## MEMORIAL DAY CEREMONY

Sgt. Wm. Bumgarner, Medal of Honor Winner, will have a new headstone dedicated on May 26th at 5:00pm which recognized his award.

The members of Champion Hill, Camp 17, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War will hold their annual Memorial Day service at the Mossburg Cemetery outside of Liberty Center in Wells County this year. The ceremony will feature the dedication of a new headstone that recognizes Sgt. Bumgarner as a Medal of Honor winner.

Sgt Bumgarner, was a member of Co. A, 4th West Virginia Infantry when he volunteered to be a member of a storming party that was to lead a major attack against the Confederate earthworks at Vicksburg on May 22, 1863. The all volunteer storming party was to carry, in addition to their own equipment, ladders and rails to throw across the ditch that fronted the earthwork where 'The Graveyard Road' entered Vicksburgs defenses. The men in the party were called the forlorn hope as few if any were expected to survive the rifle and cannon fire that would be directed at them by the enemy. Though the attack failed the bravery of the men leading it was recognized by Congress and the men given the Medal of Honor. Sgt. Bumgarner is one of only a few men from northeastern Indiana to earn the award.

His grave in the Mossburg Cemetery (near the 550w and 200s intersection) is now marked by the original government headstone put up at his burial nearly 100 years ago. Camp 17 working

in conjunction with Mr. 'lke' Huffman from Liberty Center and Mr. Don Morfe from Baltimore Md. have been able to get a 'Medal of Honor' headstone and have it erected for the dedication in honor of Mr. Bumgarner and the other veterans of the Civil War now buried in area cemeteries.

The ceremony will begin at 5pm on Saturday, May 26 and is expected to last about forty minutes. The ceremony will follow the ritual of the Sons of Union Veterans in dedicating a headstone. Champion Hill Camp Commander Archie Lintz will serve as host of the event and Past Camp Commander Steve Williams will be the main speaker. The Company Singers of Champion Hill, Camp 17 will provide the music. Department of Indiana Chaplain, Rich McConnell will offer the dedication prayer.

The American Legion, Post 111, color guard will render a salute and Sean McConnell will offer 'Taps.' Other invited guests are representatives of the Wells County Historical Society, members of the Bluffton unit of the Indiana National Guard, Post 111 CommanderKash Vanover, Diane Rockwell - township trustee, Wells County Service Officer Claude McMILLEN, Wells County veterans, members of the 44th Indiana Civil War reenactment regiment, and descendants of Sgt. Bumgarner.

Commander Lintz and the brothers of Champion Hill, Camp 17 SUVCW would like to invite everyone who wishes to honor Sgt. Bumgarner and his fellow veterans to attend this unveiling of the new Medal of Honor headstone.

If you had visited Heritage Pointe a few years back you'd remember oldfashioned birdcages scattered around the facility. Each small cage held a pair of canaries or other small birds for the enjoyment of the residents. I particularly remember the pair in Assisted Living and how excited they got when someone would stop and talk with them. If you liked birds, they added a wonderful dimension to daily life. If you didn't like birds, you deemed them dirty. Birds by their very nature scatter seeds, feathers and bedding inside as well as outside their cage. Eventually the mess had to go and so did the birds.

There is something very therapeutic about watching the birds and learning their beautiful songs. The bird lovers who live and work here missed the birds and so a way was found to bring them back in a much healthier environment.

In January four, huge, glassed aviaries were delivered to Warren. Each lighted aviary houses various songbirds. The collection of birds includes a pair each of Saffron Finches from South America, Blue Cap Waxbills from Africa, and Shafttails, Diamond Doves, Zebra Finches from Australia. They also have one male Canary from the Canary Islands of Africa. There is only one male because he won't sing if he has a mate. And, there are three Society Finches that never existed in the wild but were created by the Chinese to be foster parents. These little finches are hard to sex and so the company just includes three and lets them figure it out.

The birds are provided water and feed inside each aviary. Various nests and nesting materials are also provided. This has been a busy spring for the birds. Several eggs have been laid and hatched. The little guys have mostly fledged, and you can tell the babies by their fuzzy feathers.

The four aviaries contained 48 birds and there have been 20-30 new hatches. The birds are clipped and checked quarterly by the company, Living Designs, and the babies will soon be taken to South Dakota. Living Designs has been in the bird business since 1985 and has gained a respected reputation for its work in avian research, genetics and disease control.

Jason Neal, Activities Department, is the birdman. Along with his many other duties, he watches for any unusual behavior and cares for the birds on a daily schedule. He is in contact with the company regularly to ensure the birds stay healthy and happy. The birds have provided hours of enjoyment to the residents, staff and guests.



weather. The many different varieties of inflatable jackets range from those that inflate instantly when the wearer hits the water, to those that are manually inflated. All are designed to be more comfortable and wearable than the traditional life jacket.

"Accidents can happen at any speed, at any place, or at any time you are on the water," said J.P. Salb, Indiana Conservation Officer. "Although boaters often stow life jackets on their boat, very few choose to wear one.

"In reality, during a boating emergency there just isn't enough time to grab a life jacket and put it on properly before you are in the water. If you are faced with a strong current or unfavorable weather conditions, you will not only have trouble making sure you are safe and secure in your life jacket, but you will be unable to help young children or other passengers who are in your boat.

"Those reasons alone should be enough to make boaters want to wear their lifeiackets."

This year during National Safe Boating Week, May 19-25, and throughout the boating season, remember to practice safe and responsible boating. Safe boating saves lives.

A life jacket works only if you wear it.


