The Van Buren Town Council met on Wednesday evening, April 4 at 7 pm. The meeting was held in the Council Room at Town Hall. President Marvin Surber conducted the meeting which opened with the Pledge to the American Flag.

Preceding the regular meeting a Public Hearing was held concerning the raise in rates for trash pick-up in Van Buren.

Three senior citizens were in attendance for the hearing. They were concerned about why they should pay the same rate for one bag of trash as those with the limited number of bags. The new rates will go into effect May 1. The rates are \$11.00 for local residents and \$8.00 for senior citizens. If you are a senior citizen you may call the Clerk-Treasurer's office for the senior citizen rate.

In the first order of business following the hearing, Council approved Ordinance 2-2012, allowing for an increase in rates for trash pick-up in Van Buren. It was noted that this is the first rate increase since 1997.

A citizen in attendance was concerned about getting the town cleaned up. There was a discussion about the situation and it was explained what the town is responsible for and what property owners responsible for.

There was concern about semis turning onto Hill Street and

causing damage to the Lions Club yard and minor damage to the building when hit by the semis on a couple occasions. It was noted there needs to be an agreement with the state since the frontage is on State Road 5.

Officer Pat Collins gave the police report. He said the new 2013 Ford Taurus car had been delivered. He asked Council for approval to purchase necessary equipment for the new vehicle. Council approved.

Superintendent Rob Reeder gave his report. He noted that they are unable to use the older tri-pod. To purchase a new one costs \$700. Council approved the purchase.

Due to a major water leak a citizen had received an adjustment for the first month. The property owner was requesting further adjustments. This request had been made to the Clerk-Treasurer but Council felt they should have been at the meeting for final decision.

SPRING TURKEY SEASON

Indiana Conservation Officers $want to \, remind \, residents \, of the \,$ upcoming spring turkey season and encourage hunters to take

the opportunity to get out and bag their spring bird.

Turkey Season opens on April 25. Spring turkey season allows one male or bearded turkey to be harvested per licensed hunter. Hunter orange is not required by law but is considered an important safety consideration when going afield or leaving their hunting areas. An important safety tip would be to avoid wearing red, blue, or white clothing.

Hunters are reminded to be sure of their intended target and what is beyond. Because turkey hunting involves calling active male turkeys it is also important to remember not all calls are from wild birds.

In 2010 an estimated 63,000 hunters took part in the 19 day spring season and harvested a record 13,742 wild turkeys. Turkeys were extirpated from the state of Indiana by the 1900's. Restoration efforts were launched in 1956. In 2012 all 92 counties in Indiana have resident wild turkey populations.

Legal turkey hunting requires a valid license and game bird stamp. Legal equipment is limited to shotguns 10, 12, 16 or 20 gauge as well as archery equipment. Use of bait, or any substance or product for animal consumption, is restricted by

Licensed, ethical hunters know the rules and play by them but poachers don't. Hunting season increases the likelihood that law-abiding hunters will encounter poaching, which is the illegal taking of fish, game or non-game wildlife. When that happens, Conservation Officers encourage hunters to use the TIP hotline to file a complaint. TIP is an acronym for Turn in a Poacher or Polluter.

TIPS TO TEACH CHILDREN FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

April is National Financial Literacy Month, and your bankers are encouraging parentstotakethis opportunity to teach your children the importance of financial responsibility.

By making financial education a family priority, children can learn the importance of budgeting, saving, investing and using credit wisely. The path to financial success begins at home, and children learn best by watching the example their parents set.

The following tips are simple ways that parents can provide the foundation necessary for their children to make sound financial decisions for the rest

of their lives.

- 1. Teach children to save starting from a young age. Encourage young children to save their birthday money from grandma, coins they find on the car floor and other money in a piggy bank or a shoe box. Have them count the money at the end of each month to see how their savings grow.
- 2. Open a savings account for your children. Once your child is older and receives an allowance in addition to potentially earning money for doing household chores or babysitting, take him or her to your bank to open a savings account. - 3. Have your children help manage household monthly bills. Teach your children about paying monthly bills and balancing a checkbook by having them assist with simple finance tasks. For example they open the monthly phone, electric or cable bill and assist with balancing the family checkbook after these bills are paid. Teach them how to budget by using your family expenses as an example.
- 4. Look for children's financial literacy programs in your community. Financial literacy programs are often sponsored by local banks, and April is an ideal time to be on the lookout. Also many schools are adding financial literacy components to their programming. If financial literacy is not being offered in your child's school, ask the principal if it could be added.
- 5. Open a checking account for your children. High school students often hold part-time jobs, providing a stream of income that can go into both savings and checking accounts. Now is also a good time to discuss the importance recording every deposit and withdrawal to avoid overdraft fees and other unnecessary charges that can come with a checking account. Help high school students set long-term goals by designating how much money to put into savings, with the remaindering going into their checking accounts.
- 6. Teach your older children how to create and stick to a budget. Once your children are close to going off to college, they must learn how to budget,

as they will soon be doing so on their own. Sit down and work together to create a realistic budget, including expenses such as renter's insurance and other less obvious expenditures. Emphasize the importance of living on less than one's income and of avoiding debt. Discuss how responsibly use credit, look for low interest rates, and avoid late fees and interest payments.

JKEEPING KIDS SAFE FROM DANGEROUS PEOPLE

(StatePoint) Peril can be lurking around every corner, so make sure your children know how to protect themselves from dangerous situations.

These days, keeping kids safe is more complicated than just warning them not to talk to strangers. Criminals can come in all shapes and sizes, and sometimes it's someone who you least suspect who can cause the most trouble.

- Keep an open dialogue. As a parent, it is important to know about your children's new friends. Don't feel like it's overbearing to have an open, honest conversation about the happenings in your children's lives.
- Monitor Internet usage. Childrencan never be sure who they are associating with online. "Predators are always online searching for vulnerable children," says Wiehl, "You don't have to spy on them. Just keep an eye out. It's parenting."
- Specify safe places. Work with your children to establish "safe havens" for them to go to if they sense trouble while out of the house. These should be places you both are familiar with, like a friend's house or a community center. Also, discuss with your child secure places to play and safe walking routes.
- Teach your children to trust themselves. More often than not, children can tell when a situation doesn't feel right. If your children feel uneasy by their surroundings, they should notignore those feelings. Teach them to be assertive and remove themselves from situations that feel dodgy.
