
The spring bulbs are now blooming nicely and always look forward to them only wish it was warm enough to sit on patio to enjoy the fragrance of them.

HUFFING

Many parents educate their children about the dangers of drugs and alcohol, but there are other substances that are often forgotten in these discussions: inhalants.

Inhalant abuse, or huffing, refers to the deliberate sniffing of common products found in homes communities with the sole purpose of "getting high." include: These products correction fluid; conditioning coolant; gasoline; propane; felt tip markers; spray paint; air

Children think that "if it's in the house, it can't be that dangerous." They see huffing in movies and on television. or portrayed as harmless and funny on YouTube. But we need to teach children that inhaling is not "harmless." It is a very real game of Russian roulette.
