TREASURE ISLAND TRIP Day 1

There don't seem to be existing laws that provide homeowners blanket protections. But it is not too little, too late to enact new laws to protect property owners. fact, Florida In DeSantis Governor Ron recently signed a bill that protects property rights and provides penalties squatters. "We are putting an end to the squatters' scam in

Florida. While other states are siding with the squatters, we protecting property owners and punishing criminals looking to game the system. If you're the victim of squatting, you can simply fill out a form, give it to your local sheriff and the sheriff is instructed to go and remove the people who are inhabiting your dwelling illegally. And that will happen very quickly."

DeSantis' Attorney General Ashley Moody noted that illegal immigrants to flood across the border. After video evidence of their plan to take over homes emerged, we're ensuring **Floridians** protected from this egregious and brazen scheme. grateful to Governor DeSantis for signing this important legislation into law, and to Representative Kevin Steele for carrying this bill through Session."

A year after Woodrow Wilson's presidency opened in 1913, World War I ramped up in Sarajevo; four years later he requested congressional authorization to dispatch troops to Germany.

"Wilson went on to lead what was at the time the largest war-mobilization effort in the country's history," according to History.com. "At first, Wilson asked only for volunteer soldiers, but soon realized voluntary enlistment would not raise a sufficient number of troops and signed the Selective Service Act in May 1917. The Selective Service Act required men between 21 and 35 years of age to register for the draft, increasing the size of the army from 200,000 troops to 4 million by the end of the war. One of the infantrymen who volunteered for active duty was future President Harry S. Truman."
