#### AG DAY

Huntington County Ag Day is Tuesday April 3. Third grade students from public, private, and home schools in Huntington County will participate in this event at

the Huntington County Fairgrounds.

The Huntington County Extension Office has coordinated an Ag Day event each spring for many years to educate third grade students about agriculture. Individuals who work in agriculture-related fields volunteer their time and talents to make this program a success.

There are twelve learning stations at this event. These stations include topics involving animal agriculture, crops, and machinery. Teachers are provided a question for each topic in advance to help prepare the students. Every child attending the program receives an activity book and other educational items donated by area businesses and state-wide agricultural commodity organizations.

The material presented incorporates academic standards to allow teaching this educational program outside the traditional classroom. Approximately 40 volunteers will be assisting Purdue Extension Staff with teaching the students.

Many people living in Huntington County work on farms or have careers that involve agriculture. These jobs include production agriculture, farm inputs, processing and marketing and wholesale and retail sales. According to the most

 According to the dictionary, joy is the emotion brought on by well-being, success or good fortune. When we're feeling joy, we're happy and finding good things in our lives.

While measuring joy might seem hard to do, there's one test you can try. Think about what your initial feelings are when you wake up in the morning. Are they about the joy and excitement the coming day should bring, or are they thoughts of dread and anxiety for all the pressures and responsibilities you'll have to face? If finding joy is difficult for you to do, it's time to take action to put some pleasure back into your life.

A first step should be understanding what joy means for you. It's not the same for everyone. Close your eyes and think about pleasant people, places, things and experiences that have brought you real joy. Joy should come from significant things, not just fleeting gladness because there was less traffic today or that you're having your favorite dinner tonight.

Our sense of joy grows from our emotional, physical and mental well-being. There are a number of ways to significantly improve all those.

A starting point is to enjoy your relationships. Look for the things in your family, friends and even your job that are important to you, make you feel good and bring you joy.

And it's important to look for the positive. Often we focus on the negative, ignoring the numerous little things in our day that make us happy.

It's also helpful to realize that life is too short to see only negative things or people when there is so much around that can bring you satisfaction. Take time to watch a sunset, to appreciate nature, and to spend a few moments each day meditating on the positive things in your life.

You need to also take care of yourself. Eating right, staying active and getting plenty of rest are all ways to find more of the joy in life. While most days might bring something problematic or stressful, when you make time for yourself to focus on the good in your life, it becomes easier to minimize the stress and tension you may be facing.

Finding the joy in your life is not something that simply happens to you. Your goal, on a daily basis, is to actively seek out the things that bring you joy.

recent Indiana Ag Statistics Report (2015), Huntington County farms generated \$159,989,000 in annual crop and livestock income. Huntington County ranks 26th out of 92 Indiana counties for cash farm receipts.

There are definitely opportunities for young people seeking employment in agriculture. Purdue University's College of Agriculture awarded bachelor's degrees to 502 students in May 2017.

Ninety-seven percent of reporting graduates stated they were employed or continuing their education as of January 2018. The average starting salary reported by graduates earning a Purdue bachelors' degree in May 2017 was \$45,409. See this website for additional information:

**HEALTHY STEPS**

For fans of Healthy Steps, Parkview Huntington Hospital's (PHH) semi-annual wellness fair, April typically means getting necessary lab testing done at a reduced rate. While lab testing is one of the centerpieces of the event, Healthy Steps offers much more to help area residents create a healthier lifestyle. The spring event will take place on Saturday, April 14, from 7 to 11 a.m., in the hospital lobby and lower level.

Free health screenings Health screenings by clinical staff members and physicians will be available. Healthy Steps guests are welcome to take advantage of these screenings: hearing, vision, dental health, skin cancer, bone density, balance, foot health, and breathing.

Free services

Free additional services will include blood pressure checks; height, weight and body mass index (BMI) measurement; a brief chair massage; grip strength testing; help with setting up or accessing a Parkview MyChart account; and the chance to ask a pharmacist questions about medications. Guests who plan to talk with a pharmacist should bring a list of the medications, vitamins and supplements they take, or bring the actual containers in a brown bag.

Reduced-cost lab testing Wellness packages that bundle several lab tests together are back again! Fasting is required for at least 10 hours prior to the actual blood draw. Water and medications are permitted during the fast.

In addition, three new single tests are available: CMP (Comprehensive Metabolic Profile – glucose, liver function and electrolytes), lipid profile (cholesterols and triglycerides), and an iron test. Fasting is required for the CMP and lipid profile tests.

Other single tests include: hemogram (anemia screen), TSH (thyroid stimulating hormone), Hemoglobin A1C (glyco A1C – diabetes screen), PSA (prostate cancer screen), Ultrasensitive (CRP – screen for early heart disease), and vitamin D 25 hydroxy (bone health screen). Prices for

single tests range from \$10 to \$40, depending on the test. Wellness packages range from \$30 to \$95.

Cash, check and credit card are accepted forms of payment for lab testing. Results will be mailed to guests in two to three weeks, or will be available via Parkview MyChart. Guests who wish to receive results by mail should bring along an adhesive mailing address label.

Imaging tests Digital mammograms and \$50 HeartSmart CT scans will be available during the event, by appointment. The HeartSmart is appropriate for adults 45 and older who have risk factors for heart disease. To schedule an appointment during Healthy Steps only, call 260-355-3400.

