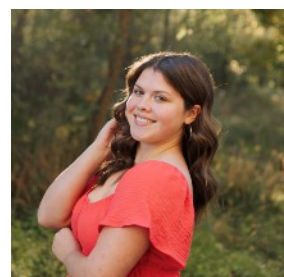

Treva's
Recipe Box

I talk a lot about how I meal plan and I know what to fix and most generally I have what I need to follow through with what is planned. I usually try to get all the American holidays and a few foreign holidays planned with a special meal related to the holiday. So on May 5th it was Cinco de Mayo so I went Mexican for supper. It consisted of chicken fajitas, Mexican rice, Pico and chips and one of my new favs Mexican street corn. I have always purchased it at food trucks and restaurants but never attempted to make it so I gave it a whirl. It turned out great. So I'll share the recipe with you and hope that you can enjoy it too.

MEXICAN STREET CORN

- 1 tbsp. Butter.
- 3-4 c. Frozen corn, thawed
- 2 tbsp. Mayo.
- 1/2 c. Queso fresco, grated
- 1/4 c. Fresh cilantro, chopped
- 1 lime, juiced
- 1/2 tsp chili powder
- 1/2 tsp garlic powder
- 2 green onions fine chop


Melt butter in a skillet. Spread corn kernals in a single layer in the pan. Roast for 10-15 minutes, stirring frequently, until the outside of the kernal have browned, don't burn them but a little char is good. Spoon corn in a large bowl and set aside, keeping warm.

In a mixing bowl, add mayo, grated cheese, green onions, cilantro, lime juice, chili powder, and garlic powder. Stir until combined. Add corn and mix to combine. Serve warm. You can add salt and pepper to this but highly recommend trying first before adding salt. The cheese adds plenty of saltyness to this.

EDUCATOR TRAINING AVAILABLE

The Indiana Department of Education (IDOE) announced at today's State Board of Education (SBOE) meeting that due to an incredible number of teachers who have already signed up for training through Keys to Literacy, additional cohorts are now available for teachers to participate in this free professional development over the next year and beyond. Since launching in April, nearly 12,000 educators have already registered for the science of reading-focused course developed specifically for Indiana.

Over the past 10 years, Indiana has faced a continued decline in student reading levels. Today, in Indiana, one in five third grade students cannot read. Central to helping more students learn to read is providing Indiana's current and future educators with high-quality, evidence-based training aligned to science of reading. To support this, Indiana has secured the state's largest-ever financial investment in literacy (\$170 million), and today, thousands of educators are already tackling this challenge head on.

"We know the value and impact that teachers have in ensuring our students are able to read," said Dr. Katie Jenner, Indiana Secretary of Education. "In just less than a month, nearly 12,000 educators have already registered for training through Keys to Literacy. This includes educators seeking to fulfill the requirements of the early literacy endorsement, as well as many others seeking to learn all that they can in order to best serve Indiana students. Thank you to all of our educators who continue to seek additional training in science of reading. Together, we can, and we must, help more Indiana students learn to read."

A new state law that passed in 2024 provides at least three years (beginning July 1, 2027) for current elementary and special education licensed teachers to earn Indiana's new early literacy endorsement. Some teachers will have longer than three years to earn the early literacy endorsement if their next license renewal date falls after July 2027. For example, if an elementary or special education teacher's current license does not expire until 2029, the teacher would have five years to complete the requirements. A total of 90 Professional Growth Plan points (hours) are required each time an educator renews their license; the addition of the early literacy endorsement will fully meet this requirement for the educator's next five- or 10-year license renewal.

Due to the incredible early interest for the Keys to Literacy training, additional sessions were added for spring/summer 2024, increasing the total number of cohorts from 12 to 64, each with approximately 200 educators. Additional cohorts are also open for both fall 2024 and spring 2025 in response to the early demand. Teachers can receive up to a \$1,200 stipend upon completion. The 80-hour professional development course offered in partnership with Keys to Literacy is just

one way that educators can complete the professional development necessary to earn Indiana's new early literacy endorsement. IDOE continues to work with educators to identify other quality science of reading training that may fulfill the 80-hours required in state law. Below are additional examples of how Indiana's \$170 million investment continues to support improving literacy throughout the state –

* Launched a new data visualization tool with key literacy data to empower educators, parents and families, community leaders and policymakers with the information needed to continue improving state and local literacy rates.

