CLEAR THE WAY

The first snowfall of the year serves as an annual reminder that there aren't many things that will stop a letter carrier from completing his or her appointed rounds. But an injury caused by ice and snow-covered walks and approaches is one of them.

Fortunately, that is easily prevented when customers keep a few simple things in mind.

"We really appreciate when people clear the path to their mailbox," said Van Buren Postmaster Debbie Echelbarger. "Whether their letter carrier delivers on foot or from their vehicle, it's much safer and quicker for them when customers shovel snow and de-ice walkways."

According to Echelbarger, customers should check the area surrounding their mailbox daily

to be sure no ice has built up. Just because there is only a dusting of snow doesn't mean that there isn't a hazard lurking underneath the powder.

"Many times there is a patch of ice under the snowy spot," said Echelbarger. "The carrier can't see it and could slip."

For roadside boxes, customers should clear any piles created by snow plows that make it difficult for a carrier to reach the box from the delivery vehicle. This is a problem especially as the winter season wears on.

"Each time it snows the pile from the plows get bigger and eventually it prevents the delivery vehicle from pulling up alongside the box," said Echelbarger. "Then, it turns to ice and is very difficult to remove."

The Postmaster suggests a quick shovel after every snowfall to ensure uninterrupted mail delivery.

"We know how much people look forward to receiving their mail, and we want to deliver it safely all through the winter," said Echelbarger.



Positions Available


"When you look at the state of the national and local economy now and the forecast of what is to





TMM TH TIPS

Do I have to see a specialist?

Many patients ask the question, do I need to see a specialist? The answer depends on the treatment that is indicated, the difficulty of the procedure, the patients comfort level, and the dentist's treatment experience. For example, in our office we treat most patients that need extractions with local anesthesia and if needed nitrous oxide and possibly an anti-anxiety medication. I will routinely refer impacted wisdom teeth to be extracted by the oral surgeon. Most patients prefer I.V. sedation for impactions. If a tooth needs endodontic treatment (i.e. root canal) some general dentists will perform this procedure in their office. We can perform root canals on most teeth. However, in some cases referral to a specialist may be needed. Other specialties that some general dentist performs include Orthodontics, Periodontics, and Prosthodontics. Our goal is to give the patient the best and most comfortable treatment we can, whether we treat you in our office or refer you to the specialist. See your family dentist and ask questions about your specific treatment.

PROTECT YOURSELF

Hepatitis means inflammation of the liver. Toxins, certain drugs, some diseases, heavy alcohol use, and bacterial and viral infections can all cause hepatitis. Hepatitis is also the name of a family of viral infections that affect the liver; the most common types in the United States are hepatitis A, hepatitis B, and hepatitis C. What is the difference between hepatitis A and hepatitis B?

The diseases are caused by two different viruses. Although each can cause similar symptoms, they have different modes of transmission and can affect the liver differently. Hepatitis A occurs only as an acute or newly occurring infection and does not become chronic. People with hepatitis A usually improve without treatment. Hepatitis B can also begin as an acute infection, but in some people, the virus remains in the body, resulting in chronic disease and long term liver problems. There are vaccines to prevent both A and B. If a person has had one type of viral hepatitis in the past,

it is still possible to get the other types.

Hepatitis A is caused by the hepatitis A virus (HAV) and lasts from a few weeks to several months. It does not lead to chronic infection. It is usually spread when a person ingests fecal matter—even in microscopic amounts—from contact with objects, food or drinks contaminated by the feces of an infected person. The best to prevent hepatitis A is by getting vaccinated. For more information, visit www.cdc.gov/hepatitis/A/aFAQ.htm.

Hepatitis B is a liver disease caused by the hepatitis B virus (HBV). It ranges in severity from a mild illness, lasting a few weeks to a serious long-term chronic illness that can lead to liver disease or liver cancer. Contact with infectious blood, semen and other bodily fluids from an infected person or sharing contaminated needles to inject drugs are the methods common transmission. The best way to prevent hepatitis B is a vaccination. For more information about hepatitis B, visit http:// www.cdc.gov/hepatitis/B/ bFAQ.htm.

The Indiana Adult Immunization Coalition is a voluntary group of health and older adult focused organizations dedicated to eradicating vaccine preventable deaths and disease among adults. The Coalition promotes education and outreach activities to increase awareness of and participation in adult immunizations.

Wachovia Checks

The Better Business Bureau has been receiving numerous telephone calls from local consumers who have received a check for \$149 from the U.S. District Court Settlement Administrator in Philadelphia, PA as part of a settlement agreement with Wachovia Bank.

Consumers are concerned about the legitimacy of these checks and are also confused about why they are included in the Wachovia settlement.

According to Michael Coil, President of BBB of Northern Indiana, "these checks are legitimate and consumers who receive them can safely deposit the check in their banking account or cash the check at a Wachovia branch."

Checks were mailed to 740,000 consumers on December 11, 2008 as part of the \$150 million dollar settlement agreement.

The settlement arose from banking arrangements that Wachovia had with telemarketers to process payments for product orders made by telephone.

Consumers who receive settlement checks ordered products or services from one of these telemarketing firms and paid by electronically created checks over the telephone.




