JEFF'S FARM MARKET **CELEBRATES 4TH** ANNIVERSARY

For several years, Jeff Daugherty has operated an outside produce stand in Warren. During the Covid epidemic in the late summer 2020, many of his customers had come to rely on his stand for quality produce locally without the drive to larger cities. Several of the customers suggested that he open an inside store for the winter in order that they could continue to buy locally.

With a recently vacated building at 609 E. 1st St. owned by his father, Jeff installed a few shelves and opened his inside store for business on October 27, 2020. FISH & CHICKEN Within a short time, he added many new products focusing on Amish groceries from Walnut Creek and Indiana made goods. Lines included Red Gold tomato products, Sechler's pickles, Didier meats, Clover Blossom honey, Café Valley baked goods and Indiana Kitchen bacon.

Over the past four years, growth of the store has been non-stop with freezers and coolers added and more shelving to provide the Warren area with a muchneeded source of produce and groceries. The market is a member of "Indiana Grown", an Indiana Department of Agriculture organization that promotes Indiana products.

As inflation increased food costs for families over the past few years, Jeff added a Value you choose Aisle to the store featuring short-date products with huge savings for families for everyday grocery needs. In addition, weekly specials are offered with local prices often

below what large chain stores have.

The outside stand has continued to be open from dawn to dusk, April through October each year featuring the best in quality produce as well as flowers and plants in mums and autumn décor in

Jeff wants to thank all his customers who have supported him over the past four years by having a big 4th Anniversary Sale this week. As the fifth year begins, Jeff continues to look for ways to serve the local distance to do business at his market.

Kudos, Kicks & Karats



This week is another one of my favorite Christmas cookies. I could eat these year round. How many remember the Archway Cookie Company? I know I do and at Christmas they always had the wedding cake cookies. Oh those were so good along with the cherry chip ones.

You can still get those cookies at Walmart but you really have to look for them cause they are usually on an end of the aisle rack. But I do know you can go to Darlington Farms in Fort Wayne and stock up when they are open, which I seem to have a bad habit of doing so. Along with my favs I also get raspberry filled, lemon, then if they have molasses, chocolate chip and those nasty windmill cookies for John.

So here is my recipe for pecan melt aways or Mexican wedding cakes or whatever name they get called, I've learned depending which part of the country your from as to what they are called.

PECAN MELT AWAYS

1 c. Butter. 1/2c powdered sugar. 1 tsp vanilla extract.

1/4 tsp salt

3/4 c. Pecans, chopped Additional powdered sugar

2 1/4 c. Flour.

In a large bowl, cream butter, 1/2 powdered sugar until light and fluffy, 5-7 minutes. Beat in vanilla, combine flour and salt, gradually add to the creamed mixture, and mix well. Stir in pecans and refrigerate dough.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Roll dough into 1 inch balls and place in ungreased baking sheet. Bake 10-12 minutes or till set. Roll warm cookies in the additional powdered sugar. Cool completely, then roll again in the powdered sugar. Store in airtight container.

The Town Council of the Town of Warren met Monday, October 14, 2024 in a Regular Session at Assembly Hall, Council Meeting Room, 131 N. Wayne St, in accordance with rules of Council and applicable