Something for everyone A new attraction this year is a state-of-the-art surgery demo that will allow guests to try their hand at laparoscopic surgery. This type of video-assisted surgery uses special lighted scopes and unique tools to enable surgeons to perform delicate operations within the body using just a few small incisions.

Guests can talk with hospital staff members on health-related topics and pick up information on coping with stress, eating healthier, managing diabetes, quitting smoking, preventing falls at home, managing pain,

effective hand-washing for illness prevention, ortho procedures and other surgeries, adult and pediatric therapies, and more. They can also learn about the progress of the construction project to create the expanded Holly D. Sale Rehabilitation and Wellness Center and a state-of-the-art clinic for wound healing. PHH has exciting plans for new services in the space when it is complete early in 2019!

Free valet parking will be available for guest convenience. The HOSPITALity Café will be open for breakfast, and the gift shop will be open limited hours.

**RESTRICTIONS LIFTED**

“We appreciate everyone’s patience and understanding while these temporary restrictions were in place,” says Dr. Deborah McMahan, Allen County Health Commissioner. “While it was a sacrifice for both patients and hospital staff, we believe these efforts helped to reduce transmission of respiratory illnesses during a period of heightened flu activity.”

While the visitor restrictions have ended, it doesn’t mean residents should drop their guard against flu. Seasonal flu activity will continue for several more weeks. So far during the 2017-18 season, 23 people in Allen County have died from flu and its complications.

Residents should continue to take the following precautions year-round:

- Get vaccinated. All residents 6 months of age and older should be vaccinated against influenza, pneumonia (if recommended) and pertussis (if recommended) unless there are known allergies to these vaccines. Despite the flu vaccine not being a good match with this season’s predominant circulating strain, health officials continue to advise residents to get vaccinated against the flu, as it offers protection against other circulating strains and is expected to reduce the severity of illness.

- Stay home if you are sick. All residents experiencing fever and muscle aches should stay from school, work, shopping or other social gatherings until they have no fever for 24 hours without the benefit of fever reducing medications.

- Wash your hands frequently. Use soap and

warm water whenever possible; if not available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer to clean hands.

- Cover your cough and sneeze with a tissue. If you don’t have a tissue, cough or sneeze into your upper sleeve or elbow – not your hands.

- Wear a mask if needed. Patients with cough or fever seeking treatment at a healthcare facility should ask for a mask to wear. Health officials and hospital infection control specialists continue to monitor flu activity in the community.

You can get your influenza vaccination at many local pharmacies. Visit <http://www.heroesplan.org/locations/> to find one near you. You may also schedule an appointment at the Fort Wayne-Allen County Dept. of Health Medical Annex, visit an area urgent care clinic or your primary care provider’s office.

### INHALANT ABUSE

Inhalant abuse is an overlooked but dangerous activity occurring in our country today. On average, 17,000 people use inhalants daily and 566 of them are trying it for the first time. According to the American Association of Pediatrics, nearly one in every five eighth graders has experimented with some form of inhalant. These staggering statistics can have fatal results, but educating yourself can help lead to prevention.

Inhalant abuse refers to the deliberate sniffing of common household products with the intent of "getting high." Examples of these products include glue, markers, nail polish remover, cleaning fluids, hair spray, gasoline, the propellant in aerosol whipped cream, spray paint, fabric protector, air conditioner fluid (Freon), cooking spray and correction fluid. These products are sniffed, snorted, bagged (fumes inhaled from a plastic bag), or "huffed" (inhalant-soaked rag, sock, or roll of toilet paper placed in the mouth). Slang terms include: Duster; Snappers; Ozone;

Poppers; Gluey; Huff; Rush; and Whippets.

People tend to abuse different inhalant products at different ages. New users ages 12-15 most commonly abused glue, shoe polish, spray paints, gasoline, and lighter fluid. New users ages 16-17 most commonly abuse nitrous oxide or "whippets." Inhalants are typically used by young teens, but some adults use them to get high while still being able to pass drug screens. Other adults switch from alcohol or a drug to inhalants because they feel inhalants are safer.

What are the risks?

Within seconds of inhalation, a person experiences intoxication along with other effects similar to those produced by alcohol, such as slurred speech, an inability to coordinate movements, dizziness, confusion, delirium, nausea and vomiting. Prolonged inhalant use can cause damage to the parts of the brain that control thinking, moving, seeing, and hearing. Other effects include: hearing loss; limb spasms; bone marrow damage; and blood oxygen depletion. Long-term use can lead to weight loss, muscle weakness, disorientation, inattentiveness, lack of coordination, irritability, and depression.

Inhalant abuse can also be lethal. Sniffing highly concentrated amounts of the chemicals in solvents or aerosol sprays can cause heart failure within minutes. This syndrome, known

as "sudden sniffing death," can result from a single session of healthy person. High concentrations of inhalants may also cause death from suffocation, especially when inhaled from a paper or plastic bag or in a closed area.

It is critical to discuss the dangers of inhalant abuse with children and teens. For younger children, discuss the purpose of common household products. Emphasize that when they are not used appropriately, certain fumes or gases may harm the body and make them sick. For teens, explain the risks and that

the consequences of abusing products are as dangerous as those from abusing alcohol or using illegal drugs. Education can help keep our kids safe.

If you suspect your child might be abusing inhalants, call your poison control center at 1-800-222-1222 or the 1-800 number on the product label.
