Pulse Fundraisers

The Pulse Opera House production of "Nunsense" recently won "Outstanding Performance" in the Indiana Community Theatre Association Festival and is moving on to regional competition in Champaign, Illinois at the end of April. They will compete with community theatres from Illinois, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin for a chance to perform at nationals. To help pay the entry fees and travel expenses, the Pulse is having several fundraisers.

A BROKEN CHRYSALIS

It's truly amazing what a girl will do for love.

My wife, Jean, and I lived next door to each other for ten years before we were married. My sophomore interest in high school biology had sparked a live caterpillar collection. Their home was a shoe box, covered with screen wire. When I went on vacation, Jean fed them faithfully with leaves from her willow tree. She hated it.

Finally the caterpillars stopped their incessant crawling and chewing, attached their tails firmly to a stick and lay still, sheathed with a shiny leather-like case. For weeks they seemed to be dead, unmoving in their tiny gray wrappings. I removed the screen and waited.

One by one, the gray cases began to twist and turn violently, and suddenly split open. A beautiful butterfly emerged. It stood for hours gently moving its wings, pumping fluids into them to extend them fully. Then the butterfly soared gracefully away on the breezes of summer, leaving nothing behind but a broken chrysalis to indicate its former bondage.

The chrysalis and butterfly suggest the empty graveclothes of our risen Lord. When Peter and John heard the news that the Lord's body was gone from the garden tomb, they ran all the way from their lodging. Peter entered the tomb and "he saw the strips of linen lying there, as well as the burial cloth that had been around Jesus' head. The cloth was folded up by itself, separate from the linen" (John 20:6-7, NIV). The graveclothes once wrapped continuously around the body now lay collapsed, mute testimony that the corpse they had once shrouded had now emerged in life.

The bondage of death is broken. Christ is risen! We can face tomorrow with the assurance that Jesus is in fact alive to help us, to guide us, to give us hope for the future. And since He is living, our problems are not insolvable. The broken chrysalis of His graveclothes proclaims that Christ is Victor even over death. Because He lives, nothing is impossible.

FORM 11'S SENT

The Huntington County Assessor's Office sent out Form 11's on Monday, April 10th, 2017. The Form 11, notice of assessment of land and structures, is the taxpayer's formal notice of their assessment for 2017 pay 2018. The assessments for 2017 pay 2018 have increased for one of the following reasons:

1. Ag Land Base Rate. The base rate used for the January 1, 2017 assessment date: \$1,850 per acre.
2. New Construction or completion since January 1, 2017.
3. Annual Adjustment (Trending).
4. Cyclical Reassessment for 25% of the county.

We encourage all taxpayers to inquire about their assessments at this time regardless of receipt of a Form 11. You may access the current property record cards at gis.huntington.in.us. Please feel free to contact the County Assessor's Office Monday thru Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. for any questions or concerns. The deadline to protest the 2017 pay 2018 is May 26, 2017. Protesting may be done by a Form 130 or a written letter

indicating the taxpayer's name, address, parcel, contact phone number, and reasons for protesting. The Form 130 is available online at <http://www.in.gov/dlgf/2508.htm> or in the Assessor's Office. We appreciate the taxpayers' interest and involvement in the assessment of their property.

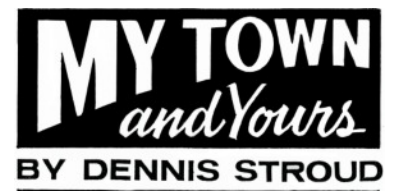
The Marion Philharmonic Orchestra will present "Treasures," the final concert of the 2016-17 season, on Friday, April 21, 2017, at 7:30 p.m. in the Phillippe Performing Arts Center on the campus of Indiana Wesleyan University. This

concert is the culmination of a season-long celebration in honor of Maestro Alexander Platt. The Board of Directors will honor him at a reception following the concert for 21 years of service to the organization. This final concert of the 2016-17 "Masterpiece" series will feature the piano duo of Dr. Steve Hyman and Steinway Artist Marilyn Shields-Wiltsie in a performance of Mozart's Concerto for Two Pianos and Orchestra, No. 10 in E-flat Major. The IWU Chorale and University Singers will form a combined choir of more than 100 voices and perform Beethoven's beloved Symphony No. 9 in D minor with faculty and alumni soloists Lisa Dawson, Rebecca Roy, Thomas Hall and Keith Brautigam. The concert is sponsored by Dr. Hyman and Mrs. Shields-Wiltsie, Indiana Wesleyan University and WBAT/WCJC/STAR 106.9/860 ESPN.

