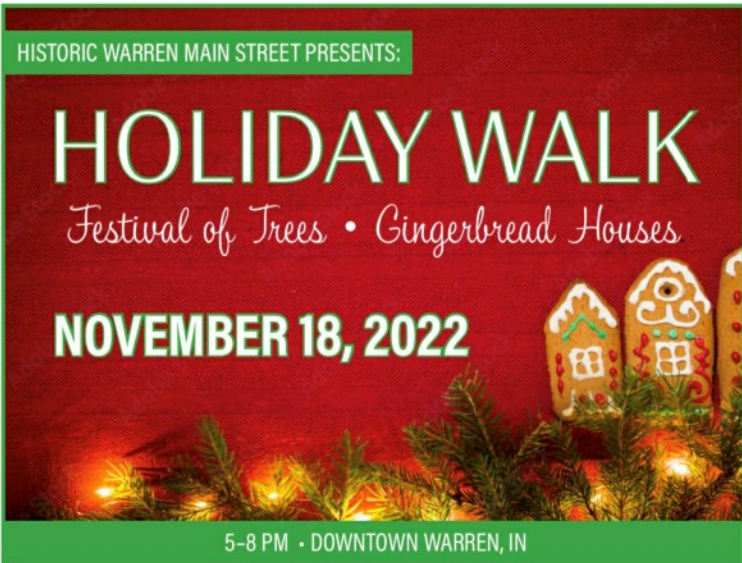

LEAF PICKUP

Town of Warren Leaf Pickup has begun on a regular schedule of Mondays and Fridays. However, other days are added as necessary. Please rake leaves to the curb but not out into the street and make the piles as thin as possible so the vacuum can reach them. Bagged leaves can be taken to the mulch pile at the Utility Garages. Please dump the leaves and take the bag with you. The service will continue as long as necessary.

SNOW

With leaves comes the possibility of snow. Some reminders. Please do not shovel or blow snow into the streets as it makes for slick areas. Snow emergency routes for the Town of Warren are Third Street and Wayne Street. Those streets will be cleared first for emergency vehicles. The other emergency routes are State Highways and are not maintained by the Town. When possible, please move cars to the plowed side of

the street after plows go through to help with clearing. The Town is divided into sections and once each section is cleared, plowing will start over within that section as necessary. Each employee is assigned a section and will work within that section until cleared. Snow piles which result after plowing heavy snow will be removed as soon as possible.

Trevia's
Recipe Box

One of our favorite Sunday meals is swiss steak. Sometimes I make it with gravy, other times I just put the veggies in and simmer. This past Sunday I made it with the veggie simmer. When I make this I use a lot of fresh produce, which is good for you and lower sodium which we all need.

I also like to cook with a lot of herbs and I have come to find that Mrs. Dash seems to be a staple in my kitchen too. I probably have every flavor they make of their seasonings along with some farm dust from Jeff's Market. I have the regular and the spicy for John. It's really good too.

Flavor has been my kick here lately, I have really been using the herbs and spices a lot. I would rather use them up in food than not use them and in a year, which is a good time frame for herbs and spices, throw them out because they need to be replaced cause of the date.

So back to the swiss steak. I use cube steak or minute steak whichever you call it and I sprinkle with the original flavor of Mrs. Dash on both sides of the meat. I usually take the non stick spray and spray my skillet and place meat in the skillet to brown on both sides. I then add one 14.5 oz can of diced tomatoes, about 1 1/2 c. sliced carrots and 1 1/2 c. sliced celery which both are cut in approximately 1/4 inch chunks. I take one small onion and chop into 1/4 inch dice. Place all the veggies in the skillet with the meat and add approximately 1/2 a tomato can of water and let simmer with the lid on. I add salt and fresh ground black pepper and then approximately 1/4 tsp of marjoram, thyme and parsley. I let it simmer for 1/2 hour to 45 minutes till the veggies are tender.

I usually serve this with some cheese and chive mashed potatoes and Harvard beets. If you choose to, you can add 1 to 2 packets of brown gravy to this, just mix a little cold water with the gravy mix and stir into the liquid already in the skillet. Adding more water if needed.

It has been a fabulous week, enjoy while you can, I am every chance I get.

ENROLLING IN

MARKETPLACE COVERAGE FOR 2023

The open enrollment period for 2023 health insurance coverage through marketplaces and other individual plans is here. November 1, 2022, is the first day you can enroll in, re-enroll in, or change a 2023 health plan through the Health Insurance Marketplace.

Important Dates

* December 15, 2022: Last day to enroll in or change plans for coverage to start January 1, 2023.

* January 15, 2023: Last day to enroll in or change a 2023 health plan. After this date, you can enroll in or change plans only if you qualify for a Special Enrollment Period.

* February 1, 2023: 2023 coverage starts for those who enroll in or change plans December 16, 2022, through January 15, 2023.

Consumers in Indiana who currently have marketplace coverage, or will need it in 2023, should make time to shop for plans through Healthcare.gov. The Indiana Department of Insurance provides a Marketplace Insurance Providers Map to help you determine what insurance providers are in your county.

If you already have coverage through a marketplace plan, review your information to make sure it is accurate. You can update your application with any income and/or household changes. You may qualify for a different amount of financial assistance or find a different plan that costs less and/or better meets your needs. The NAIC's Health Insurance Shopping Tool can help you understand how different policies support your health care needs. The tool provides a 3-step process to compare different health insurance policies.