* Increased school-level science of reading instructional coaching and support for educators through the Indiana Literacy Cadre. Participation in 2023 grew nearly five-fold, with 199 total schools opting into cohorts one and two.

* Provided nearly 180,000 hours of learning support and tutoring services to over 20,000 students through Indiana Learns, regardless of a family's ability to pay.

* Grew the Indiana Learning Lab from 6,000 users in 2021 to nearly 60,000 users just two years later, including launching the Parent and Family Support Hub, which provides no cost, 24/7 access to resources for parents and families to support their student's learning.

* Developed 25-hour online professional development modules in partnership with Marian University to support Indiana educators with additional science of reading training. Over 6,000 educators are currently enrolled, and 1,700 have already completed. Eligible teachers will receive a \$1,200 stipend upon completion.

* Expanded the number of schools opting-in to administer the state's IREAD assessment for second grade students to 1,099 schools. This allows teachers, parents and families to immediately know if a child is on-track or at-risk when it comes to mastering foundational literacy skills.

* Awarded the Expanding What Works grant to four regional partners serving over 3,000 students to increase access to high-quality summer programming providing supplemental literacy and math instruction using evidence-based strategies.

* Provided \$10 million in cash stipends to teachers, instructional coaches and other school staff at all corporations and charter schools who are responsible for the implementation and delivery of early literacy and

reading instruction through the Literacy Achievement Grants.

* Increased the implementation of evidence-based instructional practices for over 65,000 students across Indiana through the Competitive Science of Reading grant, which awarded nearly \$15 million to 72 school corporations. This is in addition to the multiple other initiatives supporting science of reading.

The 7:45 am alarm clock woke us in time for a leisurely 8:15 breakfast of the usual plus waffles & syrup. I read a few chapters in the novel and half-watched a rebroadcast of the Genesis Golf Tournament. It was 58 degrees and raining lightly.

Pete's" Candy Store in downtown Jacksonville. It is advertised as the largest such store in the southeast with 22,000 sq. ft. in a Victorian mansion. We filed off the bus at the intersection of Hogan Street next to our candy destination at 11:15.

Half of our fellow travelers began the tour with the wife of Pete, while my group was escorted to a separate dining area where we engaged in a pre-selected lunch. Initially, the waitress requested drink orders. I asked for a Margarita which was not on the menu. I tried but had to settle for iced tea. The BBQ sandwich, pickle, and fruit were a good meal choice.

On our tour we learned that Pete and his wife took over the business in 2010. They only use Belgium chocolate. One candy-making room was guarded by "Sweet Pete," a

It was still raining lightly as the bus returned to the hotel at 3:45. On TV we watched a track meet where a hometown girl placed 2nd in the 800 meters at the US Olympics trials. Dinner was leftover pizza. My wife removed the "hot" peppers this time. However, I endured the trauma! Then it was time to pack the suitcases for tomorrow's departure for the west coast of Florida.

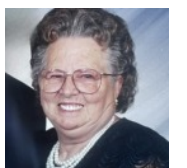

vitamins and minerals. But all the numbers can be confusing, and they're not readily visible. Given America's high rates of diet-related disease and illness, advocates say that more must be done to make sure consumers have the information they need to make healthy choices.

That's why the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), which sets standards for nutrition labeling, is developing a new labeling system that would appear on the front of food and beverage products, offering

clear and concise information to help people quickly and easily identify healthier foods. Research from other countries shows that front-of-pack labeling helps consumers make healthier purchases and even gets manufacturers to make healthier products.

What could a front-of-pack label look like? More than 40 countries already require it. Some countries use stoplight colors like red, yellow and green, or a grading system like a report card — A, B, C, D, E — to indicate how healthy a product is. Other countries use a warning system that indicates whether products include high amounts of added sugars, saturated fat or sodium. Approaches like these make it easy for consumers to understand with a quick glance what's healthy and what's not.

The success of front-of-pack labeling in other countries suggests it will help people in the United States make healthier choices that can improve well-being and reduce high rates of diet-related diseases, including some forms of heart disease and cancer. In fact, the National Academy of Medicine (formerly the Institute of Medicine) recommended such a system more than 10 years ago, and national polls show most Americans support it.

The FDA plans to release a proposal for a front-of-pack food labeling system in the United States that can get everyone out of the food shopping maze. To stay informed and learn more, visit yourethecure.org/FOP.

"Clear, concise front-of-pack nutrition labeling is the answer. After all, grocery shopping shouldn't require a degree in nutrition," says Nancy Brown, CEO of the American Heart Association.