As Grant County's community orchestra, the MPO partners with generous donors each year to provide rich musical and educational experiences. This past season, the MPO engaged

more than 1700 young people in its programming through concert attendance, production assistance, performance opportunities and internships. Since it began in 1969, the orchestra has evolved from a group of local volunteer musicians into a professional symphony that features the finest musicians in the state, in the most beautiful venues in the county.



In 1998, the Knight Civic Center board found out that Garnet Bergman, who just passed away, left the civic center a good amount of money. There were two requests with this donation. First, we had to wait ten years and the second was to put their name on the building. Ten years later the building was officially called the Knight Bergman Center. The money was moved to an Edward Jones account and agreed to spend the interest only.

ladies, and helpers, put them out and put a low price on them. They sell these on Friday and Saturday and make some money for the KBC.

The Bread of Live Food Pantry is in the northeast corner. They stock groceries for families or individuals whose circumstances have made it difficult to pay everyday bills and expenses. The auditorium is used for wedding receptions, anniversaries, parties, meetings and reunions. There is, also, a kitchen and a stage that can be used.

There are about 80 kids, 5 to 8 years old, that play in our baseball program and we have about 120 kids, kindergarten to seniors, who plays in our basketball program in the winter.

Finally, we have on the south end two museums. The USS Salomonie Museum houses items that belong to sailors who spent time on the tanker, the USS Salomonie. The other museum is the Salomonie Valley Museum. It houses everything to do with the Warren community and surrounding area.

The motto of W.A.R.R.E.N. Inc. is "Join Our Circle of Community Cooperation." With that in mind we hope that you can come join us in any or all of our future activities.

TO HOST HENDRICKS

The Salomonie Church of the Brethren at 2662 W - 600 S (124) Warren IN, will be hosting Christian pianist Jim Hendricks on April 30, 2017 at the 9:30am worship service. The public is invited to hear this concert and encouraged to visit his website at jimhendricksmusic.com.

Pianist Jim Hendricks grabbed the attention of family members and musicians as a child with the uncanny ability to play anything he heard on records and memorize any printed music that came across the piano. While still in grammar school, Jim was able to transcribe by ear complex

harmonies and melodies – without the use of a piano. He continued intensive musical studies and was considered a professional as a teenager.

After high school, Jim performed with such legends as Dave Brubeck, Della Reese, Rita Moreno, Tito Puente, Maynard Ferguson, Jack Jones, Louie Bellson, Clark Terry, Arturo Sandoval, Jon Faddis, and many others. He also competed in numerous international piano competitions, was a featured orchestral soloist performing the piano music of Rachmaninoff, and by the age of twenty-five had accepted a music professorship.

While on tour with the Glenn Miller Orchestra, Jim realized he was not using his talents for God's glory. Already being a dedicated Christian for many years, Jim knew it was time to leave the secular music world and follow God's calling into Christian ministry.

Since then, Jim has performed nearly 1,400 Christian piano concerts in churches all across the land, including three appearances at the Crystal Cathedral. He has made thirteen piano recordings, performed on ABC, CBS, TBN and PAX, authored the book Contemporary Arrangements for Today's Church Pianist, and been featured in Clavier piano journal. The Lord has greatly blessed his decision to bring glory to Christ through music.

SPORTS PHYSICALS

In order to participate in extracurricular sports and activities during the 2017-2018 school year, students must have a primary care provider sign off on the proper documentation indicating they have received a sports physical, or pre-participation exam, on or after April 1, 2017. In an effort to provide young athletes across the region with a higher level of care, Parkview Physicians Group family medicine and pediatric providers are now

offering well-child exams in lieu of pre-participation exams.

While a pre-participation exam only determines a child's physical ability to safely participate in sports and other activities, a well-child exam provides preventive care and serves as a tool for early detection should something be hindering a child's growth and development.

"Adolescence is one of the most crucial turning points in a child's physical and mental well-being," said Duane Hougendobler, MD, pediatrician, Parkview Physicians Group. "With so many changes taking place during this time, yearly wellness visits are more important than ever, and include things that are not covered in a standard physical exam."

During a well-child exam, the healthcare provider will check for abnormalities that most teenagers don't look for and teach the importance of regular self-screening; perform a comprehensive physical exam; complete required school, sport and extracurricular activity pre-participation forms; administer immunizations; provide safe and confidential counseling about social and mental challenges; gather extensive family history; and provide referrals for diagnosis and/or treatment, if necessary.

- and nearly 20 percent of teens are overweight or obese.

"This new facility will provide needed space for students in agriculture courses to work with crop plants and learn about how they grow," stated Dr. Raymond Porter, Director of the Hauptert Institute for Agricultural Studies. Faculty and students in biology, chemistry, occupational therapy, and other programs can also benefit from the additional space for instruction and research. The 2,000 square-foot facility will sit adjacent to the southeast side of the Dowden Science Building and will feature an aluminum frame with clear insulated glass and a multiwall polycarbonate roof for heat retention abilities, impact resistance and light diffusion. The building is designed to be split into two independent zones, one for student instruction and one for research and production purposes. The latest technology in environmental control will be employed by using an advanced digital horticultural controller system allowing end users to customize settings and maintain environmental conditions per their specific needs.

