### COUNCIL MEETINGS

Warren Council Meetings for 2024 are scheduled for the Second Monday of each month at 6:00 pm in Assembly Hall. All sessions of Council are open to the public unless called as an Executive Session, a meeting which must meet criteria established by Indiana law and are not open to the public. Meetings called as Special Sessions are Council Meetings open to the public which are scheduled for a day or time different from the regular schedule.

### ECLIPSE

Happening in Warren, and many other locations in the State and country on April 8th, will be a total eclipse with Warren and Markle included in the area to be in total darkness.

Preparations are underway by the Festival Committee to have a one day event with food vendors and other activities. Second Street from Wayne to Nancy will be closed for the event, street lights will be adjusted to stop automatic activation, extra officers will be available and more. There is no way to know the impact it will have here as to how many people from out of town may arrive.

Through the month of March, more information will become available through Facebook sites such as the Town of Warren, Huntington County Homeland Security, Huntington County Tourism and Indiana State Police as well as other sites offering tips on how to view the eclipse.

### TOP 60

Congratulations to Sophia Morrison of Eastbrook for being included in the 2024 Girls Top 60 Senior Workout.

Hoosier Basketball Magazine's Top 60 senior girls' basketball players for 2023-24 is compiled by Hoosier Basketball Magazine. These girls were selected from approximately 1,400 senior players statewide. Statistical evaluation, game observation and statewide research were conducted during the season and throughout the state tournament to determine Hoosier Basketball Magazine's Top 60.

Two sessions of the 43rd annual Top 60 Senior Workout will be hosted by Hoosier Basketball Magazine in conjunction with the IHSAA and the IBCA on Sunday, March 3rd at Beech Grove High School in Indianapolis (5330 Hornet Avenue in Beech Grove).

Half of the Top 60 girls, primarily from northern and southern Indiana, will participate in the first session (1:00-3:00 pm EST). The remaining players, primarily from central Indiana, will compete during the second session (3:30-5:30 pm EST).

The Top 60 Senior Workout includes the state's top four scorers— Samantha Redinger, Argos (29.8 ppg), Ava Ziolkowski, Crown Point (27.3), Camryn Runner, Hamilton Heights (26.9) and Kayla Lacombe, Indianapolis Tech (26.8).

There are five players that will participate in the Top 60 Workout who are also from 2024 IHSAA state finalist teams— Aniyah Bishop and

Riley Milausnic, from AAAA Lake Central, representing AAA are Kennedy Fuelling, Norwell and Chloey Graham, Gibson Southern along with Addie Shank, from AA Fort Wayne Luers.

More than a dozen of the Top 60 selectees have signed with Division I Universities including the six players that were featured, front and center, on the 2023-24 cover of Hoosier Basketball Magazine. They are Alli Harness, Carroll-Flora (Western Michigan), Jordyn Poole, Fort Wayne Snider (Purdue), Chloe Spreen, Bedford North Lawrence (Alabama), Reagan Wilson, Noblesville (Iowa State), Faith Wiseman, Indian Creek (Indiana) and Juliann Woodard, Jennings County (Michigan State).

Former state champion coach DeeAnn Ramey (North Central-Marion) will direct both sessions assisted by Amy Selk (Beech Grove). Other outstanding Indiana girls' high school coaches from the IBCA have been invited to join the 2024 Top 60 staff— Brad Bowsman (Twin Lakes), Brian Ferris (Indian Creek), Aimee Litka (New Prairie) and Stacy Mitchell (Warren Central).

KnowYourBaller will be filming the Girls Top 60 Senior Workout again this year. They will provide summary videos with all pertinent clips for participating players.

Both sessions are open to the public for admission fee of \$8.00.

President Jerry Caudill called the meeting to order with the Pledge of Allegiance. Council member Mark Towery motioned to approve previous meeting minutes; council member Katie Freeburn seconded. 3-0. Minutes were approved as submitted.

