## OPENING AT THE PULSE


The story is based on two classic Sherlock Holmes' tales—A Scandal in Bohemia and The Final Problem. The King of Bohemia (Mark Esch) is in trouble. He is about to be married but is being blackmailed by an ex-lover, opera sensation Irene Adler (Stacia Brinneman). Sherlock Holmes (David Scribner) and Doctor Watson (Steve Rodenberger) are already in pursuit of Sherlock's arch enemy Professor Moriarty (Randy Neuman). Along the way they meet up with Godfrey Norton (Matt Stephenson), a French Maid named Marie (Janna Brothers), a safecracker Sid Prince (Justin Perry) and a variety of other characters (Joe Haney).

Will Sherlock survive the "final adventure?" The answer is "elementary." All clues point to the Pulse Opera House for a rollicking good time.

Sherlock Holmes: The Final Adventure runs September 14, 15, 20, 21, 22, 27, 28, 29. Tickets for the show are \$12 for general admission and \$5 for children 12 and under. ### DO WE WANT A SOLUTION TO THE TAX SYSTEM IN INDIANA?

The State of Indiana is now studying the property tax, and while the study is going on the paramount question remains, "If not the property tax, what will replace it?"

All levels of government and public schools have developed an ever growing appetite for increased revenue. And we all know that it takes more money to live today than it did 30 years ago. If we admit up front that we have increasing needs which will require increased revenue, then we must all ask the question, "How will the State of Indiana choose to fund that revenue need?"

A few givens to start.

1. No tax will satisfy all people
2. No tax will be fair and equitable for all
3. The solution will not be easy
4. And finally, the only revenue that all levels of government and public schools have will be taken from the citizenry. The only way to control any and all taxes is to control the growth of all budgets and expenditures.

And may I mention here that "We value local control so much" that we hesitate to mandate and keep a watchful eye on all budgets throughout the state? Well, I've mentioned it and let me let you in on a little secret, "There is very little local control at this point and there has been very little for a long time. Just think about that. Who approves all budgets? Who approves all building projects? Who designs all tax systems? Who sits as an ex officio member of every governmental and school board in the state?"

Most local people I know try to be a good citizen, abide by the laws. Pay all taxes that can be discerned. Most common citizens didn't pass the laws. Most did not make the decisions that all citizens obey each day. Most vote for a person that they think they can trust to make good decisions for the citizens, good and common sense decisions.

Most local boards, whether municipal or school, try their hardest to make good decisions. But, whatever decision they make, it counts for nothing if the State of Indiana does not want it to happen. The regulatory agencies of Indiana have a powerful impact on all of us, all of the time.

Remember back a few years ago the experience we had with the P.L. that was used to consolidate schools. The State set the framework, the sizes, the numbers and finally the approval. Who had control there? You know the answer.

We must look to the General Assembly for the tax solution. County Governments cannot do it. City and Town Governments cannot do it. It must be done by the State Government. And by the way, it is their responsibility. Local entities will do what they can, but only as

## PROSTATE SCREENINGS

Prostate cancer is one of the most common forms of cancer in men and can result in death if undetected and treated. To help combat this killer, Bluffton Regional Medical Center and Caylor-Nickel Clinic, P.C. are teaming up to once again offer free screenings to encourage men to take preventative measures against prostate cancer. Last year approximately 250 men were screened.

This year, the free PSA blood tests and exams will take place Monday, September 24 – Friday, September 28. Appointments are available from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday. On Wednesday, appointments will be scheduled from 1 to 5 p.m., and on Friday, appointments are available from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Brian Stogdill, M.D. and Stuart Brodsky, M.D., will be conducting the three-minute exams.

“These screenings are very important to discovering prostate cancer in the early stages and increasing the survival rate of those who are diagnosed,” said Dr. Brodsky. 

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

much as the state will allow them to do.

About this time our Reps will start asking "What are the wishes of the People?" Polls will be run all over. And my suggestion is that polls will not solve this problem? Of course, if polled, we all will give the answer that will favor us. And we should. But our General Assembly must have the political guts to make the hard decision. Not based on "How to get Re-elected" but rather what is best for all of Indiana and worry about re-election sometime later.

The list is long, Sales Tax, Excise Tax, Property Tax, Net Income Tax, Gross Income Tax, Wheel Tax, Flat Tax and many, many others. And there may be a blend of more than one of them. Revenues do not come out of the air. They can only come from citizens, either Hoosiers or from other states. And, by the way, we can gamble a little bit more, because gambling is just another way to take money from the citizen, especially if we replace tax revenue with gambling revenue. Gambling takes money from the citizens who can least afford to pay. Oh, I know it is their choice to gamble or not, but like so many other things, some make very poor choices. Oh, I forgot, the Sin Tax. Believe me if we try to raise all of these revenues from Sin Taxes, we must be gonna sin a lot.

In the next few months the members of the General Assembly will be trying to restructure our tax system. And some say that we might have a new Indiana Constitution, saying that we need a new constitution as well as a new tax system. And as a reminder to them all, let's be sure we can come up with one that is better than the one we have. Constitutional conventions are difficult to handle even in the most settled times.

Let your State Senator and Representatives know how you feel. Find out the terms of use. Know the difference between a Levy and a Rate. Know the difference between an appropriation budget and an approved budget. Get up to speed and let them know.
