hundred people have visited the booth to sign-up."

More than 1.1 million Hoosier phone numbers are registered on the list, which represents more than 2 million Hoosiers.

"It is clear to me that the law is working. I run into Hoosiers every day who share with me the changes that they have seen since enforcement of the law took effect earlier this year," Carter said. "There has also been a decrease in the number of complaints filed in our office which is one indicator that more and more telemarketers are complying with the law."

If you don't register for the list by August 20, don't worry. You can still get on the list because it is updated every quarter.

The law does allow four exceptions which include real-estate and insurance agents, newspapers that use their own employees to make the calls and charities that use employees or volunteers to make the calls."



State Farm Mutual rejects any new customer who has filed even one claim with another insurer in the past three years. They have stopped writing any new policies in Texas, California, and Louisiana. In the mid-Atlantic region, they will drop coverage if a customer has two claims in three vears.

Travelers Property Casualty generally drops customers who have filed three claims in five

Farmers Insurance Group uses state averages to decide which customers don't get renewed. In Missouri, for example, customers average one claim every 13 years. In Oklahoma, the average is one claim every eight years.

Allstate Corporation uses regional averages, but may not take people who made a claim in the past three years.