**WEAVER ABATEMENT:** Jacob Everett with the Grant County Growth Council presented Resolution 01-2024 to the council. This Resolution is a declaratory of intent to approve the request by Weaver Popcorn for an abatement. Mark motioned to approve the Resolution; Katie seconded. 3-0.

**TOWN CLEAN-UP:** The council approved the dates of May 2-4, 2024, for the annual town clean-up.

**GOVOLUTION:** Clerk-Treasurer presented a new company to the council. This company provides residents with the option to pay with debit/credit cards. This would replace the current company, Paygov. Katie motioned to approve Govolution; Mark seconded. 3-0.

**HOLIDAY SCHEDULE:** The council approved the new Holiday Schedule for 2024. An ordinance will be made and motioned at the next meeting.

**POLICE:** Marshal Skyler Beard reported that they have been giving more notices out to residents to clean up their properties. All police vehicles had their radars recertified. Marion Animal Control reached out to Skyler regarding the town's animal control ordinance. He sent them a copy of the town's ordinance. They would like there to be one same ordinance for the whole county.

**UTILITY:** Utility Supervisor Donnie Plummer reported that both plants are running well. He received an updated water tower contract estimate for maintenance. The pumps and wells report all came back good. A new UV unit will be installed in

March. Donnie reported that 509 E Main will need water service, they will have to tap into the main.

Katie motioned to adjourn the meeting; Mark seconded. 3-0. There being no other business the meeting was adjourned at 7:58 PM.

**CSA SCHOLARSHIPS**

The State of Indiana is now accepting applications for Career Scholarship Account (CSA) programs and providers. The first-in-the-nation CSA program provides \$5,000 annually for tenth-through twelfth-grade students enrolled in eligible work-based learning programs.

"By partnering with our schools and investing in our future workforce, employers are helping to support students as they explore, engage and experience a

variety of career options," said Dr. Katie Jenner, Indiana Secretary of Education. "Indiana's CSA program provides an incredible opportunity to help students overcome barriers, and ultimately, increase access to quality work-based learning experiences across the state, as well as credentials of value before high school graduation."

Eligible work-based learning experiences provide ongoing interactions between high school students and professionals in workplace settings that foster in-depth, firsthand experiences in a career field of interest. Employers, schools, unions and non-profit intermediaries are encouraged to apply as a provider. Eligible CSA programs must be:

- \* Employer-driven,
- \* Culminate in credentials of value,
- \* Include work-based learning,
- \* Support high school graduation requirements, and
- \* Be aligned to career and college.

"Employers and intermediaries play a vital role in introducing students to in-demand careers in Indiana," said Indiana Commissioner for Higher Education Chris Lowery. "The CSA program allows Hoosier students to gain valuable hands-on experience in a career field of interest and discover opportunities for

education and training beyond high school."

Through a cross-agency coordinated effort, the Indiana Department of Education approves eligible programs, the Indiana Commission for Higher Education approves eligible providers, and the Treasurer of State approves eligible students and provider expense reimbursements. CSA program funds cover eligible expenses in the following categories:

- \* Expenses to enroll in and attend courses, sequences, apprenticeships, or programs of study
- \* Career coaching and navigation services
- \* Postsecondary education and training
- \* Transportation and equipment
- \* Certification and credentialing examinations

Providers are encouraged to apply by the priority deadline of Friday, April 5. Provider applications received after the priority deadline will be accepted and approved on a rolling basis until Friday, September 6, for the 2024-2025 school year. Applications received after Friday, September 6, will be considered for the following school year. Student applications for the CSA program will open this spring.

**BBB TIP: HOW TO BUY FURNITURE ONLINE**

Online purchases of home products and furnishings have nearly doubled, and the online outdoor furniture sales have increased more than 400%. This increase likely reflects the home improvements many homeowners are making, parents shopping for desks for home school learning, and employees who have permanently switched to a work from home situation.

