COUNCIL NOTES

Due to the Memorial Holiday the Warren Town Council met on Tuesday evening, May 28 in Town Hall Annex. President Harold Jones called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. with the Pledge to the American Flag.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as submitted.

In regard to the Wastewater Project, a Common Construction Wage meeting has been set for June 7 at 9 a.m. in Town Hall Annex.

It was reported the IDEM permit has been approved for the Wastewater plant.

Repairs still were not completed at the Water Treatment plant, due to the weather.

Council urged a second bid be received for the Engineer Proposal for the Electric Utility.

Council gave their approval for a United Methodist Memorial Home Annexation Waiver request from Lowell Griffin. A total of 60 villas are expected to be built and it is hoped they can start construction soon.

Two warning sirens, at Jones and Langton Estates had been installed and all the sirens are to be tested on Wednesday, June 5.

Patriotic banners had been ordered and were expected to be delivered in two weeks.

The Wellhead Protection was reported to be in compliance. Darrel Bice noted they need to hold a couple of meetings this year.

There had been one response to letters sent concerning paving of Grover Street.

Council is scheduled to hold a special meeting on Monday evening, June 3, in Town Hall Annex. The meeting concerns land acquisition.

On May 21 an EMC Project Study was held.

Council voted to pay \$400.00 CSO Partnership annual membership dues.

ANNULAR ECLIPSE, JUNE 10

Solar event coming in June to a sky near you
 Get ready for a heavenly show June 10.

The annular eclipse of the sun begins at 4:51 p.m. EDT and reaches greatest eclipse at 7:48 p.m. It ends at 10:36p.m. The eclipse will be visible in the U.S., Canada, Mexico, and several other areas of the world.

An annular eclipse is different from a total eclipse where no part of the sun is visible. An annular eclipse occurs when the moon's disk fits inside the sun's disk and leaves a ring (annulus) of light from the sun around it. The type of eclipse depends on the particular arrangement of the alignment of the sun, the moon, and the earth, and the distances between them at the time.

If you plan to watch the eclipse, be sure to have protective eyewear. Special glasses can be purchased locally or over the Internet. Darkly smoked glass can also be used. Peeking at the eclipse for more than a second or two could result in eye damage.

Just how dark it will become depends on how large the annulus is.

In case you wondered, the sun is really not eaten by voracious dragons as some ancients thought. Nor has it abandoned the Earth as the Greeks feared. The word "eclipse" comes from the Greek word meaning "abandonment."

In some parts of the world, people banged pots together, shot arrows into the sky, chanted, and confessed sins.

They were all successful. The sun returned to the Earth.

CHOLESTEROL AND DEMENTIA

Researchers at the University of California, San Francisco, have found that cognitive problems in later years were twice as likely in people with the highest cholesterol levels than they were in people with the lowest levels.

They say there are many ways to interpret the finding. But for anyone hoping to preserve mental clarity, reducing cholesterol in the diet is one easy step that has many other health benefits as well.

HUGE MEAL COULD BE FATAL

Cardiology researchers asked people what they had eaten just before their heart attack. They discovered that the risk of heart attack jumped tenfold during the first hour following a heavy meal. Heart attack risk was four times higher than normal in the second hour after a large meal, according to a report given at the American Heart Association conference.

Doctors say the hazardous period could be caused by a spike in blood pressure, insulin, or both after a big meal. They suggest pushing yourself away from the table before you have to loosen your belt.


EATING AT HOME IS HEALTHIER