This past fall, Huntington University received a lead gift from Dr. and Mrs.

Douglas Ware of Chapel Hill, North Carolina, to initiate fundraising for the new facility. Several other donations were allocated for the new building, but it was an additional gift given by Dr. and Mrs. Ware that completed the project funding. Both gifts were given in honor of Douglas' late father, Dale Ware, a long-time Huntington County educator and HU alum (Class of 1936).

“This is just one way we can honor my father who significantly influenced my life and challenged me to pursue a career in agriculture. We also wanted to recognize his life-long commitment to education. It's been a blessing to see first-hand how he had inspired so many students,” said Dr. Douglas Ware. “My father was proud to be an HU alum and we hope this gift will help strengthen the legacy of Huntington University and

further solidify the mission of the Hauptert Institute.”

The Hauptert Institute for Agricultural Studies opened in the fall of 2015 and promotes a Christian perspective on agriculture, which recognizes the responsibility to be good stewards of God's creation and to examine questions of sustainability and justice. FISHING LICENSES

The DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife reminds Indiana anglers that last year's fishing licenses are about to expire and that they are

encouraged to report their big catches this year.

Indiana fishing licenses are valid from April 1 through March 31 of the following year, so a 2017 license will be required beginning this Saturday.

With a few exceptions, a valid fishing license issued by the DNR is needed to fish in public lakes, streams, rivers or tributaries in Indiana or its boundary waters. Children younger than 18 and adults born before April 1, 1943 are not required to have a license to fish.

An annual fishing license costs \$17 for Indiana residents and \$35 for non-residents. Indiana residents who are at least 64 years old and born after March 31, 1943 are eligible to buy a Senior Annual (\$3) or Senior Fish for Life (\$17) license.

Licenses can be purchased online at INHuntFish.com, in person at more than 525

retailers statewide, or by calling the DNR Customer Service Center at (317) 232-4200 during normal business hours.

With a license in hand, consider reporting your big catch to DNR Fish & Wildlife's Fish of the Year program, which rewards anglers for the biggest fish, measured in inches.

Twenty-five anglers were honored in 2016, including Jeff Armstrong of Wheatfield, who submitted five winning catches. Close to half of the 2016 winners were the only entry for that species, so don't hold back if you catch a nice fish in 2017.

LOVING MYSELF IS THE KEY TO LOVING OTHERS

In his book *Many Lives, Many Masters*, Dr. Brian Weiss M.D. (a renowned and highly reputable psychiatrist) said,

"The steady day-in and day-out pounding of undermining influences such as a parent's scathing criticisms, could cause even more psychological trauma than a single traumatic event. These damaging influences, because they blend into the everyday background of our lives, are even more difficult to remember and exorcise.

A constantly criticized child can lose as much confidence and self-esteem as one who remembers being humiliated on one particular, horrifying day. A child whose family is impoverished and has very little food available on a day-to-day basis might eventually suffer from the same psychological problems as a child who experienced one major episode of accidental near-starvation. Those day-in and day-out poundings of negative forces have to be recognized and resolved with as much attention as that paid to the single overwhelmingly traumatic event."

I loved what Dr. Weiss said and I've realized, because of my daily attention to Nelly my inner child, I've been able to neutralize the day-in and day-out poundings of the past by becoming aware of her against the background of my daily life that's going on now. When we shine our attention daily on the inner child, and confront negative feelings in the moment, using love, understanding and compassion, we can almost be like our own psychologist helping ourselves to remember and exorcise the source of negative experiences from the past.

Loving yourself is NOT a selfish notion!

At first, it was very hard for me to accept the concept of "loving myself." It just sounded wrong! It seemed like such a selfish notion. I'd recall my mother who was constantly saying, "Don't be selfish!" when all I was doing was being a child immersed in my joy of any given moment. The thought of being selfish would always send me off into thinking about people I know who are self-centered, self-serving, "into" themselves and egotistical and I didn't like those who came to mind and certainly didn't want to be like them. So I looked up the word selfish in my synonym finder and it gave words like greedy, materialistic, covetous, hoggish, hoarding, grabby, possessive, stingy and such. Yikes those words describe behavior I don't ever want to have and being selfish in those ways really doesn't have anything to do with love.

So with the help of several spiritual teachers, I cautiously

stuck my big toe in this pool of love that we all have inside of us and surrounding us, and over time I waded in up to my neck and then I just took a big breath and went in all the way!
