RECOVERING FROM A MISTAKE

 It happens to all of us. We're in a situation where we have to perform, make a decision, or accomplish something important, and instead, we fail. We freeze up, or make a poor decision or simply don't deliver the results that were expected. The outcome isn't pleasant and we are embarrassed.

The reality, of course, is that no one can be right all the time. We may fail at something but, hopefully, it usually isn't the end of the world. The problem happens when we find it hard to get past that mistake or failure. Instead of simply going, "Oops!" and telling ourselves we'll do better next time, we dwell on our mistake and find it makes us timid and afraid to take on new things if there appears to be any type of risk involved.

This can seem difficult to overcome, especially if the previous mistake has had serious ramifications, but in most cases you can move on successfully. A starting point is to see a failure not simply as an ending point, but rather as a mistake from which you can learn and improve. It's important to realize that you are much more than that mistake or failure.

Life is a learning experience. Yes, there will be things that make you nervous, perhaps really scare you, but when you have the courage to face such events, even if you may eventually fail at them, you're taking action to learn and to build a better you. And the result will be, after time, that things that once made you nervous or scared are now clearly in the domain of things you can handle.

The key is to not dwell on the past but rather to keep moving forward. When faced with something that may contain some risk, it's important to ask yourself, "What's the worst that can happen?" Try to evaluate how you would deal with that negative outcome. Is it possible that not succeeding might even have positive benefits in the long run?

Too often we focus on the immediate present, seeing what has happened as a major disaster. But when we take the time to step back and evaluate the disaster, it usually turns out that while it was an outcome you may wish hadn't happened, it's almost always one you can move past.

Learn from a setback and you'll be less anxious about trying once again.

AN AUSTRALIAN & NEW ZEALAND TRIP

Final Day - Larry Ryan The cruise liner made our final port on Monday at

Auckland, which lies on the northwest section of the North Island. This cosmopolitan city of 1.4 million has the distinction of being the largest Polynesian community in the world.

Our tour group met a local tour guide prior to 7:45 am. Disembarked the ship. We found and claimed our luggage on the dock and made it through customs.

After waiting a short time for a bus, it escorted our group into the middle of the business district for a planned stop at the city's "Sky Tower." This tower is the 8th tallest one in the world at 325 meters. We learned that "Bungy Jumping," which originated in New Zealand, was permitted, but our time on the observation platform was limited, so I was not even close to being tempted to be harnessed for more reasons than one.

Next, the bus deposited us at the Auckland War Memorial Museum where we heard information about the country's culture, history, exhibits and deceased veterans of WWI. We scurried around the large room and located the Morrison and Ryan names engraved on the walls.

Our appointed museum guide was so intent on having everyone in our small group of nine people hear her disseminating information that her head constantly rotated left and

right. Left and right for 45 minutes! Consequently, half of her words were mute to people on one side or the other. Her message sounded like this:

"I...800...917...shells...canoe... flax...teeth...weapons...name s...honor...etc. 45 minutes! It left my head spinning out of control. I wanted to grab her head and glue it in forward position!

As the bus approached the Auckland Airport Terminal, our city guide alerted us that we would hear the word, "Chicken." Interpreted it meant, "Check-In!"

Inside the terminal we herded our two suitcases up to a man-assisted, ticket kiosk. We were first in line of our group, so were hopeful to be processed quickly and have the better seating choices in economy section of the airplane.

However, my wife's passport caused a glitch! The kiosk computer did not have her passport information listed as ever being present in New Zealand! Of course the male attendant had to check with his supervisor, who in turn had to call the Immigration Department! That 20 minute delay put us back in row #47. So much for speculation.

The last "Down Under" word for the day: "Tu Meke," means, "Awesome." That best describes our "Down Under" trip!

Our United Airlines flight left Auckland at 3:30pm. for a 6,555 miles trip to the US.

There was an hour period where air turbulence was drastically bouncing our temporary, sequestered home. White knuckles was the noticeable physical effect!

Upon arriving in San Francisco at 6am. on Monday, Customs were again a requirement. With over 200 passengers on our flight, plus other arrivals, there were only two custom officers on duty. Consequently, we found ourselves zig-zagging along the ropes for an hour to reach the head of the line. It was two steps and set the

One small way you can be a force for positive change is by properly disposing of old rechargeable batteries once they no longer power devices. You probably don't know it, but battery recycling touches more areas of your life (and vacation) than you realize.

Did you know that the materials taken from rechargeable batteries in popular travel items like hand-held fans, lanterns and other electronic gear are used to create new everyday products? When batteries are recycled, valuable metals are recovered and used in the manufacturing of new products like golf clubs and stainless-steel appliances.

The best part? Battery recycling is easy and can help protect people and property. This is particularly true of lithium ion batteries, which power laptops, cellphones and other personal electronic devices -- many of which accompany summer travels. When these batteries no

longer power devices, they can retain up to an 80 percent residual charge, making it critical to properly handle, manage and recycle them to avoid a safety incident.

Not sure how to recycle batteries? Here's a quick how-to guide:


1. Protect: Just like you protect yourself with sunscreen, it's important to protect the terminals (ends) of batteries. You can either tape the battery terminals with non-conductive electrical, duct or clear packing tape or individually bag batteries in plastic bags (not grocery store bags).
2. Stay cool: While being shady is not usually a good thing, it is for battery recycling! Keep those batteries in a cool, dry place and aim to recycle them within six months.
3. Drop: Battery recycling is easy and convenient, as 86 percent of the U.S. population lives within 10 miles of a Call2Recycle drop-off location. The organization, which offers the country's leading consumer battery recycling and stewardship program, recently marked its 25th anniversary.