What to Look For

If your plan is no longer available in 2023, you should receive a notice from your insurer and the marketplace. Even if your plan is continuing, it pays to shop around and check whether the doctors and/or hospitals your family uses are in the plan's networks.

If you're looking for a new plan, there are three categories of health insurance plans to choose from on the marketplace — Bronze, Silver and Gold. They are broken up by how costs are shared between you and your insurer. Another category, Catastrophic, is available for consumers under 30 years of age or who face a hardship in accessing

the other plans. Learn more about the different plans and network types.

If you need assistance, talk to an agent, broker, or certified navigator. A certified Indiana Navigator can assist you with the process to apply for your health insurance. You may work with an Indiana Navigator in any county in Indiana free of charge. Find a Navigator in your area.

for preservation. Another notable resident was John Hays Hammond, Jr. who was recognized as the Father of Radio. He also invented remote control. He had a medieval-style castle built here in 1926 and requested that poison ivy be planted around his grave so no one would ever bother him.

The name of a local bar, "The Crow's Nest" was a feature in the movie, "The Perfect Storm." The movie starring George Clooney, Mark Wahlberg, and Diane Lane depicted the disaster of the Andrea Gail schooner in an unnamed storm of 1991. The crew was 575 miles from Gloucester and loaded with swordfish when the storm was evident. They decided to sail for shore through the storm in hope of salvaging their catch. The decision to wait in safer waters for two days was vetoed as ice for preservation of the fish was running low.

Our tour guide informed us that Gloucester is one of four towns that inhabit Cape Ann,

the peninsula which extends eastward into the ocean 40 miles north of Boston. This area is rocky and the seashore is a prime example. Walking to the water's edge through a maze of variously sized rocks was impossible and not recommended for our aged group of visitors. The guide also recounted a story of a couple who wanted to be married "on the rocks" across from the hotel at sunset with the ocean in the background. It was planned as a romantic and highly memorable occasion. Six years later that marriage ended "on the rocks!"

During the 1840's, many immigrants came from Italy and Portugal to work in the fishing industry. Trees were plentiful in town and a private golf course was located directly back of the hotel. Too busy sightseeing to play. Many houses displayed unusual architecture and various color schemes. Tennis courts are turned into ice skating rinks in winter.

We viewed Gloucester Bay during our jaunt through the town. There seemed to be hundreds of fishing boats and an equal number of lobster traps stacked high along the docks. The guide informed us that young kids would have fingers missing from lobster bites. Most thought that this condition was a sense of pride! The bus passed the "Turtle Alley Chocolates" Shoppe. The tour guide postulated that the two extra letters stand for: Pay Extra! Onward we sped past the Fisherman's Warf and a building wall that was adorned with colorful, ceramic pieces in the shape of fish. Advertising never ceases.

After the one hour tour of Gloucester, the bus headed to the harbor for a boat ride into the Atlantic Ocean for "Whale Watching." One passenger texted her children about the upcoming event and the message was auto-corrected to read "Wheel Watching." That had them confused and guessing.

At 11 am., the packed, sightseeing boat left Gloucester port. A promised box lunch was distributed as we selected inside seats at a table. The pre-ordered, chicken salad sandwich did not seem appropriate for a New England meal, but it fit my appetite.

About one hour later Humpback Whales were spotted. They performed as if on cue. Their resurfacing activity provided excellent photographic opportunities. Some of their sequences must have lasted 3-4 seconds before submerging. Occasionally, we could see the dark gray skin just below the surface before a water spout announced their reemergence. The boat's captain reported that these mammals come up for air every 8-12 minutes. There are approximately 12,000 Humpback Whales in the oceans. They eat 2-3,000 pounds of fish daily and migrate 1,500 miles seasonally to the Caribbean Sea.

During the return voyage back to Gloucester Harbor, I sat in the stern of the boat and watched the engines create rhythmic, dual, turbulent waves that flared out to oblivion. Well, I couldn't see that far as fog interfered. However, looking to either side, the seemingly endless water seemed to be rising instead of lowering. Geography taught me that the world was round, so I should be at its highest point and the rest of the world should be sloping away. Right? Obstacle illusion?

Upon returning to the hotel, I once again practiced tossing bean bags at the corn hole platforms in front of the hotel. I spied them yesterday upon arrival. The distance was not standardized but I had enough success that scared prospective opponents away. Soon my wife reminded me that the bus would leave at 4 pm. for dinner. The bus passed Thatcher Island and its two lighthouses, which is the only one in the USA sporting two such structures. They were originally erected in 1771 to mark a dangerous ledge. The current ones were constructed in 1861.

The island, which is four miles away and visible from our hotel, is part of Rockport, MA. This town is also one of the four located on Cape Ann.

A five-course dinner was served at Oliver's Harbor Restaurant in Gloucester. The meal consisted of:

1. Clam Chowder

 3. Vegetable & Cheese pizza slice
 4. Spinach Ravioli with Parmesan Cheese
 5. Cannoli.
- The owner visited with our group outside before dinner and presented each one upon leaving with a cheese sample from Sicily. The bus returned to the hotel at 6:20 pm. Practiced corn hole again.