Convenience aside, making large purchases online should always be approached with care. The following tips will help you select quality furniture at a reasonable price and avoid a few common online shopping pitfalls.

Tips for purchasing furniture online:

- \* Only shop with reputable retailers. Research a retailer's page before deciding to do business with them. Reputable sellers provide information about their company and always have valid contact information. Look for company reviews online; for example, on [BBB.org](http://BBB.org), shoppers can find out if an online retailer is BBB accredited, read consumer complaints and reviews.

- \* Understand the store's return and refund policy. Return shipping for heavy items, such as furniture, can get costly. Some retailers may have unique restrictions for delivery and returns because of the coronavirus pandemic. Before placing an order, read carefully or call the retailer directly to find out upfront if a retailer has a return policy, if refunds are available, how refunds are issued, what the return process is, who pays for return shipping, and whether or not a restocking fee is

charged. This information will often help decide whether or not you will complete the order.

- \* Get to know the delivery options. Typically, furniture retailers offer three kinds of shipping, and each one may have a different cost.

1. Front door delivery: the packaged product will be shipped to your front door and no further.

2. Inside delivery: the delivery person will take the packaged furniture into your home, sometimes into the room of your choice.

3. White glove delivery: the delivery person will take the packaged box to the room of your choice, unbox it and assemble it if necessary. They will also clean up any mess from the packaging and take it with them.

4. Ask before placing the order if these delivery options are available, as some retailers have changed to curbside or simply front door delivery service to avoid contact delivery.

- \* Measure your space - will it fit through the door? Be extra conscientious when measuring the space where the new furniture will go. A small mistake when taking measurements can mean the difference between the new sofa fitting comfortably in the living room or not fitting through the doorway and down the hall! Make sure to measure doorways, ceiling heights, and any hallway space (including banisters) the furniture must get through to reach its final destination.

- \* Choose the color carefully. As they appear on a computer screen, furniture colors can be significantly different from how they look in real life. Look at furniture images on different devices to get a better feel for the color. Consumer reviews can be helpful, too, as many people will comment if the furniture is darker or lighter than it appears online.

- \* Read several reviews. When finding the ideal piece of furniture, read as many consumer reviews as

possible, keeping a critical eye out for comments about the quality of the furniture and the experience with the retailer. Use these for reference before making a final purchasing decision.

- \* Ask questions right up until making a purchasing decision. Reputable furniture companies will happily answer any questions about a specific product until the button to purchase it is clicked. When in doubt, contact the company directly. For example, maybe it's essential to know whether the feet of a couch unscrew so it will fit through a tight doorway. Many companies are also willing to send fabric swatches for a reasonable fee – a good idea if there is a specific color or texture preference to match in the room.

- \* Do a price comparison. Some pieces of furniture are available from multiple retailers, so always compare prices before getting the best deal. Don't forget to factor in shipping fees and taxes when comparing prices.

- \* For store financing, rent-to-own, and layaway plans, carefully read the fine print. Since furniture can get expensive, many retailers offer store financing, layaway plans, and rent-to-own options. If you are considering one option, carefully read the financing plan. How much interest is charged? How long does the payment plan last? How many payments over how many months or years will it last? Is there an fee to pay the balance in full? Get the

answers to all of these questions before signing a finance agreement.

- \* Inspect furniture upon delivery. Before signing any delivery paperwork, inspect the furniture. If it is damaged or missing pieces, you don't have to accept it. When a delivery is refused because of damage, you will no longer be responsible for payment.

"Biomarker testing and precision medicine are helping extend and improve lives by tailoring care and treatment to a person's specific type of cancer. Over the past few months, we have heard countless stories of the difficulties patients face in attempting to access this critical testing. It's time for that to change.

"This legislation will help address a significant barrier and bring the promise of precision medicine to more Hoosiers no matter their income or where they live. This can provide many benefits to patients, including better outcomes, improved quality of life, and, in some cases, reduced costs from bypassing ineffective therapies.
