



remained there until 1989. In the late 1980s Bob changed careers to become successful Realtor.

Here they hosted many guests from around the country, and Bob took great delight in sharing the beauty of the valley and surrounding areas and then typing out descriptive letters about these adventures (mostly citing the routes restaurants).

People who knew Bob in recent years all would comment on his sharp mind. He treasured a wealth of information that he readily recalled in detail. He was a student of history, especially the railroad, the Wild West, Native Americans, the Civil War and the Revolutionary War. He knew more about Montana history than most Montana folks. 
