## DOWNTOWN UPDATE

Work has started on the exterior of the building to be demolished.Being removed are pieces of metal, window casements and such items.

The INDOT permit for closure of SR 5 through the downtown has been extended to August 31st due to the need to move equipment in the area as the rest of the building is being demolished and rubble is being removed. Barricades to block off the portion of SR5 between First and Second Streets will be used as needed during the next few weeks. Again, due to truck traffic and heavy equipment, please do not bypass or ignore those

barricades. This process will be ongoing for approximately the next two weeks.

# STREET CLOSED

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) announces that SR5 in Warren, between SR 218 (E. 1st Street) and E. 3rd Street will remain closed to truck traffic until August 30, weather permitting. The purpose of the restriction, which is under permit by INDOT, is to allow demolition of an unsafe building on SR 5 without added hazard from large truck vibrations. Passenger vehicles are allowed on SR5 in this area. The truck detour follows SR 218 (E. 1st Street) to Grover Street to

5th Street.

By the 1980's, the company had locations in Huntington and Warren. After George Brandon's death, his widow, Mary, sold the company to Peter and Joyce Sorg. By 1988, the company operated exclusively in Warren, where it continues to be a thriving monument business.

# PRESERVING NATURE'S **BOUNTY**

Picture your garden overflowing with plump, juicy tomatoes, shiny green peppers, and crisp green beans. Imagine picking juicy peaches, pears, and apples from the local orchards or selecting fresh produce from baskets at the farmers' markets.

Why not save some of this bounty to enjoy all through the year? Food preservation is the process of treating and handling food to stop or greatly slow down spoilage, loss of quality, edibility, or nutritive value caused or accelerated by microorganisms.

Learn to preserve foods safely. The Purdue Extension Service in Wells County will be conducting 'Preserving Nature's Bounty' workshops to discuss safe home food preservation procedures and to answer the frequently asked questions on canning,

freezing, and drying foods. Two workshops will be offered on August 22nd 10:00 AM - 12:00 PM and 6:30 PM - 8:30 PM. Both workshops will be held at the Wells County Community Center at the 4-H Park.

Please register by calling the Wells County Purdue Extension office at (260) 824-6412 and please indicate which workshop time slot you will be attending. Registration cost is \$3.00, payable at the door.

#### INSTRUCTOR TRAINING

Indiana 4-Hand the Department of Natural Resources will be hosting a 4-H Shooting Sports Instructor Training, September 6-8 at Ross Camp near Lafayette.

Individuals 18 and older are invited to attend the training and become certified instructors in one of seven areas.

The specific disciplines include: Archery, Outdoor Pursuits, Muzzleloading, Pistol, Rifle, Shotgun, and Coordinator.

Volunteers do not need to be an expert in one of the shooting sports areas. In fact, the instructors focus more about how to teach youth the various safety and shooting principles.

### BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY

As you get your kids ready to go back to school, you're probably busy making lists of school supplies you need to buy and scheduling doctor's appointments for immunizations. One thing you don't want to forget to doduring this busy time of year is review back-to-school safety information with your kids.

Use these tips from USA.gov to help prevent accidents and to keep your kids safe at school:

Review basic street safety.

Whetheryourchildrentakethe bus to school or you drop them off directly, make sure to review the basic guidelines on how to safely cross the street. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, in 2010 nearly one in every five children between the ages of 5 and 9 who were killed in traffic crashes was a pedestrian. Remind your children to only cross the street in designated crosswalks and to look both ways before crossing. If there's a crossing guard at an intersection, make sure to follow his or her directions.

Prevent accidents on the playground.

Every kid loves to be able to run around during recess, but playgrounds can pose lots of opportunities for accidents and injuries. To help protect your child, make sure to remove drawstrings and other cords from their clothing. These strings can easily get trapped in playground equipment and lead to strangulation. Children should always be supervised while on the playground. If you have concerns, talk with your school and your child's teacher about the level of supervision.

Use proper equipment to prevent sports injuries.

If your children play sports during the school year, make sure they are outfitted with the proper equipment to prevent injuries, especially concussions. While it's OK to buy gently used equipment in some instances, like lacrosse or hockey sticks, don't skimp on a good quality helmet. A used helmet could already have the padding damaged and that will offer your children less protection. Make sure you can recognize the signs of a concussion and learn how to prevent other common sports injuries like sprains or pulled muscles.

Talkto your kids about bullying. No one feels safe at school if they are the victim of bullying or cyberbullying. Make sure you talk to your kids about bullying and teach them to report any cases of bullying they see at school, even if they aren't the victim. Use the tips from StopBullying.gov to get the conversation started.

# SAVING FOR COLLEGE

Is it ever too early to start saving for college? Is it ever too late? Finance experts say the answer to both questions is a resounding "no," and an annual Gen Z & Money survey released by TDA meritrade Holding Corporation (NYSE: AMTD) indicates that members of Generation Z are hearing the message loud and clear.
